RE: Serrano Apartments

Dear Mr. Schwartz:

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) is committed to ensuring that all Arlington residents, regardless of race, have access to safe, decent, and affordable housing. On April 23, 2021, the Arlington Branch NAACP President and Housing Committee Co-Chair participated in a walk-through of the Serrano Apartment buildings and six apartments organized by Serrano Tenant Association leadership. We have been working with Serrano tenants since 2019 to support their attempts to address ongoing health and safety issues. We observed severe problems that suggest a culture of deferred maintenance and underinvestment in the property during our walk-through. Attached is a report from our walk-through, and we have included a high-level summary of the issues below.

- 1. Pest Control All of the residents we spoke with in both Serrano buildings said severe mice/rat infestations exist in their units. The infestations have forced some residents to move all food out of their kitchens and significantly impacted their ability to cook and store food safely, placing additional burdens on these low-income tenants.
- 2. Physical Deterioration Some units showed large cracks in the walls, light features and switches that did not work, and rust and broken glass features on the balconies.
- 3. HVAC Issues In the apartments we visited, the inside of most HVAC units were filthy with old filters and years of accumulated dust and muck. We also observed significant water damage on the floors beneath them.
- 4. Lack of Care In some units where maintenance was conducted, the "fixes" demonstrated a lack of care (i.e., foam to fill in mouse holes jutting out from walls and cupboards, screeching plumbing in bathrooms, and sloppy craftsmanship).

Arlington County Taxpayers have invested significant amounts of money through Federal, commonwealth, and county programs to build and preserve affordable housing. The lack of decent living conditions we observed should not be acceptable either to AHC, Inc. or Arlington County. While AHC, Inc. has made some progress addressing the most egregious issues, these units do not reflect our values or priorities for low-income residents in Arlington.

In addition to joining us for a walk-through of the Serrano Apartments, we request that the County Manager:

- 1. Ensure that the county has at least one dedicated staff member to work directly with tenants in Committed Affordable (CAF) units to address their issues and concerns.
- 2. Take immediate and significant steps to ensure Arlington's non-profit partner's repair and rehabilitate all CAF units in disrepair, especially at the Serrano Apartments.
- 3. Make all policy and management changes necessary to ensure that all CAF residents have safe, decent, and affordable homes now and in the future.



Worldwide, rats and mice spread over 35 diseases. These diseases can be spread to humans directly, through handling of rodents, through contact with rodent feces, urine, or saliva, or through rodent bites. Diseases carried by rodents can also be spread to humans indirectly, through ticks, mites or fleas that have fed on an infected rodent.

This web page offers helpful suggestions on rodent control during and after a rodent infestation. The primary strategy for preventing human exposure to rodent diseases is effective rodent control in and around the home. This is achieved by eliminating any food sources, sealing even the smallest entries into homes, and successfully trapping rodents in and around the home.
