A Report On The Chapter From Alumni Board President Smith

The 2010–2011 school year at the Delta Chapter is expected to be one of the best in many years. The combination of extensive renovations, a good group of under-

graduates, and a dedicated alumni board all point toward positive progress for the coming year. There are 33 undergraduates living in the house, which is a record for recent years. Our most recent two rushes have been extremely successful, and the fall 2010 rush will bring even more solid, enthusiastic, and dedicated new undergraduates. We expecting 15 or 20 more undergraduates by the end of

this year. The best news that I can share regarding the chapter is the undergraduates' continued focus on academics, as well as a renewed commitment to community service and a better understanding of what it means to be a Delta Zete.

As you may know, the Delta's charter currently has been suspended by our Zeta Psi's international headquarters (IHQ). We on the alumni board believe that this action is completely unfair. We all know that the overall personality of the house fluctuates over time. This has been the case, I'm sure, since 1848. A few years ago, there were some incidents that brought the Delta into IHQ's crosshairs. In one incident, two students got into a fight (not on our property). One of the students was a Delta. The entire chapter was penalized for that undergraduate's actions. On another occasion, a female student chipped her tooth while engaging in horseplay at the house. Again, the entire chapter was penalized. A third incident involved a female guest walking out of the house with a cup of beer. I'm sure you would agree that these eventswhile they are, admittedly, regrettable-do not form the basis for a charter suspension.

As a side note, Delta representatives at the 2009 convention were appalled at what we feel was disrespectful treatment, unclear communication, and lack of due process afforded to the Delta Chapter. It is our understanding that not being allowed

to address either the national board or the general membership was a violation of rules and procedures. We encourage all alumni to voice their disagreement with the Delta's suspension to IHQ. If you disagree with this poor treatment, you may want to consider reducing or withholding any monetary contributions to IHQ until this suspension is lifted.

In response to the above events and the suspension, the alumni board has acted to remedy the problems. In August 2009, the Delta alumni board personally reviewed each and every undergraduate. This August, the board more closely reviewed any undergraduate involved, or even suspected of being involved in, any act not becoming of a Delta Zete prior to room bumping for the fall semester. A few undergraduates were deemed to be a risk to the Chapter House or brotherhood, and they were notified that their leases would not be renewed and they could not participate in house functions. The remaining undergraduates are, we believe, good and decent young men.

The undergraduates have also acted to restore the Delta's status and reputation within the Rutgers and New Brunswick communities by getting involved in numerous charity events—despite not being currently recognized by the university—including fundraising for U.S. troops overseas. The alumni board believes that we have a good mix of undergraduates who are working together to achieve a stronger chapter. Again, we ask for your support in getting IHQ to reverse this unfair action as quickly as possible.

The alumni board has been working

with the undergraduates to recapture many of the positive traditions that have been lost over time. Undergraduates are being introduced or reintroduced to the many traditions familiar to the brothers of Zeta Psi. Our past is an important part of the Delta Chapter, and we want to make sure that the brothers who will be our legacy in 100 years will still be preserving these pieces of our rich and storied past.

What would really make a difference would be more alumni involvement, to teach and share some of the other traditions that we all learned and embraced when we were undergraduates. The board is asking Delta alumni to come to our monthly alumni meetings, which are normally held after dinner on the third Thursday of the month, as well as other alumni events. Share your stories and memories with the undergraduates. They need your participation, encouragement, guidance, and support, so they can continue to pass on to the new undergraduates the things that make the Delta Chapter the great institution it has been for 162 years.





House Renovations: Spring And Summer 2010

Have you heard that a picture is worth a thousand words? This issue, we will let our renovation pictures speak for themselves. It's been a busy summer renovating the Funhouse and replacing the floor in the center hallway, Bum Room, pool room, and Mathews Dining Room. We believe the renovations have been done at first-rate quality by licensed, certified, and insured contractors.

During the spring and summer of 2010, we have been busy working on improvements and the remodeling of the Delta's Chapter House. We are continuing on our effort to bring the house back to the way everyone remembers, but please note that it was probably never as nice as we remember. We have to remember that when we lived in the house, we were between 18 and 22 years of age. The house always looked great to someone with fewer life experiences, different standards of living, and who had yet to be a homeowner. And I am sure you would agree that some of those life experiences were gained by being a brother of Zeta Psi and living at 18 College Avenue. All the improvement would not be have been possible without the undergraduates supplying an almost completely filled house, as well as the generous campaign and annual donations from the alumni.

During the spring, we began work on replacing of the boiler. But rather than just replacing a leaky boiler with one of the same size, we went out to both contractors and suppliers to resize the boiler to a smaller one because of the better insulation through most walls and ceilings, as well as because of the new heating system for the third floor. This smaller, more efficient boiler—costing more than \$30,000—will create a savings in our overall heating bill, and we hope that it will be in use for the next 20 years.

We have continued on our plan to have all the sleeping rooms supplied with air conditioners by purchasing four additional highefficiency air conditioners. With the six purchased last year, we now are currently supplying 10 rooms with air-conditioning units. It is our hope to add more next year.

We noticed that the furniture in the Bum Room was getting worn out and needed to be replaced, and that the room needed a rug. To meet the undergraduates' needs and to create an attractive social space, we purchased a new rug and one sofa and four chairs for the room. Unfortunately, we will need to continue to use two of the old chairs until additional funding can be found to replace these. Of course, the room would not be complete without an eight-foot sofa table in front of the arch window facing the driveway. After a long search, we found a table to help protect the window from damage and for use when there are events at the Chapter House.

We continued with our plan to remodel and replace floors in all the sleeping rooms. This summer, we tackled the Funhouse (the room at the top of the stairs leading to the second floor, on the left immediately after you turn the corner on your way to the front of the house). The room was renovated at a cost of more than \$7,000 by enlarging the closet and adding new windows, upgraded electric, oak floors, and also a loft bed.

When we mention the quality floors at 18 College Avenue, we cannot forget the wood floors on the first floor. These have needed work for a number of years. For a while, we were planning the complete replacement of these floors. We realized that, when the bids for this job came in twice what we had budgeted, we needed to investigate other options. After meeting with many flooring contractors, one recommended that we should consider refinishing the floors instead. He promised that he could get most of the scratches out of the floors. When the bid for this work came in low enough, we elected to refinish every floor on the first floor except the Blue Room. Now, these floors, which cost more than \$11,000 to refinish, look almost as good as new! To protect the center hallway floors, we purchased and professionally installed new carpet runners. New carpeting for the Bum Room and hallways totaled \$7,000. Come see them for yourselves! It is our plan, when fundraising is strong and there are strong numbers in the house, to add a maintenance reserve in the budget for purposes like these.

Not to be outdone by the improvements for the Bum Room, we purchased new tables for the center hall so the undergraduates can drop the mail and their books on the table when they return from class. Additionally, for 2010–2011, we have supplied most of the rooms with new mattresses and will try to keep the rooms with entirely with single mattresses to keep to code with the City of New

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Positive Changes Are Under Way During This Rebuilding Year

It has been a rebuilding year, and a positive one at that. I would not be forthright if I did not add that this positive change was not without some road bumps during this past year. Many of the older undergraduates found it difficult to "get with the new program," so the alumni board (understandably) asked them to move out. The many new members are bringing a renewed sense of energy in the house, and we older undergraduates are finding this very encouraging, which gives us more energy to lead positively.

The entire brotherhood rallied around Brother Adam Elias' ('10) efforts to support our troops overseas with the "RU for Troops" project. We collected donations in front of the house and helped sororities with their fundraisers. Many new members and current undergraduates also gave back to the community by volunteering at local hospitals in their hometowns on the weekends, and we also helped out, once again,

at the Independent Order of Odd Fellows at the local VFW hall.

AN UPDATE ON THE UNDERGRADUATE GOALS FOR THIS PAST YEAR

Membership Development: We recruited 30 new members this past year. While they have not formally been recognized by the standards of the IHQ, I can confidently report that they have passed all tests administered by the pledge educator.

Community Service: All undergraduates completed their required five hours of community service by volunteering at local hospitals in their hometowns.

Philanthropy: This is at the cornerstone of the Zeta Psi Fraternity and the Delta Chapter. The undergraduates once again demonstrated their strength as a cohesive group; we once again worked with the local Ronald McDonald House to raise money and in-kind holiday donations for the visiting children and their families.

Service to the Chapter House: Every

member of the Chapter House worked alongside new members to improve either the outside or inside of the Chapter House. I do believe my fellow undergraduates developed a greater appreciation and respect for the house. This will not only benefit the house, but also improve their skill sets as future homeowners.

Academics: It is our goal to maintain or exceed a brotherhood GPA of 3.0, requiring that each member maintain a GPA above a 2.0. The academic officer ensured that undergraduates maintained their grades, and new members attended the mandatory weekly study hours and locations.

Overall, we got through the transition academic year of 2009–2010 without having any major incidents or violations reported to the New Brunswick Police or international fraternity.

House Renovations: Spring And Summer 2010, continued -

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Brunswick Fire and Building Departments.

Our upcoming plans for this winter and summer 2011 include replacing the Bum Room driveway-side arched window and the French doors in the Bum Room and Blue Rooms, renovating more of the sleeping rooms, and purchasing five additional energy-efficient air-conditioning units. During our yearly city inspections, we have been informed by New Brunswick that, next year, we will be required to rebuild the side porch off the Bum Room. We are presently reviewing the cost for this work. This project was not budgeted for in this year's budget,

and unfortunately, we couldn't pull together the resources. In the interim, we tastefully covered up the rear porch with plywood and siding at an unforeseen cost of \$2,800. Another new code violation that we needed to correct was to either put in working order, or seal, the fireplaces in the Mathews Dining Room and the Blue Room. Unfortunately, it made more sense to cover them up. The small bathroom on the second floor, known to many as the "girls' bathroom," will need to be remodeled and upgraded. Additional furniture to complete the Bum Room and the pool/card room will be possible if fundraising is strong.

So, if you are anywhere near New

Brunswick, please stop by, grab some lunch, and see for yourself how the house looks. But always remember that the residents are college kids, and like your children may also do at home, some of them never pick up after themselves, no matter what the alumni board or their own leadership asks of them. On behalf of the chapter and its brothers, these improvement would not have been possible without the help of the members to encourage more undergraduates to live in the house and of the alumni who contribute to the capital and annual campaign.


