Our Fall Reunion Class Honoree, Harry C. Kuchenbrod, 33°



Illustrious Harry C. Kuchenbrod was born on May 18, 1936 in Bolivar, PA. He attended public schools in Bolivar and graduated from Laurel Valley High School in 1954. Shortly after graduation, he enlisted in the United States Air Force and spent the next eight years at duty stations in Wyoming, Morocco, and Illinois. He was discharged from active duty in August 1962 and shortly thereafter, was hired as a civilian employee with the USAF from which he retired in September, 1994.

III. Kuchenbrod married Barbara Powers in February, 1962 and from that union came sons Ralph, Gary, Jerry, and Barry; also one daughter, Barbara; ten grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren. He married Zelda Niccum in September, 1982; she died in May, 2018.

III. Kuchenbrod received his Masonic degrees in Potomac Lodge No. 782 and was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on February 6, 1969, and served as its Worshipful Master in 1973 and 1975. He also served the Grand Lodge of Illinois as District Deputy of the Eighth Eastern District and as Area Deputy for the Eastern Area of Illinois. He is also a Life Member of Burkburnett Lodge No. 1027 in Burkburnett, TX.

III. Kuchenbrod received his Scottish Rite degrees in November, 1969. He was appointed Captain of the Guard in the Chapter of Rose Croix in 1971 and served as Most Wise Master in 1977. He also served Danville Consistory as Commander in Chief in 1987/88. He received his thirty-third degree in Philadelphia, PA in September, 1981. III. Kuchenbrod is also a member of the Scottish Rite Bodies of Pensacola, FL.

Ill. Kuchenbrod is a member of Zelica Grotto in Pensacola, FL and is a demitted member of the York Rite Bodies and the Shrine in Pensacola.

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Hauts Grades Academy by Chris Hathaway, Senior Warden

The George E. Burrow Chapter of Rose Croix

I presume you joined the Scottish Rite in search of more light. Look no further, you are in the right place. The Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite is commonly referred to as the "University of Freemasonry." The vast knowledge contained within our degrees can take a lifetime of study. A recent study showed that our member is demanding more education out of the masonic experience. If you want more information on what the study showed, you can read it in "Reclaiming the Soul of Freemasonry", by John Wm. McNaughton, 33°, Past Sovereign Grand Commander of the Scottish Rite, NMJ.

The AASR, NMJ responded to the needs of our membership by launching the Hauts Grades Academy (HGA). This program has been widely successful, and every new class must be placed on waiting lists. This program was designed by some of the best masonic scholars in the country. Members throughout the world have been asking if they can join in on our educational program. Currently it is only available to members of the Norther Masonic Jurisdiction, and it's FREE.

So, what is the program and why should I do it? This program is a comprehensive review and self-reflection of the 29 degrees of the Scottish Rite. In it you will have access to every degree ritual. You will study the history, characters, symbols, and meaning of each degree. Even if you have seen a degree 10x over, you will learn something new by closely examining the manuscripts. There are symbols, signs, and words that you will never see in the drama of the degree but are still associated with that degree. You will be tested with a short multiple-choice guiz at the end of each degree. You can take them in any order you chose, so be sure to start with your favorite degree as a warmup.

The next section is a self-reflection of nine degrees of your choice. You will identify the core value that the degree is trying to portray. You will write about what the degree means to you and how you will apply it to your daily routine. By writing down what the degree means to you, you will be able to internalize the degree and have a better appreciation for it. If we are not learning and living out our masonic values, what are we even doing here? In your essay, you will write about other degrees that may be trying to share the same or similar message. Maybe you want more symbolism or better drama in the degree. Let them know how it would help you become a better Mason by adding your suggestions to the ritual. During this section, I would encourage you to have a copy of "The Masonic Pageant" by III. Frank Conway, PH.D., 33°, MSA. This book gives historical context to all our degrees. I also used "The 1783 Francken Manuscript" to better understand the original 25 degrees of the "Order of the Royal Secret" that went on to become the Scottish Rite.

The third and last section of the HGA is a 2500-word academic research paper.

In this you will work with a member of the Supreme Council to write a paper on topics such as history, ritual, or the philosophy of the degrees. It must add to the collection of the Scottish Rite. Your contribution will be unique and be the first of its kind. You will have a mentor to guide you through this process. Maybe you aren't a writer and this task seems daunting. I would encourage you to at least take the first two steps of this program. By the time you get to the end, you will have studied all 29 degrees and written 9 reflection essays. You will have MORE LIGHT in the fraternity. Not only will you know our core values, you will also be able to act on them and speak intelligently of them to brother Masons. They are: Reverence for God, Justice, Toleration, Devotion to Country, Service to Humanity, and Integrity.

Lastly, the NMJ sees this program as an important element of what we have to offer to our membership. Our new candidates are begging for moral and philosophical education that they cannot get outside of these walls. If you complete the program, you will have a new signature block. The importance is being placed so high in our jurisdiction that you will sign your name at all Scottish Rite functions with HGA after your last name. An 1820 Past Master's Jewel from London

From the late 1700s through the present day, many American Masonic lodges have followed the tradition of acknowledging the contributions of a lodge master by presenting him with a personalized jewel to mark the conclusion of his term. Over time and place these jewels, called Past Master's jewels, have been made of different metals and have come in many sizes and shapes, depending on the jurisdiction, local taste and the issuing lodge's budget. Historically, the lodge commissioned an engraver to inscribe Past Master's jewels with the recipient's name, lodge, and the dates of his term. Past Master jewels presented in Ameri- tained by them of his exertions for the ca in the early 1800s often featured the Masonic symbols of a sun within compasses with a quadrant connecting the legs of the compasses. These jewels, usually made of silver, were often cut from a flat sheet of metal. Researchers have observed that this style of Past Master jewel design was likely inspired by jewels used by Scottish Freemasons in the 1700s. The jewel pictured here was executed in an entirely different style. A jeweler made it for London Freemason Robert Scholl (ca. 1781-1832) and it was presented to him in 1820.

Listed as a "gentlemen" in membership records, Scholl worked as a Navy agent, with chambers at Clement's Inn, in the early 1830s. He was initiated at the Lodge of Union No. 275 in 1814 and served as Master of his lodge before 1820. To thank him for his service in that role, Scholl's brethren at tions.

the Lodge of Union commissioned this gold and enamel jewel. They had Scholl's jewel inscribed on the back with a heartfelt message, noting that the elegant badge was, "...a testimony of their fraternal Regard—their Personal attachment and the Sense enter-Benefit of the Lodge." Scholl's jewel is like a watch or locket in that the decoration on the front is protected by a glass bezel. The bezel covers elements cut from gold in the shape of a square and compasses and a sun. A border of leaves, likely laurel, surrounds the symbols. All of the gold elements are detailed with engraving to give them depth and definition. The symbols appear to float over a background patterned by engine turning and enameled dark blue. The deep color contrasts with the bright gold symbols. Using the pin on the back, Scholl would have worn this jewel on his coat.

What extraordinary service Scholl may have undertaken for his lodge is not known, but this handsome jewel suggests how highly the brothers at the Lodge of Union valued his contribu-
