

August 1 -2, 2019: Pan American Health Organization/World Health Organization (PAHO/WHO) consultation meeting: Towards Elimination of Cervical Cancer in the Americas meeting

Director PDG Karl Diekman participated as a representative of HEWRAG/Rotary at a two-day consultation meeting to review and comment on the Draft: Global Strategy Towards Elimination of Cervical Cancer as a Public Health Problem. At the conclusion of this consultation and the other regional consultations, a final version of the strategy will be prepared for consideration by the Seventy-third World Health Assembly through the Executive Board at its 146th session.



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The strategy calls for a comprehensive population-based approach to put all countries on the path to the elimination of cervical cancer within the century. The plan covers the period 2020-2030. The proposed targets for 2030 are:

- 90% of girls fully vaccinated with HPV vaccine by15 years of age
- 70% of women screened with high-precision tests at 35 and 45 years of age
- 90% of women identified with cervical disease receive treatment and care

Today, Rotarians are working on cervical cancer prevention projects around the globe, and this plan once adopted can guide them to the most effective projects for the region in which they are implementing projects.

September 2019: Rotary Community Corps - Smile Express Dental Checkup program

Advisory Board Members Dr. Rita Kalra, Rotary Club of Chandigarh Midtown and Dr. Sanjay Kalra, Rotary Club of Chandigarh Midtown, organised and coordinated the year-long Rotary Community Corps - Smile Express Dental Checkup program that completed the Dental Checkup and treatment of inmates of most of the orphanages of the Tri-City.

A total of twenty camps were organized for 13 organizations where in 908 children were examined and 67 fillings, 359 scaling, and 7 extractions were done by the Smile Express team of doctors and dental assistants. Eight oral health talks were delivered during the span of one year, and a total of 560 free toothbrushes and pastes were distributed to these children.

October 19, 2019: District 5160 Fall Seminar, Redding, CA, USA

Director PDG Laura Young of Anderson Rotary and PDG Pam Gray of Paradise Rotary, both in District 5160 in central Northern California, were delighted when DG Tina Akins invited a special keynote speaker to the District 5160 annual Fall Seminar in Redding, California. Rotarian PDG Michael Juric of neighboring District 5130, located to the west on the coast of Northern California, is an accomplished educator, facilitator, and goal-setting consultant.

Michael's District was hit hard by the Tubbs Fire in Northern California during October 2017. At the time, the Tubbs Fire was the most destructive wildfire in California history. Director Will Files is helping to coordinate the 36th Annual Rotary Health Fair in Homer, Alaska, USA sponsored by Homer Kachemak Bay Rotary Club in cooperation with South Peninsula Hospital. More than 1,000 folks from the Greater Homer Area attend to learn about many health issues.

The Homer Kachemak Bay Rotary Club has sponsored a local health fair since 1984. In the year 2000, Rotarians from Homer invited Russian Rotarians to observe the Homer Health Fair, and the Russians went back to Russia and started their own health fairs with help from the Homer Rotarians. The Russians were awarded a Rotary 3H Grant to set up Health Centers throughout Siberia and Far East Russia.

These events helped to create a World Health Fairs Fellowship that became the World Health Fairs Rotarian Action Group that reorganized, expanded, and was renamed in 2014 to become the Health Education and Wellness Rotarian Action Group (HEWRAG).

The Role of Cadre in Cervical Cancer Prevention Projects

One of the roles of The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisors is to provide technical expertise and support to Rotarians planning and implementing The Rotary Foundation

NEW TESTS THIS YEAR!

Global Grant projects around the world. The Cadre also ensure stewardship of the grant funds, assist the Trustees, and advise Rotarians.

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In the past four years (2014-2018) 38 Global Grant Cervical Cancer Prevention Projects were approved and implemented worldwide. Fifty percent of these projects involved vaccinating girls and women with the HPV vaccine. Five projects were above USD100,000, and these were reviewed and evaluated by the Cadre members. Each of these five grants received a pre-approval review of the application by a Cadre member from the Disease Prevention and Treatment or Maternal and Child Health team, and the grants also received an interim monitor site visit during the project's implementation. Together, these projects received nearly US\$500,000 from The Rotary Foundation World Fund, and their total project budgets exceeded \$1.1 million dollars.

These Grants are:

GG1526053: Sri Lanka - To provide early detection medical equipment, services, and testing in order to reduce the high morbidity and mortality rates associated with breast and cervical cancer in Sri Lanka. (\$248,857)

GG1527246: Papua New Guinea - To provide Human Papilloma Virus vaccinations to 28,000 girls, as well as an education and awareness campaign in Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea. (\$329,500)

GG1746153: Ecuador – To provide medical equipment and a Vocational Training Team to train gynaecologists to identify and treat cervical cancer using the visual inspection with acetic acid (VIA) method and paediatricians to treat and prevent hip dysplasia in infants in Cuenca, Ecuador. (\$177,580)

GG1747581: Belarus - To provide gynaecological and colposcope equipment as well as training in Italy for three medical staff members to the Republican Research Centre for Radiation Medicine and Human Health in order to prevent and diagnose cervical cancer. (\$113,506)

Senegal – To provide cervical cancer screening, prevention, and treatment services to rural areas of Senegal. (\$266,103)

The other Global Grants involved Cervical Cancer Screening and Education, Provision of medical equipment and training, and Vocational Training Teams to train local health experts in the management of cervical cancer.

Childhood TB: Red Alert



Tuberculosis (TB) has haunted humankind since its discovery more than a century ago. Although commendable advancements have been made in diagnosis as well as treatment, especially in the last few decades, the healthcare burden of this disease world- wide is immense. The World Health Organization has declared TB as a global health emergency. On this background, the problem of childhood TB is more dicey than adult TB because of lack of awareness; myriads of nonspecific symptoms; paucity of diagnostic tools; cost of therapy; ignorance, superstitions, and taboos in communities. So it is a high time that we, NGOs, governmental. agencies, corporations, and philanthropic individuals work collectively on the goal of TB elimination.



As many as 900,000 people with the disease are not getting proper treatment.

TB continues to have a significant impact on healthcare worldwide, despite new diagnostic tools, new treatment modalities, and awareness programmes. It is estimated that approximately 33% of the world population harbors TB infection. Without treatment, they risk developing drug-resistance tuberculosis and infecting others. Emergence of Multidrug Resistance TB (MDR-TB) and Extensively Drug Resistant TB (XDR-TB) have further made the situation more gloomy.

TB Burden

These figures issue a '**Red Alert**' to all of us concerned about the health of children. Governments, as a part of their responsibilities, are doing a lot to create awareness about TB and offer low cost but effective diagnostic tools and treatment modalities for communities, both urban and rural (e.g. Nikshay Program of the government of India).

But as members of a responsible and conscious voluntary service organization, what can we do?

Here are few things Rotarians can do:

- 1. Through individual clubs or Districts or regions, we can have collective efforts of NGOs, governments, corporations, pharmaceuticals and local pharmacies, nutrition support groups and philanthropic individuals.
- 2. Create a large scale 'advocacy'_for childhood TB.
- Organize diagnostic/check up camps at various urban, rural, and tribal levels where one can use services of medical health professionals and diagnostic tools like miniature radiology, 'Gene expert,' etc.
- 4. Subsidize diagnostic tests as well as treatment cost.
- 5. Help local public health departments in notification of TB and delivering free anti TB medicines (whenever available through TB program like NIKSHAY of the Government of India)
- 6. Create awareness about Health Hygiene Nutrition Vaccination. Remove social stigmas and taboos through focused campaigns and periodic check ups.
- 7. Instill systems for TB surveys and surveillance.
- 8. Fund community research.
- 9. Create Global Grant projects around the nucleus of childhood TB.
- 10. Make TB a permanent signature project, particularly where childhood TB density is very high. *(continued on the next page)*

Developing a Comprehensive Health Education Curriculum for School Children in India

In India, more than 66,000 children between 5 and 14 years of age die every year from diarrheal and other infectious diseases compared to about 28 such deaths in a year in the United States. The majority of Indian children grow up with unhealthy lifestyle habits

including poor hygiene and sanitation. unhealthy diet, high use of tobacco, lack of exercise, high risk of injuries, and mental/ emotional health issues. When these children grow up with such poor lifestyle health habits, the prevalence of non-communicable diseases, e.g. diabetes, heart disease, and cancer, also increases rapidly. As a result, India is undergoing an epidemic of such diseases resulting in 68 years as the average life expectancy of an Indian.

Rahul teaching in a school in the slums of Chandigarh We can prevent most of these deaths in India by educating Indian youth about how to adopt healthy lifestyles. This will only happen when Health Education is treated with the same priority as reading, writing, and arithmetic and when comprehensive Health Education is mandatory in all schools and at every grade level. The curriculum should educate students about good hygiene and sanitation, healthy diet, exercise, and clean sources of water.

As there was no curriculum or dedicated books about comprehensive health education in India, we have developed a curriculum complete with student workbooks and a teacher's manual for Class 6 and 7.

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The curriculum, which covers Physical, Social, and Mental Health, is interactive and engaging. The books have been printed in English and translated into Hindi. The printing of books and their translation was funded by a District Grant to the Rotary Club of Canon City, Colorado.

We are planning to conduct a one year long pilot program in a few schools in Delhi to evaluate the effectiveness of the Grade 6 curriculum and the challenges one might face in implementing it. Research indicates that in order to change health habits, students must be taught between 40-50 hours of Health Education over the academic year. We will provide the books and conduct teacher training. We hope to start in 2020.

In the future, we plan to write the books for all the remaining K-12 grades and to influence policy makers across India to make Health

Education mandatory in every school and at every grade level. This will help the youth become healthy and productive members of society so that they can realize their full potential.

We are looking for a Rotary partner who is passionate about this initiative and is well networked with schools.

1. Proposal for a cervical cancer screening and precancer treatment intervention James Croswell Chair International Service Committee The Rotary Club of Rosebank District 9400, Johannesburg South Africa

The Issue

Cervical cancer is one of the most common causes of cancer death among women in Africa. The Rotary Club of Rosebank has entered into a MOU with Wits Health Consortium (a local public health leader) and its partner NGO, Right to Care, to support cervical cancer screening and precancer treatment in Diepsloot Township and Cosmo City, both north of central Johannesburg.

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The Goal

It is the intention to augment the existing Right to Care and Wits Health facility with an additional mobile clinic to provide cervical precancer treatment for women identified through Pap smear screening currently being undertaken by Right to Care.

The current algorithm of diagnosis has the disadvantage of a significant "leakage" of patients at each stage. Particularly during the waiting period for LLETZ¹ procedure after final diagnosis. This leakage has been found to be significant and a potential waste of time and resources.

The Challenge

Currently, the team from Right to Care and the Wits Clinical HIV Research Unit screen approximately **2900 women per year** in the Diepsloot area. Of these, approximately **300 will be found to have cervical precancer** requiring surgical intervention. Data collected by Right to Care indicate that prompt intervention will save the Public Health System approximately R114 000 (\$7500), per person treated, over a period of 30 years. **Compared to the proposed ongoing budget, this represents a 10-fold multiplier of cost to saving.**

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¹ Large loop excision of the transformation zone, also called loop electrosurgical excision procedure (LEEP), this is the most common way of removing cervical tissue for examination and treating precancerous changes of the cervix. The abnormal tissue is removed using a thin wire loop that is heated electrically.



This would largely be achieved by keeping potential cancer patients out of hospital in future. This saves on future costs as well as making beds available for other patients. We believe that this alone is a persuasive driver for sustainability.

The Concept

Rosebank Rotary is seeking support for the **provision of a fully equipped treatment clinic**, Treatment will be in the form of loop excision (LLETZ) or cryotherapy. The constraint at present is the treatment of those identified with precancer, and the objective is to create a balance between the numbers identified and the numbers who are treated.

The mobile treatment clinic proposed is directed at that worthy objective.

Budget

For the purposes of informing potential partners and donors, a preliminary budget of R3.6 million (ZAR) (US\$253,000) has been established. The intention is to make application to The Rotary Foundation (TRF) for a Global Grant,

Partnerships

Assuming a notional mix of donation and grant funding, the indication is that approximately \$175,000 is needed independent of The Rotary Foundation. The Rotary Club of Rosebank will lead as the Host Club, and we hope a club from elsewhere in the world will be the International Partner and other clubs will help with sponsoring.

The proposed project will help to close the gap in screening coverage in Gauteng, SA by expanding free services to underserved women. By linking women with abnormal cervical screening tests to conveniently located mobile treatment clinics, we will prevent progression of precancer to invasive cervical cancer in ~300 women each year.

2. Preventing Cervical Cancer in District 9110, Nigeria

Cervical cancer is the second most common cancer in women, after breast cancer. It is caused almost exclusively by infection with the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV). World Health Organisation cervical cancer statistics show that every day in Nigeria 40 women are diagnosed with Cervical Cancer, and 26 women die of the disease. That translates to one cervical cancer death in Nigeria every 55 minutes. Usually slow, painful, and agonising deaths. Virtually all are preventable deaths.

It is well known that vaccinating girls between the ages of 10 and 14 years will protect against the HPV infection. Rotary International District 9110 Nigeria plans to build a generation of women completely immune to Cervical Cancer.

Even though we have an estimated national population of about 4 million in the target age bracket, we intend to start small with 10,000 girls in the area covered by District 9110 (Lagos and Ogun states) with the hope of vaccinating more girls in the future, raising awareness, and sensitizing the government to partner/takeover the project along

the way. We hope to show this is possible and influence government policy to make HPV vaccination part of its standard immunization programme.

A dose of the vaccine costs about \$30 in Nigeria. Each girl will require 2 doses, spaced about 6 months apart. We will therefore need 20,000 doses. This translates to a cost of \$600,000 to meet our goals.

We ask other Rotary Districts to help support this laudable project by contributing a portion of your DDF. We invite your questions and hope for positive responses to this sincere request.

3. Give Children Hope for Life!: *Medical Equipment for the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy, Ukraine Seeking Partner(s)*

In pre-Chernobyl Ukraine, instances of childhood cancer were few and far between. Unfortunately, in our post-Chernobyl society, that is no longer the case. The Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy, Ukraine was opened in May 1993 in response to the rapid increase in the number of children being diagnosed with oncologic and related blood diseases in the wake of the Chernobyl disaster. Currently, over 600 children under the age of 18 with tumors and/or suspected blood disease are examined each year in the Cherkasy region alone. *(continued on the next page)*



The Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy treats nearly 250 children with cancer and/or cancer related diseases each year, with 35 to 40 new children being diagnosed with cancer each year.

The Center currently has 25 infusion pumps that are well over 10 years old and are no longer reliable enough to assure accurate administration of the aggressive chemotherapy drugs often required to effectively treat children at the Center. The Center also has two syringe pumps manufactured in 2004 and 22 infusion volumetric pumps, most of which were manufactured in 2005. These pumps are no longer reliable enough to assure accurate administration of the aggressive chemotherapy drugs to the children requiring them.

Seeing firsthand the appalling condition of the equipment available to treat children at the Center, Dr. Paliychuk, working with her Rotary Club, initiated a Global Grant to obtain badly needed medical equipment to provide more efficient and effective medical treatment to children suffering from cancer and cancer related diseases. Lack of proper medical equipment prevents physicians at the Center from accurately administering the aggressive chemotherapy drugs required by some treatment protocols, which prevents giving a chance for recovery to a large number of extremely sick children each year.

Working with the Rotary Club of Miami-Brickell, **Global Grant GG1750546 has been approved by The Rotary Foundation**, and upon raising a little more than an additional US\$8,000 in funding, the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy, Ukraine will be the recipient of nearly US\$55,000 in much needed medical treatment equipment and supplies.
