Her goal is management, and finally within the Air Traffic Organization (ATO) level at FAA HQ. She is enrolled in a Masters of Science in Aeronautics program at Embry-Riddle Worldwide. Rachel has used Socrates' quote, "An unexamined life is not worth living," as inspiration since high school. She realizes the importance of self-reflection and education in her life. Her undergrad degree is International Relations, and she is pursuing becoming a Foreign Affairs specialist for the FAA, where she would work with the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO). As a single mom of three young children, Rachel is looking out for their futures as well as her own. Being a mom is her most successful accomplishment: she's learned how to handle stress, remain calm under pressure, and how to be patient, kind, and compassionate under duress, gualities that make for a good manager in our workforce. Shanna Crawford won the Jacque Smith Burdette Career in Aviation Scholarship for \$1,500. Shanna has a Bachelor's degree from California State University Long Beach and is working on an additional degree in Commercial Flight at Mt. SAC. In August 2017, the event that changed the course of her life was Hurricane Harvey that hit Houston, TX. At the time she was a flight attendant for United Airlines, flying in and out of that hub, and many of her coworkers living there were impacted. The experience catalyzed her to officially begin working on her dream to become a pilot, and plans to continue giving back to her community like the dedicated pilots working during Harvey. Brianne Forman won a PWC Recruitment Scholarship for \$1,000. Brianne was home-schooled for high school with excellent grades. From learning quilting from her grandmother, then working in a quilt shop, Brianne researched how she could start her own quilting business. She bought a long arm machine and quickly attracted a following with a backlog of several months work. It was hard, she says, but "I did what I set my mind to." She began a local charity making quilted bags for foster children, who often left homes with their belongings in garbage bags. Then she started to teach others from age 8 to 80 - to sew and quilt. This effort was near to her heart, because without her grandmother, she may have ended up in the foster system herself. Then! A year ago, a friend took her flying in a small Cessna. The friend saw her fascination with the radio chatter, and told her, "Well, you could be a controller." Brianne enrolled in flight school right then, and began the journey in aviation. She joined the 99's, and wants to be part of Pilots for Christ. She thought long and hard about leaving her business, but after meeting the right person who arranged a shadow at Minneapolis Tower, she knew what she wanted. She picked a 2year program at Texas State Technical College, and will begin this August. Brianne is on course to earn her Private Pilot's License this March, and then will begin instrument training. Brianne's letters of recommendation confirm that she has what it takes: honor student, devoted, passionate, professional, knowledgeable, and hardworking, Brianne is someone who is contacted often by others for advice and help. When she graduates she'll also have a dispatcher

certificate so she'll have a place in aviation while she waits for the FAA's call. Remember her name when it comes to hire!



Brooke Oligny won a PWC Recruitment Scholarship for \$1,000. Brooke has an Associate's Degree and will graduate the 1-year Air Traffic course at Advanced ATC in GA this November with a Control Tower Operator certificate (CTO). Having a CTO will put her ahead of most applicants. Brooke was introduced to ATC by friends, and found a job as a Remote Pilot Operator for the simulators at Southern CA TRACON. She then realized she was in the right career. She was hired by the FAA, went to the Academy, but did not pass. Brooke did not let this dissuade her - sadly, an average of 40% of new hires don't pass the course. She was disappointed, but not ready to give up - she learned about Advanced ATC and was accepted. Her plan after school is to work for a contract tower for a year, then re-apply to the FAA on a bid for experienced controllers. Our committee was impressed by Brooke's determination and grit! One letter of recommendation described an honest, responsible, trustworthy, capable, and committed young woman; the writer worked with her at a busy restaurant where Brooke became one of the youngest managers in the corporation. She saw that Brooke maintained her calm spirit and professional demeanor even in a fast-paced stressful environment. (Sound familiar?) Another coworker wrote that Brooke was great in the high-pressure restaurant business, and handled crisis situations with quick decisions and skill. She describes her as loyal, a trait valued at work and personally; self-motivated; disciplined and efficient; and a true asset. High praise for a high-achiever! The FAA needs to give her another chance - they missed out on Brooke once - she will be a real asset to our workforce!
