## The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)

**Services:** The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) offers an integrated and comprehensive range of services consisting of workforce development activities benefiting employers, job seekers, and communities by providing individuals with barriers to employment the access to employment, education, and training opportunities along with access to support services needed to succeed in the labor market. It improves the quality and labor market relevance of workforce investment, education and economic development efforts to provide individuals with the skills and credentials necessary to secure and advance in employment with family sustaining wages, and to provide employers with the skilled workers needed to succeed in a global economy. All services are locally housed within your local American Job Center.

**Eligibility:** WIOA primarily serves 3 groups of individuals (listed below)

**Low Income Adults:** Adults 18 years old and up who are unemployed or underemployed and need help with training or other assistance to move into a job that will support them and their families.

**Dislocated Workers:** Adults are considered a Dislocated Workers if they have lost their job through no fault of their own and are unlikely to return to the previous industry or occupation usually due to outdated skills, job loss, mass layoff, military move, or other economic conditions. Most individuals must be eligible for or have already exhausted their Unemployment Insurance benefits.

**Low Income Youth:** Assists youth to prepare and develop for post-secondary education, attain educational and/or skills training credentials and help secure employment with career opportunities.

- Funding for basic skills, occupational/vocational training and books
- Basic tools needed for your new job
- Help looking for work
- Referrals for assistance with childcare
- On-the-job training skills available to help you gain new skills
- Help with transportation issues
- Necessary clothing for an interview or new job
- All WIOA services are free!

**Services:** 211 is an easy to remember telephone number that connects callers to information about critical health and human services available in their community. Services are available 24/7 every day of the week. United Way of Northwest Louisiana operates 211 locally and has the capability to serve multilingual individuals and those that are hearing impaired. 211 has a database of resources and services Statewide.

For example, 211 can offer access to the following types of services:

- **Basic Human Needs Resources:** food, clothing, shelter, and financial assistance.
- **Physical and Mental Health Resources:** medical information lines, crisis intervention services, support groups, counseling, drug and alcohol intervention, rehabilitation, health insurance programs, Medicaid and Medicare, maternal health and children's health insurance programs.
- **Employment Support:** unemployment benefits, financial assistance, job training, transportation assistance and education programs.
- **Support for Older Americans and Persons with Disabilities:** home health care, adult day care, congregate meals, respite care, transportation, and homemaker services.
- **Support for Children, Youth and Families:** Quality childcare, after school programs, family resource centers, summer camps and recreation programs, mentoring, tutoring and protective services.

**Eligibility:** Anyone can contact 211 for services in their location.

**Services:** The American Job Center Network provides a comprehensive range of no-cost employment and training services for employers and job seekers. American Job Center Network staff can assist employers in finding and hiring skilled workers. Employers can also connect with local resources to provide training programs for their employees, learn about tax credits for their business, and access additional resources, including labor market information. The American Job Center Network can also assist job seekers in obtaining employment and strengthening their skill set through Workforce Development. Many workshops and training classes, such as interview techniques, are available and job seekers can receive career guidance. Both employers and job seekers have unlimited access to Louisianaworks.net. Employers can post unlimited job listings, search and screen resumés, and contact potential applicants. Job seekers can post resumés, and search and apply for job openings.

The American Job Center also provides Unemployment Insurance assistance to workers who have lost their jobs due to no fault of their own and meet the program's eligibility requirements, Workers' Compensation claims for employers and injured workers, Veterans Services, Wagner-Peyser, and many other programs.

**Eligibility:** Individuals who can utilize services to help them search, find, obtain and retain employment. Those individuals willing to take workshops to better develop their job readiness.

**Services:** Louisiana Workforce Commission Unemployment Insurance (UI) is a program designed to provide temporary financial assistance to workers who are unemployed through no fault of their own and who meet the requirements of the Louisiana Employment Security Law. UI benefits are paid as a matter of past employment and legal entitlement, and not on the basis of need.

**Eligibility:** The law sets qualifying requirements in three main areas: your past wages, your job separation, and ongoing availability and work search requirements. You must meet all of the following qualifying requirements in order to receive benefits.

**Past Wages:** You must have earned enough wages in your base period. The base period is the first four of the last five completed calendar quarters before you filed your claim.

**Reason for separation from your last work:** You must be unemployed or partially unemployed through no fault of your own in order to receive benefits.

**Ongoing availability and work search:** You must be physically able and available to work. You must also be actively seeking work. If you are temporarily laid off and have a definite return-to-work date, your work search requirements may be waived.

**Services:** Job Corps is a no-cost education and career technical training program administered by the U.S. Department of Labor that helps young people ages 16 to 24 improve the quality of their lives through career technical and academic training. The Job Corps program is authorized by Title I-C of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act of 2014. Each Job Corps center offers a selection of 81 career paths including earning a high school diploma while they train for careers in high-demand industries. Participants are housed at the Job Corps center closest to home.

**Eligibility:** To be eligible for Job Corps you must be:

- 16 to 24 years old
- In need of job skills
- Income eligible by meeting on or more condition: receives public assistance, earns poverty-level income, is homeless, is a foster child, or qualifies for free or reduced-price lunch.
- Must be authorized to work in the United States
- Must have suitable childcare arrangements
- May not be eligible if they have certain criminal convictions or require court supervision
- No behavior issues
- No illegal drug use

**Services:** Created in 1965, SCSEP (Project Ayuda-Louisiana) is the nation's oldest program to help low-income, unemployed individuals aged 55+ find work. SCSEP matches eligible older adults with part-time training assignments for non-profit organizations. Participants build skills and self-confidence, while earning a modest income. For most, their SCSEP experience leads to permanent employment.

**Eligibility:** To be eligible for SCSEP, you must be:

- 55 or older
- Unemployed
- Living on a family income of no more than 125% of the federal poverty level (if you're not sure, contact a local SCSEP office)

**Services:** Vocational Rehabilitation, the flagship program of Louisiana Rehabilitation Services, is a one-stop career development program that offers individuals with disabilities a wide range of services designed to provide them with the skills, resources, attitudes, and expectations needed to compete in the interview process, get the job, keep the job, and develop a lifetime career.

LRS' Vocational Rehabilitation Program provides comprehensive rehabilitation services that go far beyond those found in routine job training programs. This frequently includes work evaluation and job readiness services; assessment for and provision of assistive technology, such as customized computer interfaces for persons with physical or sensory disabilities; job counseling services, and medical and therapeutic services.

The Vocational Rehabilitation Program increases revenues for all levels of government and decreases the burden of income maintenance programs. As individuals with disabilities achieve gainful employment and independence, they become taxpaying citizens and more than "pay back" the costs of the program.

**Eligibility:** Eligibility is determined upon an individual with a disability benefiting from vocational rehabilitation services in terms of achieving employment, including supported employment. Therefore, applications for services are accepted at the time an individual with a disability reaches or nears the minimum age of legal employability.

To be eligible for vocational rehabilitation services, the individual must have a physical or mental disability which for the individual constitutes or results in a substantial impediment to employment; and be able to benefit from vocational rehabilitation services in terms of employment; and require vocational rehabilitation services to prepare for, enter, engage in, or retain gainful employment.

**Services:** The Jobs for Veterans State Grants Program (JVSG) helps veterans find good jobs by providing employment services at American Job Centers and other locations through funding for Disabled Veterans Outreach Program (DVOP) specialists and Local Veterans Employment Representative (LVER) staff. DVOPs and LVERs are state employees who provide employment services to the United States, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, U.S. Virgin Islands and Guam.

DVOP specialists provide intensive services to meet the employment needs of disabled veterans and other eligible veterans, with the maximum emphasis directed toward serving those who are economically or educationally disadvantaged, including homeless veterans, and veterans with barriers to employment. LVER conduct outreach to employers and engage in advocacy efforts with hiring executives to increase employment opportunities for veterans and encourage the hiring of veterans.

**Eligibility:** JVSG program funds support services to veterans, including special disabled veterans, disabled veterans, economically or educationally disadvantaged veterans, and veterans with other barriers to employment (especially homeless veterans).

**Services:** The Trade Adjustment Assistance program provides services to workers who lose their jobs or whose hours of work and wages are reduced because of international competition. TAA services, which are offered at no cost, may include training awards, job search and relocation allowances, income support and health coverage tax credits.

**Eligibility:** Before a worker can qualify for TAA, a petition for TAA and/or NAFTA must be filed to cover the workers of a particular company. Once the company receives certification from the U.S. Department of Labor's Office of Trade Adjustment Assistance (OTAA), workers can apply for services and benefits.

## Report Child Abuse

**Services:** The Child Welfare Division works to meet the needs of Louisiana's most vulnerable citizens. The Child Welfare division works to protect children against abuse and/or neglect, find permanent homes for Louisiana's foster children and to educate the public on Safe Sleep and Louisiana's Safe Haven Law. This Division maintains a State Repository and a State Central Registry of all reports of child abuse and/or neglect. Other services include: Becoming a Foster Parent and Adoption

Child Abuse and Neglect Clearances for employment/volunteer purposes at a child care facility or family day care home licensed in Louisiana are requested through the Louisiana Department of Education at <https://www.louisianabelieves.com/early-childhood/early-childhood-programs/criminal-background-checks>.

The Louisiana Child Abuse and Neglect Clearance System (CANS) is the mechanism to request other types of searches. This system can be accessed at <https://dcfscans.dcf.la.gov/>. Some clearances require a \$25.00 fee.

**Eligibility:** Child Protection Services is available by reports made via: Child Abuse Hotline 1-855-4LA-KIDS (1-855-452-5437).

Foster Parenting qualifications include minimum age of 21, any marital status, must be financially stable, good physical, emotional and mental health, have adequate space in home, pass state and federal criminal clearances, attend 21 hours of pre-service training, and participate in home study process

**Services:** Child Support is an obligation of a parent to provide emotional, financial, and medical support for a child or children. DCFS offers parent locator and paternity establishment services, as well as assistance to establish and enforce child support orders and collection and distribution of child support payments.

The Economic Stability (ES) section of DCFS assists families with needed assistance programs, including Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP – formerly Food Stamps), Louisiana Combined Application Project (LACAP), Kinship Care Subsidy Program (KCSP), and the Family Independence Temporary Assistance Program (FITAP).

The Louisiana TANF programs are administered and supervised by the Louisiana Department of Children and Family Services. Needy families with, or expecting children, will be provided financial assistance and/or other services to include education, job preparation, work and support services under Louisiana's Family Independence Temporary Assistance Program (FITAP), Kinship Care Subsidy Program (KCSP), and Strategies to Empower People (STEP) Program .



**Eligibility:** Child Support Enforcement services is available to any parent or person responsible for a child who needs our assistance. Anyone who receives FITAP, KCSP, or is referred to DCFS by Medicaid automatically receives child support enforcement services.

Eligibility for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP – formerly Food Stamps). To get benefits through regular SNAP, households must meet certain tests, including resource and income tests. Eligible households can receive food assistance through regular SNAP or through the Louisiana Combined Application Project (LaCAP).

For FITAP eligibility a dependent child must be: Under 18 years of age, or 18 years of age and enrolled in a secondary school or its equivalent. For KCSP eligibility, a dependent child must be under 18 years of age. Unborn children are not eligible for FITAP. A pregnant woman who has completed the fifth month of pregnancy may be certified if otherwise eligible (unborn is not eligible). To qualify for cash assistance, a child must reside in the home of a parent or other qualified relative who is responsible for the day-to-day care of the child.

Strategies to Empower People (STEP) Program – Work-eligible members of cash assistance programs are required to participate in STEP activities.

**Supported Employment Program** is a program designed to provide job placement and retention services to persons with disabilities. A referral from the Louisiana Workforce Commission (LWC)/ Louisiana Rehabilitation Services (LRS) is necessary to enter this program. The services provided through this program are free to individuals who are referred for services. This program is funded through the LWC Rehabilitation Service and paid for by the State of Louisiana.

**Open and Outreach Placement Programs** is designed to serve clients with barriers to employment through work readiness training, self-directed job search and individualized case management. No referral is necessary to receive these services, only the desire to gain employment. The services are free to anyone who needs assistance. This program is funded by the Community Foundation of North Louisiana.

**Good Support Program** is a referral-based program through the Caddo Parish Juvenile Court that helps aid non-custodial parents. It provides job readiness training, self-directed job search and individualized case management, with the goal of obtaining employment, empowerment and providing successful financial support of their families. This program is funded by the Caddo Parish Juvenile Court, and it is free to participants.

**Reentry Program** provides case management, discharge planning and job readiness training services to inmates housed at Caddo Correctional Center. The goal is to assist with successful reentry back into the community. The Reentry Program is funded by the Caddo Parish Sheriff's Office.

**Ex-Offender Placement** is designed to serve clients, who have a criminal record, with work readiness training, self-directed job search and individualized case management in Caddo, Bossier, Webster or DeSoto parishes. These direct services are free to anyone who has a criminal record who seeks our assistance. This program is funded by the Community Foundation of North Louisiana.

**EXIT-318 Program** is a referral-based program through the Department of Corrections that serves high risk, high need ex-offenders with individualized case management and wrap-around services in Caddo, Bossier and Ouachita parishes. As part of this collective impact project, each partner is charged with providing different services to address specific needs of ex-offenders. The State of Louisiana Department of Corrections provides funding for this program, and all the services are provided free to participants with the goal to help them not recidivate.

**Good Futures** is a program to improve educational and employment opportunities for at-risk youth, ages 16-19, to achieve lasting financial stability and self-sufficiency. For students who have not graduated high school, we partner with Bossier Parish Community College (BPCC) to provide HiSET classes, as well the opportunity to receive a nationally recognized retail certification. This program is funded by Bossier Parish Community College and is offered at no cost to its participants.

**Good Transitions** is a referral-based program through the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) that provides free services to youth ages 14-21 in foster care. The program's goal is to develop skills and supportive services necessary for the youth to become independent and to transition into adulthood and assume personal responsibility for their daily care. This program is funded by the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS).

**SYNAR** is aimed at decreasing youth access to tobacco products. The program is overseen by the Department of Health and contracted through the Northwest Louisiana Human Service District and Northeast Delta Human Services Authority with a goal to educate tobacco merchants on the laws on the sale of tobacco products to underage youth within Northwest and Northeast Louisiana.

- Persons with disabilities who cannot use buses without wheelchair lifts or other accommodations. These persons are eligible for paratransit service if accessible buses are not available on the fixed-route on which they want to travel.

**Services:** Core services include applying for a Social Security number check on your earnings record, applying for Social Security benefits and Social Security Income, hospital insurance protection, provide extra help with Medicare prescription drug costs, and enroll for medical insurance.

**Eligibility:** Social Security Disability Insurance is for individuals who have a disability or are a child or widow/widower of a disabled individual who meets medical criteria. These benefits must have had quarters earned in the 10-years prior to the disability onset.

Supplemental Security Income is payable to verified disabled individuals and is not based on prior work history. Individuals who are 65 or older, adults who are disabled or blind, children who are disabled or blind. Must have limited resources and meet the living arrangement requirements. Must be a US citizen or meet certain categories of residency.

Social Security Retirement Benefits provides replacement income for qualified retirees and their families. Apply four months before you want your Social Security retirement benefits to start.

Social Security Survivors benefits are paid to widows, widowers, and dependents of eligible workers. This benefit is particularly important for young families with children.

**How to Apply:** Contact their local Social Security Administration office to begin the application process.

**Services:** The YWCA is on a mission to eliminate racism and empower women by providing vital programs for the northwest Louisiana community. Located at the YWCA Women's Resource Center in Shreveport, these programs include trauma counseling, victim assistance, teen empowerment, economic empowerment, parenting and racial justice. The YWCA also operates a resale shop Fab Finds, to raise funds to support its programs and operations.

**LEAD** (Leadership, Empowerment and Development) .designed to empower pre-teen and teen girls by focusing on three areas:

**Leadership** – Building leadership skills that support self-respect, self-control and positive decision-making skills.

**Empowerment** – Challenging girls to explore their world and current issues through engaged and creative learning.

**Development** – Guiding and developing character and confidence that will encourage and promote effective communication skills, positive goal setting, and a strong foundation for a successful adulthood.

## **Nurturing Parenting Program**

provides family-centered trauma-informed classes designed to build nurturing parenting skills as an alternative to abusive and neglecting parenting and child-rearing practices.

*Session topics include:* stress and anger management, positive discipline, understanding feelings, building self-worth in children, and communicating with respect. A Teen Moms parenting program is also offered through the Nurturing Parenting curriculum for all teen girls who have children or who are expecting a child. YWCA staff are trained Nurturing Parenting facilitators and classes are free and available in-person or virtually.

## **Restart Program**

The Restart Program offers assistance designed to empower women impacted economically by the Covid-19 pandemic. The program helps women prepare for and create strategies for enhancing their work-related skills to re-enter the job market or secure higher paying jobs. Program sessions include a personalized assessment and a plan to facilitate a smooth transition back into the workforce. Services also include instructions on completing online applications, networking, agency referrals, resume writing, social media recruiting, and comprehensive career guidance. Virtual and in-person

## Trauma Counseling Services

Professional individual counseling is available for women and teen girls who are or have been victims of crime and may be experiencing trauma. Licensed professional counselors who are trauma trained and have EMDR training provide these services free of charge. Sessions are available in-person or virtually.

## Senior Women Victim Advocacy

Supportive services are provided to women 62 and older who have been victims of crime. Services include emotional support, information and referral, legal and court system advocacy, linkage with local resources for seniors, assistance with personal needs and access to services. Educational programs are also available focusing on personal safety, crime prevention, elder abuse, and local resources and services that are available.

**Racial Justice Program** The YWCA offers Dialogue on Race groups on an ongoing basis as part of its Racial Justice Program. Dialogue on Race is a 6 week educational program bringing together a diverse group of up to 15 persons led by trained facilitators utilizing a curriculum of Dialogue on Race Louisiana. Groups meet virtually or in-person and the fee for the program is \$25 for the 6 week series.
