



Thanks to a grant from Hamilton County Environmental Services, the City of Norwood has available for residents sixty (60) dual chamber compost tumblers valued at \$100 each. The purpose of the grant is to reduce the amount of waste going into the solid waste landfill.

Norwood applicants **MUST** agree to:

1. Complete the application in its entirety below;
2. Participate in a 45-minute educational presentation to assure successful composting;
3. Continue composting for two (2) years (grant cycle);
4. Report estimates of amount composted quarterly via email;
5. NOT sell the compost tumbler.

Successful applicants will be notified via email. Once educational sessions are scheduled, applicants will notify the city of their choice of session. Compost tumblers will be distributed following the sessions and will require simple assembly.

Composting is the natural process of recycling organic matter, such as leaves and food scraps, into a valuable fertilizer that can enrich soil and plants. Anything that grows decomposes eventually; composting simply speeds up the process by providing an ideal environment for bacteria, fungi, and other decomposing organisms (such as worms, sowbugs, and nematodes) to do their work. The resulting decomposed matter, which often ends up looking like fertile garden soil, is called compost. Fondly referred to by farmers as “black gold,” compost is rich in nutrients and can be used for gardening, horticulture, and agriculture.
