Governor Dunleavy Signs House Bill 325 into Law

On Thursday, July 28, Governor Mike Dunleavy signed <u>House Bill 325</u>, which includes updated language for the legal definition of consent in sexual assault cases.

House Bill 325 defines consent as "a freely given, reversible agreement specific to the conduct at issue by a competent person." In this case, "freely given" means that "agreement to cooperate in the act was positively expressed by word or action."

"Finally, no will mean no," Rep. Sara Rasmussen said in a statement. "I hope this sends a clear message that rape and sexual assault will no longer be tolerated in our state."

In 2021, Rep. Geran Tarr initially introduced legislation updating the consent law as House Bill 5 to address the systemic problem of sexual assault in Alaska, which has the highest rate of rape in the nation. On the last day of the legislative session in May, Rep. Tarr's law was included as an amendment to House Bill 325, which was sponsored by Rasmussen and passed unanimously.
