

## **Blue Envelope**

The Blue Envelope Appeal is the Scottish Rite, NMJ's oldest Jurisdiction-wide fundraising appeal. For decades, Scottish Rite Masons have supported the charitable efforts of the fraternity by mailing their annual donations in a blue reply envelope, leading to the program's name.

Over the years, millions of dollars have been raised to support the work of the Scottish Rite Benevolent Foundation thanks to the generous contributions of our members. Donations currently support: The Scottish Rite Grand Almoner's Fund, Children's Dyslexia Centers, Scottish Rite Masonic Museum & Library and the Leon M. Abbott Scholarship Fund.

Beyond supporting our Scottish Rite Charities, Blue Envelope donations have a positive impact on our Valleys. Valley of Excellence - Members' Blue Envelope donations can help Valleys receive Valley of Excellence credit. Obtaining credit requires at least 10% or more of a Valley's total members donating to the Blue Envelope, with the campaign running from October 1 to June 15. We need just 47 more members to donate. ## What's Old Is New ~ James W. Both, 33°



Plan on viewing the new 32<sup>nd</sup> degree as the Grand Finale at our Spring Reunion. Supreme Council has changed the ritual for the 32<sup>nd</sup> degree. They have combined the opening and closing ceremonial sections with the allegory now used to conclude the degree. The ceremo-

nial section has brought back the use of the Masonic Camp, the Sacred words, the Passwords, the Golden Spurs of Knighthood, the Sash or Cordon of the Order, the Apron, and reference to the Mystic Numbers and the Holy Empire. The Tempters in the allegory have been changed to now include Florio, Urban, and Ignatius.

The explanation of the Masonic Camp now includes a visual representation of the Masonic Camp as well as an explanation. The Sacred words are given and at least one meaning in the Histori-

cal Notes tells us they mean "the light within guides us". The Historical Notes suggest to us that we should do further research to discover other possible meanings. The significance or meaning of the Golden Spurs of Knighthood, Cordon of the Order, and Apron are explained. The Historical Notes also explain the reference to the Holy Empire as possibly being an Empire of philosophy and morals as opposed to a territorial jurisdiction or as the Illustrious Albert Pike 33rd suggests, the Holy Empire of the true Masonic Brotherhood.

I challenge you to witness and study the new  $32^{nd}$  degree. See if you can catch and understand the changes that Supreme Council has made. Let's continue our "Search for Further Light".

Log in to the Member Center and you can access many of the programs Supreme Council offers to help you engage both in person and online. Here you can monitor your progress in the Passport Program and plan visits to the Valley of Danville or any Valley in the NMJ to witness the degrees you need to complete the program. Click on Thursday Night at the Rite and view online degrees with brethren from all over the jurisdiction. This program returned on February 1st and will showcase videos of several Valleys performing the degrees on their stages. TNR also offers your

Master Mason friends an opportunity to witness the fourth degree and begin their Scottish Rite Journeys. If you are looking to delve deeply into the meaning of the degrees and share your thoughts on them, check out the Haute Grade Academy and get on a list for the next class.

In addition to these programs and more offered by our Supreme Council you can also find out about the Grand Almoners programs, Scholarships, and other charities that offer our members help when they need it and an opportunity to give back when they can.

So as you continue your Scottish Rite journey this spring, whether you know where you want your Scottish Rite journey to take you or not, a good first step is to check out everything at https://scottishritenmj.org/.

#### **Duties of Officers**

To be elected or appointed to any office in a Scottish Rite Body is a distinct honor which carries with it responsibility. Those who accept these honors must be prepared and willing to undertake the duties and responsibilities of their offices with the realization that some personal sacrifice will be necessary.

It is not intended that holding office in a Scottish Rite Body should interfere with an officer's vocation and his efforts to earn a livelihood. However, when any other cause, unless it be illness or death in the family, prevents his expected and required attendance at the meetings, rehearsals and reunions, he errs in expecting that his absence will be overlooked. If absence results from the pressure of one's usual vocation or from illness, the members are usually very considerate in forgiving the absence.

However, if it is the result of lack of interest or conflict with what might be termed personal pleasure, continued approval cannot be expected. Under such circumstances he should make way for another member who is more interested and willing to serve more faithfully.

Each officer should consider increasing membership and retaining present membership as a high priority. Interest, attendance, punctuality and devotion to duty by all officers will inevitably result in success through cooperative and zealous teamwork.

A portion of the obligation taken by an officer at his installation in a Scottish Rite Body is as follows: "I will seek diligently to acquire a due knowledge of the rituals, usages and administrative procedures of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite in this Jurisdiction, and especially, to comply with the duties of my office. I will strive earnestly to promote the welfare of my Brethren and of our Rite, and to maintain peace and harmony in a spirit of courtesy and fraternal cooperation."

#### **Presiding Officers**

The primary duties of a Presiding Officer of a Subordinate Body are prescribed in the Constitutions and provide the following:

Except as provided in the succeeding paragraph, "it shall be the duty of the Presiding Officer of a Subordinate Body to preside at all meetings thereof, appoint all committees, and be ex officio a member of the same with voting rights. He shall discharge all

the duties prescribed for him by the Constitutions and rituals of the Supreme Council and the usages and customs of the Rite; but the Presiding Officer of a Subordinate Body shall have and exercise no authority or control over any other Subordinate Body.

"In a Valley having a Council, Chapter and Consistory, or any one or more of them in addition to a Lodge of Perfection, joint regulations of such Bodies may provide for a Board of Officers or Executive Committee with power and authority to coordinate the activities of all the Subordinate Bodies in that Valley including the acquisition, management and control of all properties for the common good, the scheduling of degrees, the appointment of committees, the fixing of budgets, the management of finances, and other appropriate common activities provided only that the Presiding Officer of each such Subordinate Body in such Valley shall be a member of such Board of Officers or Executive Committee

Thereafter, the role and duties of such Presiding Officers shall be subordinate and subject to such joint regulations as shall have been duly adopted by such Board of Officers, Executive Committee or other appropriate committee."

A Presiding Officer is required to give his assent to the following charges of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite: 1.) to pay true allegiance and fealty to the Supreme Council

2.) to support its Constitutions, Statutes, Orders and Decrees 3.) to agree not to engage in any plot or conspiracy against the civil government 4.) to obey the laws of our country 5.) to submit peacefully to the will of the majority 6.) to avoid disputes and quarrels, 7.) to be impartial, upright and modest 8.) to refrain from all intemperance and excess 9.) to be faithful to his Brethren and courteous to all men 10.) to exercise hospitality 11.) to receive all duly accredited visitors 12.) to reject imposters 13.) to rebuke those who would seek to disturb peace and harmony 14.) to guard zealously the Charter of the Body over which he is called to preside 15.) to permit no one to receive any degree of the Ancient.

Accepted Scottish Rite unless he be a Master Mason in good standing and qualified in accordance with the Constitutions and Regulations of the Rite.

It is the further duty of each Presiding Officer to observe and enforce such rules and regulations governing his Body as are consistent with the Constitutions of the Supreme Council, and the rules and regulations of the Council of Deliberation of his state.

The Presiding Officer shall be responsible for the organization of the Body under his direction. He shall be responsible for the Officers of his Body performing their assigned duties.

The Presiding Officers of the Bodies of the Rite in each state shall present recommendations in writing to the Council of Deliberation relative to nominating those who are to receive the Meritorious Service

Each Presiding Officer should study and thoroughly familiarize himself with each of the following:

(a) The Constitutions of the Supreme Council,

(b) The "Forms and Ceremonials" authorized by the Supreme Council; (c) The "Ceremonial of Open Installation of Officers of Subordinate Bodies;" (d) Manual for Officers;

(e) The Rules and Regulations of the Council of Deliberations in his state; (f) The Rules and Regulations of the Subordinate Body of which he is the Presiding Officer and of the other coordinate Bodies of the Rite in his Valley;

(g) The ritual of each degree conferred by his Subordinate Body including the Historical Notes and Sacred words pertaining to such ritual.

#### Other Elected and Appointed Officers

All officers should perform the duties of their respective offices and assist the Presiding Officer of the Body in which they serve, and shall perform such other tasks that may be assigned to them.

The Treasurer, Secretary, Trustees, other Officers and Committees shall perform those duties which are assigned to them by the Constitutions of the Supreme Council and the Rules and Regulations of their Council of Deliberation and their Valley.

It is expected that all officers shall be present at all business meetings of their Subordinate Body as well as at Reunions.

## The Next Two Years ~ Bradford W. Cronk, 33°



The Valley of Danville is recognized as one of the premier Valleys in the Northern Jurisdiction of Scottish Rite. We have worked hard to receive recognition as a Valley of Excellence, we are well known for the quality of

our degrees, and we have a Temple that has had a huge amount of work done to make it a facility to be very proud of. I was asked how we could continue to grow and improve when I become Commander-in-Chief. Considering all the achievements we have accomplished it sounds like a tall order to do more.

I believe my first step in addressing the task ahead is to listen to the voices of the membership and consider the areas where we need the most attention based on the needs of the Valley. New membership is one of our greatest needs. All organizations are suffering from a lack of involvement. In the Valley of Danville, we have a core group of dedicated individuals that have worked hard to create the organization we have today but considering the size of the Valley this is a relatively small group. This is why active membership is so important. The team that has been so dedicated takes on a huge load. Officers and volunteers who have been doing this work have to have help and replacements as they advance. The need for new blood in the lines, volunteers for committees, events, and participation in activities has never been greater.

The question is, how to get the members we have, and those Masons who are not yet members excited about Scottish Rite? I have heard repeatedly from both groups that they need to be asked. Secondly, they must be presented with activities they are interested in taking part in.

Regarding the asking, the Valley already has taken a step in the right direction by creating an application process for accepting members into the lines. I hope to see this process expanded to seeking out committee members, and volunteers for all facets of the Valley's activities, from members of the Degree Team to Greeters, Stage Crew, and Degree participants, just to name a few. I would like to see this information kept in a database so that we can easily find the interests of all our members and connect them with the positions in which they are most interested.

As far as the second part — activities, this is where growth is gained. If we have events people are interested in attending, I believe we will grow our membership. We had a good start last fall with the Southern Accents concert, but we need to go beyond that. I would like to see entertainment-oriented events frequently being held at locations all around the Valley. Our organization is larger in geographic area than some of the east

coast states. We need to make a concerted effort to sponsor activities from Mt. Carmel to Kankakee. By not having events in the furthest reaches we are alienating our Valley from a huge potential membership.

You might ask, why entertainment-oriented activities? I would say this is needed because all work and no play drives members away. Not only drives them way but prevents them from joining. It is true that Scottish Rite is the "University of Freemasonry," but if we rely exclusively on our degrees and education, we will limit our membership to the esoteric and academic. The men we seek as members are mostly family men. They are going to be most interested in doing things that they can bring their wives and/or children to and that they can tell their friends what a good time they had participating in. These events are also the reward for a job well

I hope to make these ideas the foundation of my service to the Valley for the next two years. I know there is no way anything can be accomplished without the input and assistance of the members of our organization. I hope I can get your support and suggestions to make the Valley's decline in membership turn around and keep the Valley the gem of the Northern Jurisdiction.
