I have been aware my entire adult life of the acronym WWJD. People would wear it on a wristband or a pin on their chest. It was a good message. It meant "What Would Jesus Do?"

That is a good motto to live by. We are to be a reflection of Christ to all those around us, so our actions and words need to be a testimony of His life in us. He is our model for living. When we ask ourselves in any situation "What would Jesus Do?" It helps us to speak the right words and make the right choices.

In the last several years, I came across an even better acronym. It is DWJD. It means, "Do What Jesus Did."

We may ask <u>what</u> to do, but it is not effective unless we do it. So, what would Jesus do if he were still here on the earth? The same as he did 2,000 years ago. He taught the people around him about his Heavenly Father and the Kingdom of Heaven. He healed the sick, cast out demons, opened blind eyes and deaf ears, and discipled his followers.

Do What Jesus Did! Can you believe God for it? Or, will he say to you, **"Oh you of little** *faith"* as he did to his disciples in the boat during the storm?

Instead of just thinking about "What Would Jesus Do," go one step further by faith and "Do What Jesus Did." In so doing, you will glorify the Father through the glory of his Son. It will be most pleasing to him.
