Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For Yours is the Kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever. Amen.”

11 THE LORD'S PRAYER 

In Worksheet #9, you learned the first half of what we call “The Lord's Prayer.” It's a prayer that Jesus taught His followers to pray. Remember that if we put our trust in God (our heavenly Father) He hears our prayers. And He desires to give good gifts to His children.

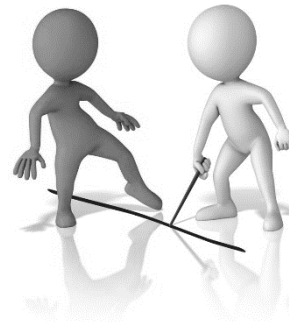
MEMORIZE

Matthew 6:12 – “Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.”

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To “trespass” is “to cross the line”: to think, say, or do something that goes against what God says. Another word for trespass is “sin,” something we've already learned about.

When we sin against someone, we hurt our relationship with them. And when we do, we should say “sorry” to them, and ask them to forgive us. Forgiving means that we no longer hold what they did to us against them.



It's the same with God. When we sin, we hurt our relationship with Him. So, we should say to God, “I'm sorry. I have sinned against you. Please forgive me.” And here's the good news: If we mean what we say, God promises to always forgive us, and to heal the relationship we have with Him.

Jesus continues...

MEMORIZE

Matthew 6:13a – “Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.”

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Temptation is when someone or something tries to convince us to do something that isn't good for us, something that would not please God. To be tempted is not a sin, but to say "yes" and give in to that temptation is sin.

When we pray to God, "Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil," we are praying that God will protect us from temptation. Often God does protect us from temptation. Sometimes though, He allows us to be tempted. And when we are tempted, the Bible promises:

MEMORIZE

1 Corinthians 10:13b – “He (God) will not allow the temptation to be more than you can stand. When you are tempted, He will show you a way out so that you can endure.”

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Remember that when God allow temptation to come our way, He promises that the strength He gives us is stronger than the temptation to sin. Every day, pray that God will give you a desire to please Him, and take away the desire to disobey Him.

Jesus finishes this incredible prayer:

MEMORIZE

Matthew 6:13b – “For Yours is the Kingdom and the power and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.”

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Just as this prayer started out by giving glory to God ("hallowed be Your name") it finishes doing the same. In this moment, we are saying, "God, You're the King, You're in charge. You are mighty, the most powerful. You alone deserve my worship, the worship of the whole world."

**HOW
GREAT
IS OUR

Sometimes when we pray, we think more about us than we do about God. We pray things like, "God, help me. God, I need this." Though it's okay to ask God for what we need, and to tell Him how we feel, don't forget that, when you pray, to think more about God that about you. After all, He gives us life, He loves us, and He has the power to do so much more than we ask of Him. It's all about Him!

The prayer ends with the word, "Amen." This means "let it be so." When someone else prays out loud, and we say "Amen" when they do, we say "We agree with what was prayed. God, may it be so."
