

REFLECTION FROM FR. RALPH

This weekend, as it is every year, we prepare for the observance of Holy Week. Holy Week, which begins with Palm Sunday, consists of the Holy Thursday Mass in the evening, instituting the Eucharist, the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and the priesthood of the Catholic Church; continuing with the Friday memorial observance of the Passion of the Lord also known as Good Friday; followed by the Holy Saturday Vigil Mass in the evening and the Masses of Easter Sunday.

Throughout the year, whether reading the bible personally or listening to the Word of God at Mass, we are provided with references to specific moments and events of Salvation History. Yet, the observances we make beginning with Thursday evening thru Easter Sunday provide us with the opportunity to experience the essential and most significant moment in all of redemption, the Paschal Mystery; that is, the passion death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, and we do this through participation in what is known as the Sacred Paschal Triduum.

Now, in the sense of making the “journey of faith,” we make a pilgrimage throughout the course of our days in this life as disciples of Jesus Christ according to the truths of divine revelation and the teachings of the Catholic Church among the people of God; while at the same time, we can make this journey as we consider the Great plan of Salvation referring to specific and essential events that took place throughout Salvation History, such as the crossing of the Red Sea. For us, as Catholics, the crossing of the Red Sea as a sign of liberation and freedom, and it is the prefiguration of baptism; and even now, as the baptized of the Church, we continue our pilgrimage to the promise land of heaven.

But the observance we make this year during Holy Week, beginning with Holy Thursday thru Easter Sunday, being over and above all Solemnities, Feasts and memorials celebrated at any and all Masses of the Church, is the very apex of all that we consider throughout the Liturgical Year. So, this Sunday, Palm Sunday, we begin with greeting Jesus as He enters Jerusalem and makes his way to the Temple to both reestablish religious worship for the salvation of the entire human family and fulfill what was promised and prefigured in the Old Testament—ultimately, all that was intended from the beginning according to the will of the Father.

As you recall, the Gospels tells us that there were large crowds gathered to greet Jesus as He made His way into Jerusalem. Some people actually knew Him personally; some people personally enjoyed the effects of His miracles; some people actually witnessed His miracles; some people were deeply moved by His words of wisdom and consolation, His ability to speak to what people experienced every day, especially in regard to the difficulties of life that made the mystery of the Israelite faith seemingly inapplicable. Jesus also spoke to the hypocrisy, condescending and dismissive attitude of their spiritual leaders, He exhibited a fidelity to truth and virtue, a profound understanding of the history and faith of His people, and a philosophical and spiritual insight that they never had seen before, all of which, in no way was disconnected from His personal authenticity.

But we must keep in mind that some people merely heard of Jesus and that He was coming to Jerusalem, and they were there out of curiosity, and, just as there were large crowds that greeted Jesus, there were large crowds present as He made His way to Calvary. Some people were in tears; some people, after all that Jesus said and did, were amazed at what was taking place; some people felt betrayed by their religious leaders; some people thought that He was receiving the proper treatment of a false prophet; and some people thought that He deserved what He underwent because He had failed to be or did not turn out to be the messiah that they hoped for, and some were influenced into fear either by the religious leaders or the Romans; and finally, frankly speaking, some were glad to see him go so that they could fulfill God’s will for the children of Israel according to their own will and design.

Over the centuries since, many of the spiritual masters (both men and women) and theologians speculate that most of the people who greeted Jesus were the same people that lined the streets as He made His way to Calvary, and many of them may have been those who, though just a few days earlier eager to greet Jesus, no longer favored the mission and work that He came to accomplish.

For us however, we must strive to be like those who followed Jesus before He got to Jerusalem, listened carefully to His preaching in the Temple, accompanied Him on the road to Calvary, and continued to take the path Jesus set before them, leading them into the world to witness the Gospel He gave them. For us today, it’s the same journey, the same path and the same Gospel that Jesus gave them, and this Holy Week can prove to be both a stark and rich inspiration to continue on the journey that we strove to make during the preceding weeks of Lent this year.

As we begin with this weekend to enter the mystery of our redemption, let us keep in mind what Pope St. Leo the Great pointed out to us: *“The faithful should therefore enter into themselves and make a true judgment on their attitudes of mind and heart. If they find some store of love’s fruit in their hearts, they must not doubt God’s presence within them. If they would increase their capacity to receive so great a guest, they should practice greater generosity in doing good, with persevering charity.”* Liturgy of the Hours, Vol. 2, Fourth Week of Lent, From a Sermon by St. Leo the Great, Pope, Catholic Book Publishing Co., NY, 1976, p. 295-296.

BLESSING OF EASTER FOOD - HOLY SATURDAY - APRIL 3rd - IN THE CHURCH - 11:30AM - 12:30PM WHAT IS THE BLESSING OF EASTER FOOD?

The blessing of the Easter foods is a tradition dear to the hearts of every Polish family. Being deeply religious, they are grateful to God for all His gifts of both nature and grace. As a token of this gratitude, they have the food of their table sanctified with the hope that spring, the season of the Resurrection, will also be blessed by God's goodness and mercy.

Baskets containing a sampling of Easter foods are brought to church to be blessed on Holy Saturday. The basket is traditionally lined with a white linen or lace napkin and decorated with sprigs of boxwood (**bukszpan**), the typical Easter evergreen. The blessed foods and their symbolic meanings are:

- ◆ **Egg (pisanka)** - Symbol of life and rebirth.
- ◆ **Sausage (kielbasa) or ham** - All types of pork were forbidden under the dietary code of the Old Testament (Leviticus 11.7). The coming of Christ was seen as exceeding the old law and the dietary items now became acceptable (Mark 7.19).
- ◆ **Paschal lamb** - It can be made of butter, cake or even plaster. It is the centerpiece of the meal. Christ is seen as the "Lamb of God."
- ◆ **Horseradish/pepper** - Symbolize the bitter herbs of the Passover and the Exodus.
- ◆ **Salt** - Joins bread in Polish tradition as a sign of hospitality.
- ◆ **Bread** - Christ has been called "the Bread of Life."
- ◆ **Vinegar** - Symbolizes the gall given to Christ at the crucifixion.
- ◆ **Wine** - Symbolizes the blood of sacrifice spilled by Christ at the crucifixion.


