## Hunting 80-million-year-old shark teeth in Alabama's Black Belt

Tucker Bailey, 12, stands in ankle-deep water in Hale County, beaming from ear to ear and showing off his latest find. The creek he's standing in is about 170 miles north of the Gulf of Mexico, but the object in his hand in unmistakable: a small, black shark's tooth.

The fossilized tooth dates back about 83 million years to a time when most of Alabama was covered by shallow seas.

"This rock layer where we're standing would have been the bottom of the ocean," said Allie Sorlie, education outreach coordinator for the Alabama Museum of Natural History, which organized the fossil hunting trip, "We would be completely covered by ocean here, kind of a shallow sea at that time."

Bailey was one of eight members of the public on the excursion, which uncovered several Ziploc baggies full of fossilized treasures – dozens of shark teeth, oysters, snails, turtle shell fragments, and vaguely octopus-like creatures called ammonites.

The museum, operated by the University of Alabama, has been leading these fossil excursions for decades as part of its public outreach and education efforts, said museum director John Friel.

"People can come to the museum to see fossils, but I think when you actually go out sometimes in your own backyard or at least your own state and can collect fossils yourself, you have a personal relationship with the past that I think is really special," Friel said. "And Alabama is an incredible state with an incredible fossil record, and I think it's just a great opportunity for people to realize what we have here."





# EEAA Board Member Janice Barrett - She Speaks for the Trees

Most people have a soft spot for at least one tree. It might be a pine, an oak, or even a crepe myrtle. If you do, you have a lot in common with Janice Barrett – she's just taken it a whole lot further! After becoming a mother in 1989, Janice realized how important it was to protect the world her son had been born into. In 1992, she became involved as a volunteer artist with the Bankhead Monitor, a non-profit educational conservation group, and has been working as a defender of the forests for nearly 30 years.

Bankhead Monitor would become Wild Alabama (WA); Barrett became WA's Outreach Coordinator in 2001 and has held that position for two decades. She co-created Wild Alabama's Helping Hands program, its Hikes Program, and its Volunteer Wilderness Ranger Program. She also created the Wild Wednesday Program, which takes kids and their families on guided hikes during summer months. Like acorns planted in one of her beloved forests, all of these programs are still growing strong. #### **SEEA Strategic Planning**

The SEEA Leadership Team has been doing some work around strategic planning on their monthly calls in preparation for our in-person meeting during the EENC/SEEA Conference. The strategic plan will help guide the work of SEEA over the next three years as we continue to build capacity and strengthen collective EE programming across the Southeast. The Leadership Team has been working with Dave Chase, an independent nonprofit consultant and NAAEE Advisory Board Member. Dave is no stranger to SEEA and has worked with the group and individual states in the past.

#### **SEEA Regional JEDI eeCourse Launching**

Launching by the end of August, the SEEA JEDI Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion in Environmental Education course will run from September 20th- December 15th. Registration will can be found southeastee.org/jedi101 and will close on September 15. Scholarships may be available.

This course was developed through a partnership between the Center for Diversity and the Environment, Ecoloclusive, Environmental Educators of North Carolina, Kansas Association for Conservation and Environmental Education, Kentucky Association for Environmental Education, and Youth Outside. It is designed to provide a strong foundation in the language, concepts, and principles of equity work. It is meant to be an introductory

and spark interest in further learning around justice, equity, diversity, and Inclusion.

The JEDI eeCourse will be moderated by

Reverend Leonard Curry, an ordained elder in the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church, and pastor of St. James AME church in Ashland, Kentucky. He obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree in Religious Studies from Rhodes College, and a Master of Divinity and Master of Sacred Theology from Yale University. He is currently a PhD candidate at Vanderbilt University in the program of Ethics and Society where his research focuses on emotion, racism, and power in religion and politics. Reverend Curry has worked with NAAEE Affiliate Leaders on the Affiliate Working Group 2.0 as well as the Kentucky Association for EE.
