


Join ADSW and ADSNY for the Virtual Program Astaire, Rogers, and the Art Deco Dream





Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers embodied the Art Deco aesthetic and sensibility translated into dance. They offered perfect escapism during the Great Depression through their sleek dancing on elegant black and white sets. Fred's white tie and tails and Ginger's elegant gowns were the Moderne aesthetic in fashion in the fantastical wonderland their movies created. These were usually urban movies in which even the floors gleamed. They were, in a word, modern, as the oxymoron of the cool and the romantic makes Art Deco the perfect setting for their dances.

Michael Lasser is a writer, speaker, and critic.
