




Author Jim Linz will discuss the role French architect and designer Edgard Sforzina played in popularizing Art Deco in the United States following the 1925 Paris Exposition of the Decorative Arts. This program is a collaboration between Loudoun County Public Library and the Art Deco Society of Washington.

Sforzina immigrated to the United States in 1923, 2 years before the Paris Exposition. Following the Exposition, Sforzina designed the furniture In the 1928 Exhibition of Modern American Decorative Arts in New York. He also designed several Art Moderne interiors, including millinery shops in Boston and Baltimore and an apartment for George Gershwin.

These early accomplishments led to his role in the design of the interiors of Cincinnati Union Terminal, including the executive offices.







The Art Deco Society's 16-banner exposition on Edgard Sforzina will be on display in the Rust Library beginning September 1st.

The Rust Library is located near historic downtown Leesburg at 380 Old Waterford Rd NW, Leesburg, VA 20176.

**A New Deal for American Theatre:** 

**The WPA's Federal Theatre Project** 

**September 18, 2025** 



When the WPA was established in May of 1935, its initial focus was manual labor projects like the construction of roads, bridges, airports, and schools. But in August of 1935 the WPA expanded to include work relief for Americans engaged in the arts with the

formation of Federal Project Number One. The most creative and innovative of the Federal One components, but also the most controversial, was the Federal Theatre Project (FTP), which provided work for actors, directors, playwrights, designers, stage technicians and other workers in the theatre field. The project also brought stage performances to Americans who had never experienced live theatre. This lecture will examine the wide range of productions presented by the FTP and the charges that led to its early dissolution.

#### **About the Presenter:**

Kathleen Murphy Skolnik teaches art and architectural history at Roosevelt University in Chicago and classes on architecture and design of the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century at the Newberry Library, also in Chicago. She is the co-author of *The Art Deco Murals of Hildreth Meière* and a contributor to *Art Deco Chicago: Designing Modern America*. From 2008 to 2016 she was the editor of the Chicago Art Deco Society Magazine and currently serves on the Board of the International Hildreth Meière Association and the Advisory Board of the Art Deco Society of New York.





#### About the Norfolk & Western

The N&W 611 was built in 1950 by N&W engineers at the company's East End facility in Roanoke, Virginia. It was categorized under the "J" class and was one of only 14 ever built. Today, she is the only surviving member of that class. As part of this special route, it will be pulling several vintage coaches for an experience that was common when train travel was still the major form of long-haul transportation in the United States.

#### Jeanne Lanvin exhibition:

**'Haute Couture Heritage'** 

Savannah College of Art & Design

The first exhibition in the U.S. dedicated to Jeanne Lanvin (b. 1867, Paris; d. 1946, Le Vésinet, France), Haute Couture Heritage showcases more than 60 garments, illustrations, and photographs spanning the height of her practice. Drawing from the collections of Fondation Azzedine Alaïa and Lanvin Heritage, the exhibition thoughtfully reflects on the couturier's vast knowledge of silhouettes, fabric variations, and cutting techniques to highlight rich nuances in color, texture, transparency, and embellishment.

The virtuosity of Lanvin's craftsmanship lies in her eye for details and expertise in appliqué work, inlays, topstitching, and embroidery. The pure, refined shapes of her signature robes de style, as well as the evocative graphic patterns of her evening coats and capes, harmonize with the delicacy and subtleties of the Art Deco movement. Lanvin's distinctive ability to craft elegance with simplicity remains the hallmark of her house and enduring legacy.

Jeanne Lanvin: Haute Couture Heritage is curated by Gaël Mamine of Fondation Azzedine Alaïa in collaboration with Lanvin Archives, Parodi Costume Collection, and SCAD FASH creative director Rafael Gomes.



Frida: Beyond the Myth

Virginia Museum of Fine Arts

Through September 28, 2025





Twentieth-century Mexican artist Frida Kahlo continues to fascinate us with her arresting gaze, signature fashion, and trailblazing legacy. At the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, this singular artist and her extraordinary works are the focus of *Frida*: *Beyond the Myth*.

The exhibition showcases many of the artist's most important paintings and drawings from the beginning of her career in 1926 until her death in 1954. More than 60 works of art in a variety of media, many rarely seen outside of Mexico, include self-portraits, still lifes, and compositions from her imagination. Also on view are photographs of Kahlo taken by many of those closest to her, including internationally renowned photographers Lola Álvarez Bravo, Imogen Cunningham, Julien Levy, Dora Maar, and Nickolas Muray.

Kahlo began painting during her recovery from a traumatic bus accident that she barely survived and that forever changed her life. This exhibition closely examines the inimitable style and complexity of Kahlo's paintings. Her life was a seemingly open book but was also paradoxically enigmatic, as she depicted life-altering events with unflinching truth yet masterfully employed symbolism and continually reinvented herself in iconic self-portraits. Her jewel-like paintings are among the most beautiful, memorable, and haunting images of the 20th century.

This presentation of paintings, drawings, prints, and photographs offers a rare opportunity to explore the art of Frida Kahlo, whose strength, vulnerability, and sensuality still compel us today. Discover how she crafted her image to reflect her Mexican pride, express gender fluidity, and adorn her injured body. Learn how Kahlo painted to transcend pain and physical disability. And celebrate how she ultimately triumphed to achieve her own immortality, becoming a national treasure in her native Mexico and receiving posthumous acclaim around the world.

# Cycle Thru! The Art of the Bike

Cincinnati Art Museum

Gear up to see a 1901 Wolff-American Ice Bicycle engineered to traverse a frozen course, a seafoam green 1950s Huffy Radiobike designed so riders could cruise to their tunes of choice, and Pee-wee Herman's customized 1953 Schwinn DX Cruiser starring in Tim

Burton's 1985 film, Pee-wee's Big Adventure. These are just a few of the highlights waiting for you to discover in Cycle Thru! The Art of the Bike, an exhibition featuring the bicycle as a way to explore intersections of history, popular culture, design, and modern and contemporary art.

Spanning the 1860s to today, over 20 bicycles from The Bicycle Museum of America in New Bremen, Ohio, illustrate the design innovations—both functional and aesthetic—marking the vehicle's development. Paired with contemporary art by Jarbas Lopes, Bas Jan Ader, and Bari Kumar—as well as selections from the Cincinnati Art Museum's collections of photographs, fashion, posters and paintings—visitors can pedal thru and ponder the role of the bicycle as an evolving icon, a connector of cultures, and a vehicle for autonomy and freedom to all, regardless of age, gender, and geography.
