



### The Power Of Stories To Teach and Imbue Wonder of our Natural World

Drawing people into the power, beauty, cruelty, utility, intricate patterns and behaviors of animals, insects, and the geologic formations of our natural world is what will help create an army of protectors for this planet. The best tool for reaching this objective is storytelling. People are moved by stories, not facts. That said, you can imbue your stories with facts that will linger in someones imagination and intellect for a very long time, often igniting action. This keynote will feature stories, original and folk, that do just this, and invite participants to consider places, critters, geologic formations that have informed their passion for the natural world. Judith will model, with their input how they can shape their own experiences into stories that will ignite listeners passions.



Judith Black is a professional storyteller, story maker, and teacher/coach with an international following. Originally trained at Wheelock College as an early childhood educator, Judith leapt from the classroom to the stage after training at London's Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts. Ultimately she bound these two passions with storytelling and for 35 years has been using story to motivate, humanize, entertain, and teach. Most recently, she has turned her attention to the climate crisis and in June of 2016 gave a TEDX talk on the link that can bind storytelling and climate. She is the winner of many awards in her field.
