

FOURTH SESSION THIS SUNDAY

“JESUS, ANXIETY, AND US”

SUNDAY, MARCH 23 / WHERE: AUDITORIUM / 9:30-10:15

On Sundays in March, we are gathering in the auditorium between our two services to study some New Testament lessons with something to say about anxiety. Please bring your Bible—but if you forget it, come anyway! Each Sunday, we will read the lesson together. No advance preparation is necessary, but if you would like to read this week’s lesson beforehand, you’ll find it below. *This Bible study is appropriate for adults and teens. See you there!*

Matthew 6:24-34, Do not worry

²⁴ ‘No one can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth. ²⁵ ‘Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? ²⁶ Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? ²⁷ And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? ²⁸ And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, ²⁹ yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. ³⁰ But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? ³¹ Therefore do not worry, saying, “What will we eat?” or “What will we drink?” or “What will we wear?” ³² For it is the Gentiles who strive for all these things; and indeed your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. ³³ But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. ³⁴ ‘So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today’s trouble is enough for today.’”

Dear siblings in Christ,

Lately, I have received what might be what my Quaker spiritual director calls “a leading” from the Holy Spirit. I’m wondering if some members of Holy Comforter might want to join me in forming a team to practice intercessory prayer together—meaning, to pray for our fellow creatures of God, human and non-human, who are in any need, trouble, or danger.

I know many of you pray our parish prayer list daily, weekly, or a few times a week. The names found on that list would be included in our prayers of intercession. We also would bring other people and situations into our time of prayer, like areas around the world in a state of war, concerns in our own country and state; really, any situation where the healing, loving, liberating power of God is particularly needed.

We might gather in person at church, or we might meet on Zoom, depending on what worked best for team members. Either way, God will hear our prayers, and either way, we will pray for our world, our neighbors in need or trouble, and ourselves to be transformed. I can imagine meeting at any interval from weekly to monthly, depending on what suited us both. In between meetings, we could add the previous meeting’s intercessions to our own personal prayers.




RON OSBORNE will present the program for the Men's Breakfast.

Substance abuse and addiction are healthcare issues that are prevalent throughout this country and the North Carolina Piedmont Triad is certainly not immuned from its reach or consequences. Furthermore, substance abuse is an equal opportunity affliction; it refuses to recognize any economic, social, racial or cultural boundaries.

As a result, most of us have experienced the disruptive and oftentimes devastating consequences of substance abuse as it relates to our relationships with immediate or extended family members, friends or business colleagues.

In Alamance County, we are fortunate to have access to Residential Treatment Services which serves as a key healthcare provider in the treatment of addiction and substance abuse. Our speaker, Ron Osborne, is the longtime Executive Director of Residential Treatment Services of Alamance, Inc. ("RTSA"). In addition to almost 40 years of service in various capacities with RTSA, Ron has also served as a Regional Substance Abuse Coordinator with the NC Division of Mental Health.

Ron Osborne will share some of the history of this nonprofit agency and discuss the programs it provides. He will also share some inspiring success stories about clients who have benefitted from the programs and services.

The Story of the Episcopal Farmworker Ministry

SATURDAY, APRIL 5 • 10:30am-4pm

This year’s history day will highlight the remarkable 45-year story of the Episcopal Farmworker Ministry, a cooperative mission supported by the Diocese of East Carolina and the Diocese of North Carolina.

The keynote speaker at the morning session will be Michael Durbin, author of *Finding America’s Farmworkers: Reaching Out in North Carolina*. He has extensively documented the life of the seasonal workers who grow and harvest our crops and has participated in our church’s efforts to minister to these workers. The morning session will also highlight remembrances of the ministry from former staff and board members, volunteers and farmworkers themselves. The afternoon portion of the program will include a walking tour of the Episcopal Farmworker Ministry, El Centro, led by the executive director, Mauricio Chenlo.

Space is limited, and registration is required. The \$20 registration fee covers the cost of lunch, which will be prepared by caterers from the nearby Newton Grove community.



brother in CHRIST needs a kidney transplant

The message below was distributed through our bishop's office. If you are interested in gaining more information, please contact Rhonda first to receive the donor information sheet. Regardless, please keep Damon in prayer. Thank you!

Damon Howard is a member and leader at Chapel of Christ the King, Charlotte. He is living with a Stage 5 kidney failure diagnosis, and while currently on dialysis, needs a kidney transplant for his long-term recovery. Please read the following message from Damon, and if you can, help spread the word:

FROM DAMON:

"Did you know that chronic kidney disease (CKD) affects 1 in 7 people in the United States? Well, unfortunately, I am living with kidney disease [ESRD (End Stage Renal Disease)] and will have to have a kidney transplant at some point in the near future. I am currently on dialysis, but would like to explore/be blessed with the kidney donation option for an alternative treatment to dialysis. My name is Damon Howard, and I am 49 years of age and the single parent to my 9 year-old daughter, Scarlett. We lost her mother, Emili, in April of 2023 to a sudden illness. I have had a couple of living donor options denied by my transplant team for various reasons on the potential donor's end. This is a big and quite audacious ask, I know, because, "Hey, by the way, I need a kidney" is just not something that someone would normally ask for. But I really do need a kidney, and this is one way to try and see if there are any living donors that would consider helping me in my current situation.

My blood type is O+ and I can receive a kidney from a person that is O+ or O- only; however, if you would like to be a donor on my behalf and are of a different blood type, you may also be able to help, as donors may be swapped between recipients. For instance, if someone is A+ and they want to donate to me, but can't, then another person who may be A+ with a potential O donor may be willing to swap a donor, as my A+ donor may be able to donate to them while their O donor may be able to donate to me. So don't let the blood type be a deterrent if called to help.

This is not a decision that everyone is willing to make. I get it and understand, but if you have the hero gene and are called to donate, it would give me life and more time to raise my daughter. If you or anyone that you know would like more information on being a donor, my ears are open, BECAUSE I NEED A HERO! You may contact Atrium Health Carolinas Medical Center at 704-355-6649 (say that you may be a potential donor for Damon Howard) and/or kidneylivingdonor@atriumhealth.org. If anyone would like to speak to me, they may call me at 704-400-9966. If anyone calls Atrium and gets no response, call me and I will try to get a quicker response. God bless you, and thank you for taking the time to read this."

TRIP DATES: OCTOBER 23 – NOVEMBER 3

This fall, the Diocese of North Carolina is planning a pilgrimage to the Holy Land led by the Rev. David Umphlett, who will be joined by Bishop Sam Rodman, Bishop Anne Hodges-Copple and pilgrims from across the diocese. The journey includes time at sites that bring Scripture to life, including Jerusalem, Nazareth, the Jordan River and Bethlehem.

The 12-day trip cost includes accommodations, land transportation, fees, tips and guest speakers. The cost is expected to be \$2,845 per person (double occupancy), and travelers are responsible for their own airfare.
