Sometimes, we think that we don't have much, or that we're not that good at anything. This story shows that all we need to do is make ourselves (what we have and what we can do) available, and Jesus will do what He is so good at doing. Little is much when God is in it!

Ask God how He wants you to work with Him to make a difference in this world. Kids can make a difference! And with God, kids can make a big difference!

So far, we've learned about three kids in the Bible:

- <u>Samuel</u>: Who, though he was young, loved and served God. God spoke to him and used him to help his people. Samuel became one of Israel's best prophets.
- <u>David</u>: Who, though he was young, said, "I'll fight Goliath the giant!" God used him to not only beat the giant, but to lead his people. David became one of Israel's best kings.
- <u>Josiah</u>: Who, though he was a young king, led his people well. He listened to wise people in his life, and obeyed God's Word. Josiah was one of Israel's better kings.

In this worksheet, we're going to learn about two more kids in



the Bible, kids who didn't wait until they were older and bigger to make a difference. They made a difference when they were young, just like you can!

A YOUNG GIRL WHO MADE A DIFFERENCE

This story is found in the Bible, in 2 Kings chapter 5. At this time, Israel's biggest enemy was a country called Aram. Sometimes, Aram's army would come into Israel to hurt people and take their things. One time, the army took a young Jewish girl from her family, and took her back to Aram. In Aram, she served Naaman's family. Naaman was a commander in Aram's army, an important man. Though this young girl no doubt missed her family, she served Naaman's family well.

How would you have felt if you were this young girl, taken from your country and your family, and forced to serve another family?

How easy or hard would it have been for you to serve this family with a smile on your face?

One day, Naaman got leprosy (lep-roh-see), a sickness that eventually leads to death. No doubt, Naaman's family were very sad that he was sick. Naaman needed a miracle! Thankfully, this young Jewish girl knew of a miracle worker. His name was Elisha, God's prophet who lived in Israel. She told Naaman about Elisha, and Naaman went to see Elisha, hoping for a miracle. In the end, God – through His prophet, Elisha – healed Naaman. Naaman no longer had leprosy!

Read <u>2 Kings 5:1-14</u>. vhen read



Naaman would not have known about God's power to heal

unless this young girl told him. This young girl had good news, and she shared it with someone who needed it. The best news we can tell others is that Jesus wants to forgive their sins, give them a happy life, and be with them forever.

A YOUNG BOY WHO MADE A DIFFERENCE

One day, thousands of people came to see and hear Jesus. All day, Jesus taught them God's truth. At the end of the day, Jesus knew that all these people were hungry, but Jesus didn't have enough money to buy food for all these people. A young

boy with five small loaves of bread and two small fish offered what he had to Jesus to help feed everyone. This much food could feed a few people, but not thousands! So Jesus, God's Son, took the loaves and fishes, prayed, and then had His followers serve everyone. In the end, everyone ate and no one was hungry,



and more food was left over than Jesus had started with. They counted how many people were served. There were about 5000 men, plus women and children. Thousands! And Jesus fed them all with what this young boy gave.
