NAACP Arlington to Hold Press Conference in Arlington

Family members, civil rights leaders, and concerned community members are gathering on Tuesday July 2, 2024, at 10am to demand greater police accountability and transparency in response to the ongoing fatal overdose crisis among Arlington's community members.

The NAACP Arlington Branch is supporting the family of Tori Thompson at a celebration of life event entitled "Truth for Tori." The Thompson family and concerned community members will stand together for this important community action. This call to action is in response to the failure of Arlington County Police Department to properly notify the family after the tragic loss of Tori Thompson's life. The subsequent unsatisfactory treatment of the family and the rising number of people dying from opioid overdose in our community in 2023 is alarming and concerns are growing. We are gathering to call for police reform and accountability in death investigations and to show support that Tori mattered. The event is free and open to the public.
