A great deal has been going on behind the scenes this summer. Sprucing up entry areas, stair wells, and other walls with fresh paint. The kitchen now

has hot water at the dishwasher sink and spray wand, which has been lacking for years. All new appliances are installed and operating. The 4th floor bathroom has been decommissioned with the sink and stool removed and sewer pipes capped. The 3rd floor women's bathroom has had the urinal removed and pipe capped, this should eliminate much of the odor. Scottish Rite is a fraternity of Freemasons that promotes philanthropy, brotherhood, and self-improvement. Members of the Scottish Rite often take part in charitable activities and events, and some also



A BEAUTIFUL DAY: OLIVE BRANCH 38 FOUNDERS DAY AND VALLEY OF DANVILLE OPEN HOUSE

He then introduced Brother's Cody Oakwood, Brian Pettice, 33°, and Jerry Askren, 33° who delivered speeches on our past Brethren, Joseph "Uncle Joe" Cannon, Jasper C. Winslow, and William P. Black. It was a beautiful day and several of those in attendance remarked that the presentations were educational and enjoyable.

After the Founders' Day Celebration, the Valley welcomed all to an Open House at the Masonic Temple. The Valley had invited several Masonic bodies and related bodies to set up informational tables at the Open House to meet and educate anyone that attended the Open House. Ten organizations including the Rainbow for Girls, the DeMolay for Boys, the Order of the Eastern Star, the Shriners, the York Rite, the Lodge, the Valley and our Learning Center, as well as a couple of the Grand Lodge Charities attended and set up tables. Several people, Masons and members of the public, came and met with these representatives and took tours of the building. The Open House was a tribute to Masonic teamwork and unity. We enjoyed each other's company and learned lessons for future gatherings. It was a job well done by everyone involved.



The Feast of Tishri is a celebration of thanksgiving, unity, and rededication observed by the Lodge of

Perfection. The Feast was observed Saturday, September 17th at the beautiful, newly renovated Valley of Danville Temple dining hall. Members of the Lodge of Perfection gave a presentation on the history and meaning of the Feast of Tishri and led those assembled in the nine Toasts of Obligations. An excellent Thanksgiving style meal was served, and an afternoon of fellowship was enjoyed by the many Masons and their families who were present. Thank you to all who attended and made the Feast a successful event.

The Scottish Rite Feast of Tishri traces its roots to the Jewish festival of Sukkot, also known as the Feast of Booths or Feast of Tabernacles. The Hebrew word $sukk\bar{o}t$ is the plural of sukkah, which translates to "booth" or "tabernacle". God commanded the Hebrews for all generations to observe a seven day harvest festival, in the Jewish month of Tishri, during which they should eat all of their meals outside in their sukkah. In the book of Leviticus, Chapter 23, God commanded the Israelites, "On the fifteenth day of the seventh month, when you have gathered in the produce of the land, you shall celebrate the feast

of the Lord seven days. And you shall take on the first day the fruit of splendid trees, branches of palm trees and boughs of leafy trees and willows of the brook, and you shall rejoice before the Lord your God seven days. You shall dwell in booths for seven days. All native Israelites shall dwell in booths, that your generation may know that I made the People of Israel dwell in booths when I brought them out of the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God." It was also during this Feast that King Solomon dedicated the First Temple, the Temple he built to be the Dwelling Place, the House of the Lord.

The Feast of Tishri is illustrated to be one of thanksgiving. The mention of the bounty of their harvests and the symbolism of the booths is intended to remind the Israelites and future generations of God's care and provision for them. When the Israelites wandered the desert after the exodus from Egypt, God provided for their every need. When they were thirsty, he provided water. When they were hungry, he provided food. When they needed shelter, he provided the temporary shelters for them to dwell in.

As Scottish Rite Masons, we should heed the lessons of the Israelites and be thankful for all the blessings God has bestowed on us and take comfort in the faith that, whatever our need, God will know it and provide for it.

The Feast is also to be a celebration of unity. In Leviticus, the fruit of splendid trees, branches of palm trees and boughs of leafy trees and willows of the brook can be taken to represent the many and varied types of people God has created. In many Jewish celebrations, the four types of branches are bound into one representing that all should celebrate the feast together as one with each other in the presence of the Lord. In Masonry, and especially in the Scottish Rite, many and varied types of men are bound together as brothers who share a common goal of working towards moral perfection. The Feast for us is a celebration of our Unity in that pursuit.

By choosing this Feast as the time to dedicate the House of the Lord, King Solomon recognized the lessons of rededication implicit in this Feast. The Temple of Solomon symbolized the collective effort of the Israelites to give thanks to and rededicate themselves to God by building for him a physical place to dwell among his people.

We as Scottish Rite Masons can truly give thanks and rededicate ourselves to God by rededicating ourselves to joining with one another to perfect the Spiritual Temple within each of our hearts as a dwelling place for the Lord.
