Notes from the Burnet (Texas) Bulletin

BURNET BULLETIN-"NEWS of the PEOPLE"

Starting with the August 16, 1984 Bulletin, Lucile O'Donnell gives a very vivid and exciting picture of their family of seven attending the Guthrie Clan reunion in Scotland. The seven are Tex, Clare and sons Reb, and Bruce Guthrie from Arizona. Jean Guthrie Ryon, San Angelo, TX., Frances O'Donnell and Lucile O'Donnell, Burnet, TX.

She gives some historic facts as a background and a very good reason for Guthries to be proud of their heritage and Clan. Many historians of Angus give their opinion that the Guthrie family is the oldest in the country. Scotland is a beautiful country and the Scottish people are just as gracious and beautiful.

Her description of their tour is similar to the report made by her nephew Tex Guthrie. She gives a more detailed description of the Isle of Mull in her August 23, report. She found that much literature had been written with this island as its setting.

When Boswell and Johnson had their runaway success in 'Journey to the Western Islands', many came to this peaceful, yet intriguing background for their writings.

The poet Keats wrote much of his poetry from this Island, as well as Wordsworth. In 1833 Sir Walter Scott and later Robert Louis Stevenson had put the Isle of Muil firmly on the literary map.

The August 30th installment is the report of the 20 or more Guthries gathering at Castle Torosay. The Castle is one of only two Victorian Gothic Castles in Western Scotland.

David Guthrie James and his wife were gracious hosts. They gave the group an interesting tour of the Castle and the beautiful formal gardens.

There were Guthries from Maple Ridge, British Columbia, some from Michigan, Scotland, Arizona and Texas.

David Guthrie James and his wife extended an invitation to the Guthrie Clan to have Torosay Castle as a gathering site for any future Guthrie Clan reunions, as long as he lives at Torosay Castle. He has been trying to repair and restore Torosay Castle to its original beauty. The Castle has stood in the Scottish damp climate since 1858 and much work had to be done to keep it in proper condition. Mr. James is trying to restore the Guthrie Statues that came from Milan, Italy. The wet climate has taken its toll and the statues need to be taken to the mainland for repair. Contributions can be made through Clan Guthrie if anyone is interested in helping preserve these antique art objects.

In Lucile O'Donnell's last article, she ends her description of her wonderful trip to Scotland this way, "it is hoped that some of you will look back and find your roots. None of us, from any place know, as yet, when you are a Clan, all are descended from the same blood, regardless of length of time and distance of descent. So you who are from another Clan, or group or whatever, do become interested in the whys and wherefores, before the generations get so far descended they will lose all interest. Seeking your ancestry is a fascinating, interesting and worthwhile endeavor."

GUTHRIES ATTEND WILLIAMSBURG FESTIVAL IN FORCE

Williamsburg, Virginia, 1984 saw an expansion of Guthrie Clan activities in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

For the first time in its seven-year history, the pic turesque Williamsburg Scottish Festival included a Clan Guthrie USA/FOGC tent. Several Guthries from the historic Tidewater region of Virginia attended the festival and stopped by the tent.

The idea to have a Guthrie tent at Williamsburg was hatched at the Alexrandia, Va. games earlier that summer by Andy Guthrie, formerly the Ohio-Penna. regional commissioner, Walter Guthrie, and George Guthrie, both of Alexandria, Virginia.

Andy and Walt met when Andy joined the Voice of America (the U.S. Government's international radio broadcasting service) in late '83. They were introduced to George via the telephone by Virginia/Maryland regional Commissioner Florence Guthrie Glime.

In preparation for Williamsburg, Andy, Dee and Ian Guthrie drove to the Legionier Games in Pennsylvania in September and picked up the beautiful styrofoam Clan Guthrie sign created by Bud Guthrie of Mentor, Ohio for the 1982 Ohio Scottish Games. (Bud has donated the sign to the Clan and members may borrow it by calling Andy in Falls Church 703-241-7873.)

Walt and Andy called most of the southern Virginia Guthries to invite them and that boosted attendance. Several who were called showed up.
