

**MEMORIZE**

Psalm 46:1-2,7 – “God is our refuge and strength, always ready to help in times of trouble. So, we will not fear when earthquakes come and the mountains crumble into the sea. ... The LORD of Heaven’s Armies is here among us. The God of Israel is our fortress.”

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God surrounds His people with His army of angels. And, if it is best for us and if it glorifies Him, He will protect us.

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**GOD’S NAMES 3.0**



In Worksheet #13, you learned some more of God’s names. Remember, God’s personal name is “Yahweh” (yah-way), seen as “LORD” in the Bible. Here are some other names for God

we’ve learned about already:

- Elohim: God-the-Creator
- El Roi: God-Who-Sees-Us
- El Shaddai: God-Almighty
- Yahweh Yireh: God-Who-Provides



**REVIEW**

Psalm 9:10a – “Those who know Your (God’s) name trust in You.”

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Let’s discover some more of God’s names:

**ADONAI: MASTER**

Long, long ago, a prophet named Isaiah (eye-zay-uh) had a vision. In this vision, Isaiah writes: “I saw the Lord (“Adonai”). He was sitting on a lofty (high) throne, and the train of His robe filled the Temple. Attending Him were mighty seraphim (angels), each having six wings. With two wings they covered their faces, with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. They were calling out to each other, “Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of Heaven’s Armies! The whole earth is filled with His glory!” Their voices shook



the Temple to its foundations, and the entire building was filled with smoke” (Isaiah 6:1-4).

**MEMORIZE**

**Psalm 8:1 – “O LORD, our Lord, Your majestic name fills the earth. Your glory is higher than the heavens.”**

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When Isaiah saw this vision, he thought he was going to die. That’s how awesome God was, and how unworthy he knew he was to be in God’s presence. Isaiah saw the Lord, “Adonai” (a-doh-nye). “Adonai” means “lord” or “master.” This means that God is in charge, and those who put their trust in Him are His servants. He tells us what to do, what to say, and how to live. Remember, God loves us and knows what’s best for us.

It’s not enough to just call God your “lord,” your life should show that He is your master, and that you are His servant. When Jesus – God’s Son – walked the earth, sometimes people called Him “lord,” but their lives didn’t show it. They lived how they wanted to, and not how God wanted them to live. Listen to what Jesus says to these people:

**MEMORIZE**

**Matthew 7:21 – “Not everyone who calls out to Me, “Lord! Lord!” will enter the Kingdom of Heaven. Only those who actually do the will of My Father in heaven will enter.”**

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Real faith in God always leads to obedience! Thus, you don’t just call God your “lord,” but you live your life His way too.

**YAHWEH SABAOth: GOD-OF-ANGEL-ARMIES**

In the vision that Isaiah had, the angels called out to each other, “Holy, holy, holy is the *LORD of Heaven’s Armies!*” Here, we learn yet another name for God: “Yahweh Sabaoth” (sa-bay-oth). Our English Bibles translate these Hebrew words as “LORD of Hosts,” “LORD Almighty,” “GOD-of-Angel-Armies,” etc. This name for God talks about His rule over every other power (visible or invisible) on earth, and everywhere.



Elisha (ee-ly-sha), another prophet, knew that God was the LORD of Heaven’s Armies! One time, Israel’s enemies surrounded the city where Elisha was staying. Elisha’s servant was filled with fear when he saw the large army surrounding the city, and asked Elisha what they should do. “Don’t be

afraid,” Elisha responded, “For there are more on our side than on theirs.”

Elisha’s servant didn’t understand. The city was not that large and had very few soldiers. Could Elisha not count, or did he know something that no one else knew?



“Then Elisha prayed, “O LORD, open his eyes and let him see!” The LORD opened the young man’s eyes, and when he looked up, he saw that the hillside around Elisha was filled with horses and chariots of fire” (2 Kings 6:17). Isn’t

that incredible! God opened up the eyes of Elisha’s servant, so he could see God’s heavenly armies surrounding His people. And, in the end, God and His army of angels defeated the enemy army that surrounded the city.
