PRESIDENT'S LETTER



Well folks, here we are, the ides of March as I write this. Weather patterns have been crazy here in the southeast, but nothing like the Midwest. That being said, our temperature shifts must have our feathered friends

a bit confused! Here in eastern Tennessee, our bluebirds are busy at feeders, investigating nest-boxes and doing a lot of wing-waving. I've had some reports of nests actually being built. The tree swallows are back scouring golf courses and meadows for bugs. I hope Mother Nature doesn't play a nasty trick on them!

Our volunteers around the state have been busy repairing, replacing and relocating nest-boxes in preparation for the 2019 season. Several new boxes and trails have been added on the plateau. Multiple general and monitor training meetings have been held across the state in anticipation of another good year!

If you haven't done it yet, now would be a good time to inspect your personal nest-boxes... are the old nests taken out and the boxes clean? Do the roofs or entrance holes need to be repaired or replaced? Is the vegetation around the mounting pole removed to deter predator access?

Do you have a clean water supply available for all our nesters? Do you have an ample, daily supply of food for our feathered friends? All of these things will contribute to another positive nesting season for our birds.

Keeping Raccoons From Getting Too Fat

Golf courses are excellent locations for bluebird nest boxes. Wide open spaces, short grass, and small trees for perching, are just the kind a territory that a bluebird likes. Strategically placed lunch-boxes with tasty morsels are just what pleases a raccoon. Sometimes bluebird nest boxes are just a little too convenient for raccoons.

You already know that placing a nest box on a tree is never a good idea, but a pole with a predator guard is always the best choice. However, we can't always put Kingston or cone guards on a golf course for either aesthetic or cost reasons. One of the golf courses that we monitored in 2018 had 183 bluebird eggs but only 51 birds fledged due to raccoon and rat snake predations. What to do?

We are going to try Noel predator guards this year. The Noel guard was invented by Jim Noel and it keeps, raccoons, hawks, and cats, from being about to reach the eggs or babies. The Noel guard is about five inches of wire mesh, (hardware cloth) that surrounds the hole. I've read that the bluebirds might avoid a box with a Noel guard, but, if the installation of the guard is delayed until after the first eggs are laid, the birds will not abandon their eggs, and accept the guard. Kind of like bad tasting medicine....you might not like it, but it is good for you.


