

Art Gallery of Ontario

Art Gallery of Ontario (renovated by Torontonian Frank Geary of Guggenheim fame) has gift shop and washrooms. Closed on Mondays.



Casa Loma

(In Spanish - Hill House) A Gothic Revival style mansion in Toronto that bankrupted the builder



Chinatown

Toronto's Chinatown is one of the largest in North America but there are larger Chinese shopping areas in the outskirts of the city.



CN Tower

Over 550 m high. Highest in world until Burj Khalifa was built in Dubai. Observation level is at 346 m.

College of Art

This Tabletop building is part of the largest art, design, and media university in Canada.



Crawford Lake

This afternoon includes a walk around a beautiful meromictic lake and a visit to Iroquoian longhouses.





Fort York

Fort York is a 19th century fortress. It was the site of a battle in the War of 1812.



Galleria Brookfield Place

Spanish architect Calatrava's Atrium of Light preserves the past by including historical buildings.



Hockey Hall of Fame

Home of the Stanley Cup and the greatest collection of hockey memorabilia in the world. Not visited but there is an excellent photo op just outside. Many students like to visit the gift shop.



Kariya Park

Japanese style garden in honor of Mississsuaga's twin city relationship with Kariya, Japan.



Weather permitting, and if no weddings are scheduled, students will have lunch in this park.

Kensington Market

A walkable bohemian neighbourhood with independent shops, art spaces and trendy bars.



Mississauga Civic Centre Tour

AFTER FREE TIME IN SQUARE ONE. Meet outside near MOXIE'S at ENTRANCE 7 at 4:00 pm

- 1. The Civic Centre architecture is based on a "futuristic farm" (the clock tower is the windmill, the main building on the top-right corner is the farmhouse, the cylindrical council chamber is the silo, and the pentagonal building on the bottom right is the barn)
- 2. Celebration Square The 9,000-square metre Square has



a reflecting pool which becomes an ice rink in winter.

3. Great Hall

4. Great Stair . Many people are surprised to learn that this dramatic marble and granite staircase has only 79 steps.



Path Underground

Over 30 km of underground shops, restaurants, services and entertainment.



Professor's Lake

A 26 ha spring fed lake in Brampton. It is tested daily for safety and is often closed following a heavy rainfall.



Queen West District

Includes vintage and fashionable clothing boutiques, art galleries, and film and music production studios.



Queen's Park

Queen's Park is the site of the Ontario Legislative building.

(There are public washrooms here.)



Ripley's Aquarium

The Toronto aquarium has over 20,000 aquatic animals and the longest underwater viewing tunnel in North America.



Royal Bank Plaza

The glass for this building contains 2,500 ounces of gold and keeps the building cool in summer and warm in winter.



Royal Ontario Museum

One of the largest museums in North America has undergone renovations – the Michael Lee-Chin Crystal.



Scotiabank Plaza

One of the most impressive skyscrapers in the Business District.



Sunnyside Pool and Park

Very popular beach and swimming pool on the shores of Lake Ontario.





Toronto City Hall

Toronto City Hall was designed by Finnish architect Viljo Revell.



Toronto Eaton Centre

Groups generally meet under the Canada Geese.



Toronto Dominion Centre

The first bank towers in Toronto. Now include an Inuit Museum and bronze cow sculptures in the TD courtyard.



Toronto Islands

An island refuge facing Canada's largest city. Spectacular view of the city from the ferry.
