Renovations continue at the Delta

We will see this capital campaign through! Hammer and nail, sheetrock and tape, wiring and plumbing, room by room, the chapter house is being strategically and thoughtfully renovated.

Many thanks go to our loyal and new donors to our annual fund. When our elder giving is especially generous, the alumni associa-

tion will have the ability to not only fund our scholarships and send our brothers to both the annual convention and regional LTIs, but also help finance some of our annual and capital renovations.

A much appreciated "round of snaps" goes out

to all of our campaign donors. Your belief in our mission to continue our uninterrupted 159-year history of our Delta Chapter—which stands proudly situated on the hill at the end of College Avenue—has allowed the elders of the alumni association to confidently take on, and then complete, our much-needed capital renovation projects. So to all of our elder donors, we thank you for your continued giving.

During fall 2006, we completely renovated two rooms on the second floor. Both the 19th Hole and the Twilight Zone were badly needed remodeling, which consisted of completely gutting the rooms, installing new hardwood floors, new insulated windows, and updating the electrical wiring and service, as well as installing new light fixtures. On average, it costs approximately \$6,000 to renovate these smaller single-space rooms.

Brothers Arlind Emini, XXXX, and YYYY all enjoyed moving into and hosting parties in the newest rooms in the chapter house. In addition

to this, we ordered two new windows for the Mathews Dining Room

that will be installed in the spring semester. These windows in the dining room have been a constant source of energy loss, and these new windows should much improve both the comfort level on the first

floor but also our increasing utility

bill.

Over winter break, we have begun the remodeling the Eagle's Nest (the old cook's room). This room will also be completely gutted and rebuilt to code with new hardwood floors, new insulated windows, updated electrical, and—of course—a new bathroom. We are anticipating that this renovation will be completed sometime in late February or March, followed by a city inspection allowing for occupancy by brothers either for fall 2007. The cost for this project is estimated to be \$25,000.

If you like what we have been able to do this past fall and what we have scheduled for the spring semester, then you will definitely appreciate our plans for the summer and fall of 2007. Depending upon the availability of our well-managed resources, a new roof the house is long overdue. We are also planning on renovating the Mathews Dining Room—one of the most used rooms in the house—and finally replace the final three windows in that room. Costs for these projects are estimated at \$28,000 and \$40,000, respectively.

Looking further down our time line, during the winter break of 2007-'08, we will begin work on the long-awaited, much-anticipated renovation of the Apartment and review what other projects around the chapter house need to be done—both anticipated and often unanticipated.

We realize that there is much competition for your philanthropic dollars. Rest assured that your investment in your fraternity, the Delta Chapter of Zeta Psi, is being used to train and educate some of the best students at Rutgers University and also to thoughtfully and strategically renovate the highest and best use priorities of the chapter house.

Once again, we thank you for your trust and belief in our goals and mission here at the Delta Chapter and invite you to come back for Homecoming, your class reunion, or anytime you find yourself in or near New Brunswick and need a friendly place to rest or possibly enjoy a beverage with an active.

The active brotherhood achieved a GPA of 2.941 for the fall semester. This placed the Delta ninth among the 21 fraternities on campus. Our new initiates placed third among their peers. The academic performance exceeded both the all-fraternity and all-men's averages.

Special congrats and snaps go to David Yvars, a new initiate, and Tom Deamus, who achieved a 4.0, and Nick Strauss, with a 3.9. In all, 24 brothers achieved a 3.0 or better. Five brothers were within striking distance, with a 2.9 or better, but close only counts in horseshoes. Seven actives made the dean's list.

Twelve actives who lived in the house last semester received room and board scholarships, perhaps proving that you can live in a fun environment and still achieve academically. We are the only chapter of Zeta Psi and the only fraternity at Rutgers to award academic performance with scholarships to in-house brothers.
