

Ardmore High School Team Wins 2023 State Envirothon

A team from Ardmore High School just won the 2023 state Envirothon competition in Columbiana this weekend. They will now go on to represent Alabama at the international competition in Canada.

Envirothon is a rigorous academic competition across the United States, Canada, and China. Students must navigate a series of written tests as well as solve a complex environmental issue and present before a panel of judges. Their presentations must be prepared without the use of the Internet or other outside resources.

To compete, students must not only possess strong background knowledge of environmental science but also must demonstrate creative problem-solving, critical thinking skills, and the ability to work together under pressure as a team.

Each team member specializes in a topic. Senior Madalyn Robison serves as the forestry specialist, senior Tara Hobbs is the climate specialist, junior Alison Heimsness is the team captain and wildlife specialist, junior Kaylee Wallace is the aquatics specialist and sophomore Malorie Robison is the soils specialist. Teachers Starr Weems and Elizabeth Hilliard are the team's coaches.

These five students are involved in a myriad of conservation extracurriculars, including 4-H, Ardmore Conservation Society, Alabama Water Watch and participating in Wild Alabama's initiative to save Alabama's hemlocks. They also help maintain the school's outdoor classroom.

The Ardmore Envirothon team's winning presentation was on the topic of creating a sustainable watershed plan to make Alabama more resilient in the face of climate change.

EEAA, in partnership with the Southeastern Environmental Education Alliance, is excited to announce the relaunch of our landscape analysis. We encourage school and district administrators and formal educators who work in the PreK-12 setting, as well as environmental education providers, to participate in this survey.

And we want to hear from you!

These surveys should take you less than 15 minutes to complete and will allow us to assess and determine gaps and barriers to EE implementation in schools, and it will enable us to make recommendations that can help combine environmental education into formal education settings.

This project includes a comprehensive study of the environmental education already happening on the ground, enabling states involved to identify gaps and barriers to access that prevent successful implementation in some areas. The report will provide recommendations and next steps for increasing environmental literacy in the southeast based on an inventory of model programs and initiatives happening nationwide.







Big Canoe Creek: A Forever Wild Preserve

EEAA Board Member Claire Datnow joined the Alabama Audubon Society recently for a behind-the-scenes tour of one of Forever Wilds's newest properties saying: "It was a privilege to visit the 422-acre, Big Canoe Creek Creek, a Forever Wild Preserve, in Springville, Alabama, with the Alabama Audubon Society. The Preserve will soon be opened to the public for a variety of activities, including birdwatching, and hiking."





About the Preserve

Welcome to Big Canoe Creek Nature Preserve, 422 acres of pristine meandering creek, lush forest, one-of-a-kind species, wildlife, stunning flora, and trails of all kinds to be traveled. Trails traverse this Alabama Forever Wild property in Springville, perfect for hiking, horseback riding, bird watching, and mountain biking. Paddle by canoe or kayak and take in the unrivaled creekside beauty of this land – forever wild, forever preserved.

Experience its biodiversity – from the Canoe Creek Clubshell mussel to the trispot darter, from mountain laurel and native azalea to beech, red, and sugar maple trees. Find hornbeams, black walnut, catalpa, butternut, and bigleaf magnolia, and perhaps, stands of river cane.

Take in the spectacular views of ridges, mountains, and valleys. Or spot a rare bird soaring above. Each sunrise seems to reveal a new perspective on nature's many gifts found beneath the canopy of its trees or along the banks of this stunning creek that runs for 50 miles. And each sunset beckons visitors to savor the memories of the sights, sounds, and the enveloping feeling of it all. It is a true gift of nature for us all to enjoy, to experience, and to be inspired.
