An Artist To Know More About: Mary Cassatt

Mary Cassatt was a well-known Impressionist in Europe but very few knew of her in America. That would change, however, when she was asked to paint a mural presenting her take on "Modern Woman". It was for the 1893 World's Fair in Chicago. The mural was to be 58-x12 feet in size and would be displayed over the north tympanum over the Gallery of Honor in the Women's Building. So many changes were taking place in women's lives at the time and even more would come with WWI when women moved out of the house and into the war and business arena with men.

Now Mary was a feisty little woman! Born in Philadelphia she moved to Paris to become one of the few women of the French Impressionist group. She became close friends with Degas. Both of them admired and supported each other's work. There were even some hints of a romance but knowing their taciturn personalities, that was never going to happen. Alas they both died bitter and blind.

Mary received the commission from Louisine Havemeyer a big player in the Chicago art world. The women were friends and Mary did her best to see that Mrs. Havemeyer and Mrs. Potter Palmer, also an art player, purchased her friend's paintings for inclusion in the Art Institute of Chicago. Degas was among the many fortunate! When Mary accepted the commission she told her friend that she decided to take it up mainly to annoy Degas! But the truth is she was looking for a new direction. Known for her paintings of mothers and children, this work would be highly allegorical. Her style was moving forward as she saw it.

The work was made up of three panels considered in the context of women's issues of the late-nineteenth century. The two side panels are, "Young Girls Pursing Fame and Arts", "Music and Dancing". These titles were provocative for their times as these women were not presented as muses for men, but as the embodiment of accomplished persons in their own right.

It was however the central panel that caused all the upset. "Entitled Young Women Plucking the Fruits of Knowledge" alludes to the recently acquired access to a college education for women. It was also seen as a direct assault on the biblical story of Adam and Eve from Genesis. In Cassatt's view, girls who sought renown could, through education, fulfill their dreams. Heretic!! The critics went berserk and Degas also raged against the work.

At this time Mary had been very much affected by Japanese prints and critics said that the work appeared flat. Many also did not like her choice of colors. They accused her of using "Impudent greens" and "brutal blues". Mary herself said that effect was to be bright and gay and amusing. Her models were not wearing corsets either but were clad in the clothes of peasant girls. Shocking.

It is the only work that is missing from this Great Exposition. Taken down and stored with the other works it went missing early on and has never been found. Most feared that it has been destroyed. Others hope it is truly only lost. I, along with many others, do not think it was by accident but by design. People are strange and sometimes the more things change the more they stay the same. This was a great work, which was, I believe, lost to politics.

The Watercolor Portrait with Jane **Angelhart**. Those of you that enjoy portraits will really like this one. Jane paints slowly and methodically. She instructs you on how to achieve that luminous quality of skin that sets apart really wonderful portraits. She takes you step by step through choosing a pose, designing your composition and making your initial set up and drawing transfer. Now you may think you've done this a hundred times but watching her you see it with fresh eyes. She helps with color choices and I was particularly intrigued with how she puts transparent color over transparent color to achieve a remarkable glow.

The Secrets of Painting Watercolor Outdoors with Andy Evansen

I have always enjoyed his style of painting. It is clear, clean and reductive. He starts by walking with you outside to help you see what he sees, which is always a problem for me. I tend to be overcome by the world but he shows you how to cut that down to size. He walks you through his equipment, color choices and compositional considerations. If you liked the thrill of painting outdoors don't miss this one!

Watercolor Landscape Class with Charles Reid There is a reason that he was referred to as the master and this DVD shows you why. Mr. Reid even goes through pencil choices! How anybody can paint while talking is an amazement.

What I love about him is his ability to not only see the world but his uncanny art of rearranging it the way it should be! He has a limited palette, which is always crisp and bright. He has a way of adding figures to his paintings that make them seem alive and vibrant. Mr. Reid paints all over the world. This DVD was painted on a seacoast town in England so you almost smell the salt in the air. I know you've seen DVD's of him before, but I will tell you that you learn from everyone!

Water Media en Plein Air with Stephen Quiller I have to say that I was always jealous of his paintings! How does he get those colors and those highlights? Well he'll show you! Now Stephen paints in the landscape that he is familiar with and where he lives. His paintings reveal his love for this place and reflects on all it moods. Most of us are familiar with his color theory but for those of you who are not this will give you quite a lesson. It really works here. But you can see this theory working wherever you have happened to fall in love with. These paintings dance! There's no other word for it.

We have one more in our pipeline and as soon as that comes in we'll add it. It is about negative painting of flowers and I'm sure we'll all love it.
