Who We Are

In 2014, Don Hazel, Peggie Flierl, John Conrad, and Nancy Brainard took over the monitoring of 25 bluebird nest boxes on the Bear Trace golf course. In 2017, after a presentation by a Tennessee Bluebird Society (TBS) representative to local bluebird enthusiasts, the Cumberland County Bluebird Club (CCBC) was established as a local chapter of the TBS. The CCBC is committed to the TBS mission of promoting Eastern bluebird and other native cavity-nesting bird conservation. Today, the CCBC has grown to 180 members, half of whom are active as monitors of 400 nest boxes on 18 bluebird trails at golf courses, parks, and other public areas across Cumberland County.



Did You Know?

The bluebird has been named the official bird by Fairfield Glade, as well as the governments of Crossville, Pleasant Hill, and Cumberland County.
