

AT LAST!!! Here is our long-awaited first newsletter! There is much to report, but first a brief look at where we have been.

The Calusa Land Trust was formed in 1976. After acquiring two significant parcels of land near Pine Island, the Trust became relatively inactive for many years. In March of 1989, St. James City resident Rick Moore began the effort to get it going again.

By January of 1990, we had grown to over 50 members and had our first annual meeting. We elected a Board of Directors and approved revised Articles of Incorporation and new By-laws. Since then, in the span of just a few months, we have been able to fulfill one of our most treasured goals: to acquire environmentally sensitive land for preservation purposes. Our membership is now over 150 and we are continuing to grow; with a response such as this, who knows what can happen?

BIG JIM CREEK LAND ACQUISITION!!!

As most of you know, the option-to-buy that Calusa Land Trust received was on about 325 acres surrounding Big Jim Creek near Bokeelia. This is a great accomplishment and one for which we should all be proud. Funds for the first of the three tracts have been raised and were paid out in June; and we have just received the deed. The land now belongs to Calusa Land Trust and can never be developed!

The second and third tracts must be purchased no later than February 1991 and August 1991 respectively, for almost \$7,000 each. If we do not raise the needed funds by those dates, we will lose the chance to purchase this land at the exceptionally good price in our option contract. Our main fundraising efforts will focus on the "Buy an Acre for an Eagle" campaign which was so successful for the first tract. However, the fundraising committee needs other ideas and help mailing out notices. Please keep this in mind if you have any time to spare.

BIG JIM CREEK CELEBRATION PLANS

In order to celebrate this land purchase and continue to generate interest in the project, several events have been planned. The first will involve letting the media know what has happened and perhaps even taking a television crew out onto the creek for a firsthand look at the preserve. Watch for articles in the papers, announcements on the radio or a story on Channel 26 or 11. The publicity committee is now being formed to arrange the details - call Rick (283-1206) if you can help.

Second, a canoe trip for all the members and other interested parties is scheduled for Saturday, September 8. Bring a picnic lunch and when we reach a peaceful spot where there are wading birds to enjoy, we can all have lunch. If you would like to come, whether or not you have a canoe, call Ed Chapin at 283-1167 or Debi Holden at 283-0989. They will be coordinating everything and will soon know the best time for us to begin. If the weather is poor on that day, we will simply go on Sunday. Any questions, just call Ed or Debi.

Then, in mid-October, there will be a gala outdoor picnic, with the media there to hopefully publicize the purchase and help spearhead a campaign for the second tract. It will be at Matlacha Park, perhaps with volley-ball and other activities. Rick will present the special "I Bought an Acre for an Eagle" T-shirts, beautifully handpainted by a Matlacha artist, to all those who ordered one and have not yet received theirs. Copies of the deed will also be handed out to all those who bought an "Acre for an Eagle". Final arrangements for this event will be sent out in the fall newsletter or in a short notice. At any rate, we will keep you posted.

CALUSA LAND TRUST ORIGINS

Lifetime Memberships Awarded to Original Founders

In 1976, the Calusa Land Trust was created by a small group of Pine Islanders who wanted to preserve part of a mangrove island in its natural state forever. They knew about various types of land trusts but learned that no such organization existed in this area. After much research and even a trip to Pennsylvania — to meet with other land trusts organizers from around the nation, they finally sent off applications to Tallahassee and Washington for approval.

It all started when Fred and Diane Johnson bought a mangrove island with some high ground, on Charlotte Harbor near Bokeelia. They wanted to live there with other people who shared their interests in alternative sources of energy and land preservation. Soon, Bill Spikowski and Alison Ackerman joined their efforts and together they embarked upon many adventures, not the least of which was the creation of Calusa Land Trust. When the application was approved, they immediately donated their entire interest in about 40 acres of the island to the Trust. So began the organization to which we all belong.

Fred and Diane have since moved away from Bokeelia but the Board of Directors recently voted to award them lifetime memberships as a small way of saying a big thank you for all their foresight and hard work.
