



THE BLIND FOLK & THE ELEPHANT: *AN ANCIENT PARABLE*

INTERNATIONAL COOPERATIVE ASSOCIATION (ICA) PRINCIPLE 5: EDUCATION, TRAINING, & INFORMATION

Educere: "to lead out"


Both senses are included in our English word: *Education*


























The Wisconsin Farmers Union Kamp Kenwood trains generations of young cooperators in Chippewa Falls.

My mom came to Wisconsin from the North Dakota Farmers Union to run the Wisconsin Farmers Union (WFU) camp and then to be the WFU education director. The older we got, the more detail we learned. We formed and ran a candy co-op and elected a governing board. [Later, I] lived in a housing coop through college, and served on the Willy Street Grocery Co-op board of directors.

Today, my son Sean attends camp – he was the camp co-op treasurer one year and loved it. Two summers ago, he paid a visit to CHS (the country's largest co-op) on a Farmers Union youth trip, and he was amazed at what a successful business it was.


