# MERITORIOUS SERVICE AWARD RECIPIENT 2022





#### NEWS FROM SUPREME COUNCIL Brian L. Pettice, 33°, Deputy's Representative

At this writing, summer is nearly half over. But, oh what a summer it has been—filled with celebration of

accomplishment and activity. In mid-June the Supreme Council announced that the Valley of Danville was one of 45 Valleys in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction and 5 in Illinois to win the Valley of Excellence Award. This award is based on scoring a minimum of 90 out of 100 possible points in four categories—Membership, Service & Philanthropy, Leadership & Development, and Operations. Engaging in the activities necessary to win the award drives a Valley to be one that

serves its members and communities as it should and is in keeping with Supreme Council's focus on being a member driven organization. It is truly a team award and one that we should all take pride in.

Later in June, the Illinois Council of Deliberation conferred the Meritorious Service Award on Brother Matt Ring at its annual meeting and banquet. Valley of Danville members present were thrilled to hear the Deputy for Illinois, Illustrious Greg Clark, 33°, announce that Brother Rick Strebing is the Valley's nominee to receive the MSA at the ICOD meeting next summer.

### MASONS TRAVELING THE WORLD



What I did on my Summer Vacation, Pete Eisenmenger, 33°

This story starts about two years ago when my oldest

daughter decided that she wanted to study abroad for a semester. I did not put too much thought into it at the time because like most other 18 year-olds, big plans tend to die on the vine rather quickly. Well the joke was on me because that girl scrimped, saved and planned and the next thing I knew I was putting her on a plane to Italy in January. As soon as things started to get real that we were going to have a kid in Italy, my wife started planning our trip there to "go see her," and in April we boarded a plan for Rome to go on a tour of "Italy's Great Cities," taking my mother-in-law and her best friend along for good measure. Luckily we had separate rooms in the hotels so my wife and I were not kept up all night with their constant partying. After a 9 hour flight and losing another 7 hours due to the time change, we landed in Rome. The adrenaline rush of being in a different country and promise of great food and wine kept us all awake that first day and I gotta say that the food and hospitality did not disappoint. We also met some really great people who were also on the tour. The next day our very jet-lagged and slightly hung over tour group of 24 or so people went on a walking tour of Rome. Our tour guide, Francesco, took us all over the ancient city. Being a good mason, I tried to find either Masonic symbols or at least Masonic influences in the Roman architecture. What I discovered are what I be-



lieve are influences on early Masonry. One of the more impressive sites was the Pantheon, an ancient Roman temple to the Gods that was repurposed by the early Christian Church. The dome of the building is the widest of any of the domes built in the ancient world or middle ages and was constructed of concrete. Our tour guide told us that it had to be constructed in a very short period of time because concrete tends to harden when it dries. The fact that Bronze Age men figured out how to construct a 142 foot wide dome that did not collapse in on itself is impressive and was a feat that could not be duplicated until over a thousand years later.

I was struck by the sheer history I observed over the entire length of the 10 day tour. In Rome, I saw Egyptian obelisks that were ancient when the Romans brought them to adorn their

streets, ancient Roman buildings, temples and statues and cathedrals from the Middle Ages and Renaissance... all within blocks of each other. I was also able to drink from a "water fountain" that was fed by a Roman aqueduct that still provides the city with fresh water. Finishing up day 1 was a visit to the Coliseum. My buddy Francesco informed us, before going in, that there were three different styles of columns adorning the outside of the coliseum, one on each level; Ionic, Doric and Corinthian. I guess the builders of the Coliseum did not have much use for the Tuscan and Composite either.

You cannot do a tour of Italy without seeing some of the most influential art in history and Michelangelo did not disappoint. The Sistine Chapel was very impressive but I was blown away by the statue of David in Florence and the Pieta in St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican. Michelangelo saw sculpture as art in its purest form and two tour guides (including my buddy Francesco) noted that Michelangelo did not believe that he was creating a sculpture from the marble, only breaking off the "rough and superfluous parts of the stone" to reveal the beauty that was already there. I could go on about this trip for several more pages but will stop here. I encourage anyone who already has not done so, to step out of your comfort zone and travel to a different country. You get to experience a different culture, meet interesting people and maybe even appreciate what we have in our own country a little more.

#### BLUE LODGE HAPPENINGS

#### Masonic Founders' Day, Open House and Feast of Tishri by Brian L. Pettice, 33°

Save the Date! On Saturday September 17<sup>th</sup>, the Valley of Danville and Olive Branch Lodge No. 38 will partner together, through the Valley's Fraternal Outreach Program, to bring everyone a day dedicated to celebrating our Masonic history, visiting with the members of our Masonic Family, and rededicating ourselves to Masonic Principles.

The day will begin at Temple Plaza, down the street from the Masonic Center, at 10:00 am as Olive Branch Lodge 38 will conduct a Founders' Day Celebration. Temple Plaza, now a downtown park, is the site of the former Temple Building—the first structure in Danville built by Masons and with Masonic purposes specifically in mind. It is now the site of a beautiful sculpture depicting and celebrating several notable citizens of Danville as well as others that represent, "the various trades, professions, talents, and contributions of everyday citizens." The Plaza retains the arched entry of the old Temple and features a series of plaques explaining the park and sculpture. One of the plaques identifies fourteen of the citizens whose likenesses are depicted and identified in the sculpture.

Three of those citizens identified were members of Olive Branch Lodge—longtime Congressman and Speaker of the U.S. House, Joseph G. "Uncle Joe" Cannon; Danville's first Mayor, Jasper C. Winslow; and Civil War Congressional Medal of Honor Winner and famed attorney, William Perkins Black. The Founders' Day Celebration will feature presentations by current lodge members on the stories of each of these brethren as well as on the story of the lodge itself. While it is difficult to be sure what part their association with Freemasonry played in shaping these good men, it is easy to see the part each of these men played in shaping our world. The lodge looks forward to sharing their stories, honoring their accomplishments, and celebrating the values and principles they exemplified in their lives-values and principles lodge members strive to live by to this day.

At 10:30 am the Valley will host an Open House at the Danville Masonic Center, 109 W. North Street. All Masons, their families and friends, as well as the public are invited to visit the Masonic Center at this time. Visitors may take self-guided tours of the building where they can see the grandeur of the different rooms in the building and where they will meet representatives of the various organizations that reside in the building. Among these organizations are the Valley itself, Masonic Blue Lodges, the Order of the Eastern Star, the DeMolay for Boys, and the Children's Learning Center. Additionally several local and regional Masonic organizations will be invited to set-up informational tables so that all may learn the variety of organizations within the Masonic fraternity and what

they have to offer and how they serve individuals and their communities.

The Open House will wrap up at 11:45 am and at noon the Valley will serve lunch. The meal will consist of fare the Valley has traditionally served with its celebration of the Feast of Tishri. The public is invited to join us for the lunch, however reservations are required. Reservations can be made by calling the Valley office at 217-446-7620. There is no charge for lunch, but there will be an opportunity to make a free will donation that day.

Following lunch, everyone is invited to experience the Valley's annual observance of the Feast of Tishri—a Masonic celebration of thanksgiving, unity, and rededication. This Feast is conducted by the officers of the Valley's Lodge of Perfection. It encourages us to give thanks for all that has been provided us during the past year, to strive for the unity that should exist among people, and to rededicate ourselves to living according to the principles that will best enable us to keep our duties to our God, to our Country, to our families, to our neighbors, and to ourselves.

We hope that you will join us on this day.
