York Minster, has been at the center of Christianity in the north of England since the 7th century and today remains a church rooted in the daily offering of worship. Every aspect of this ancient building, from the handcrafted stone through to an unrivalled collection of medieval stained glass. We invite you to discover this sacred place, which has attracted people from across the globe for more than 1000 years. Follow in the footsteps of Roman soldiers and discover the stories of the people whose lives have been influenced by York Minster. See the best views in York after climbing the 275 steps up the Central Tower leading you to the highest point in the city. Young visitors can uncover secrets and surprises. In free discovery trails and make a new friend with the Minster's own Monkey, Monty.

The Shambles named in general terms for the maze of twisting, narrow lanes which make York so charming. At its heart is the lane called the Shambles, arguably the best preserved medieval street in the world. It was mentioned in the Doomsday Book of William the Conqueror in 1086. Many of the buildings on the street today date back to the late fourteenth and fifteenth century (around 1350-1475). in sections of the Shambles it is possible to touch both sides of the street with your arms outstretched. The architecture still appears so quaint and had a very practical purpose. The overhanging timber-framed fronts of the buildings are deliberately close-set so as to give shelter to the 'wattle and daub'

York Theatre Royal dates back to 1744. The theatre currently seats 750 people. Whilst the theatre is traditionally proscenium it was reconfigured for a season in 2011 to offer productions in-the-round. The theatre puts on many of its own productions, as well as hosting touring companies, including the famous Pilot Theatre, a national touring company which often co-produces its work with the theatre. Additionally the main stage and studio are regularly used by local amateur dramatic and operatic societies. The theatre in 2016 undertook a £6million redevelopment, with a new roof, an extended and re-modelled front of house area, a refurbished and redecorated main auditorium and with major improvements to access and environmental impact.

The River Ouse V ikings arrived in York by river as well back in the 9th Century. They were famed for their seamanship and navigation skills as well as being excellent ship builders. The River Ouse may have delivered us the Vikings but in later years it also delivered various commodities to the riverside warehouses that used to line the banks of the river; many have now been commodified into apartments. York was once the third largest inland port in the country behind London and Bristol. Wool was exported from the city to Northern Europe and goods like coal, butter and olive oil were all delivered into the city by barge. Until the end of the 20th century, the Ouse was used the 'hustle-and-bustle' of the city. Yorkboat operates cruises throughout the year for all the family. by barges to carry freight but now it offers a lovely escape from every day chores.










Ganton Golf Club. in the top 30 of Europe's Championship courses, is nestled in the Vale of Pickering, near the coastal resort of Scarborough. The architecture of the course is a tribute to some most famous names in golf. Vardon, Ray, Braid, Taylor, Colt and MacKenzie have all contributed to make Ganton a unique challenge. Ganton has hosted the Ryder Cup, the Walker Cup, the Curtis Cup, the Amateur Championship. Sir Michael Bonnallack, former Amateur Champion and past Captain of the R&A, summed up Ganton well. "The journey from tee to green on every hole is one of the most enjoyable golfing examinations that a player is ever likely to experience".

Moortown Golf Club was formed in 1909 and the present clubhouse was opened in 1915 and by the mid-1920s existed without major alterations for over sixty years. Moortown's popularity among professionals grew through hosting the Yorkshire Evening News Professional Tournament, then the Ryder Cup in 1929 which attracted the attention of international media, establishing Moortown's world- wide reputation as a Championship golf course designed by Dr Alister MacKenzie. The founders invited Dr MacKenzie to visit the site which he did in October 1908, coming to the conclusion that the land would make a fine course and offering to aid the founders in its design.

Sand Moor Golf Club: Although the club officially opened in 1926, it was five years earlier that Henry Barran began to lay out a course, originally of six holes, four to the south of Alwoodley Lane. The major influence in the creation of the course was Yorkshire born Dr. Alister Mackenzie, who chaired the first AGM on March 7th, 1925. He had previously designed the other two major golf courses in the area. The club officially opened on March 20th 1926. Members were invited to buy a debenture to finance the construction of the original clubhouse, which was then situated close to where Moortown's clubhouse is currently located. Changes to the course too place in the late 1960's with advice from Henry Cotton.

The Alwoodley Golf Club was founded in 1907. The course was laid out that year on Wigton Moor, part of the Harewood estate, on the outskirts to the north of Leeds. One of the founders was a local GP called Dr Alister MacKenzie, who would also design the course. Alwoodley was the first course that MacKenzie created and he would go on to become one of the world's most famous architects. The original MacKenzie layout remains at Alwoodley to this day. The course has now been lengthened to over 6,900 yards from the championship tees. The club have been careful to retain the heathland and moorland characteristics of the course, as well as the MacKenzie hallmarks of variety, natural beauty and intriguing strategy.
