SEEA Conference SC 2020 Research Symposium Updates

I am pleased to announce that the Environmental Education Association of South Carolina (EEASC) will be hosting the Southeastern Environmental Education Alliance (SEEA) Conference, "Environmental Legacy: It's Our Story. Past, Present, and Future", September 24 – 26, 2020 in Columbia, SC! As part of this conference, a Research Symposium will be held on Thursday September 24, 2020 and we invite you to share your research efforts by submitting a session proposal that addresses one or more of the following strands:

- Pages of the Past: Research projects that capture information about our environmental past
 in the fields of geosciences, natural history, or socio-cultural perspectives. Proposals
 submitted for this strand should include research efforts that align with one or more of the
 following guiding questions: What does the natural landscape tell us about our environmental
 past? How do historical environmental science data inform our present-day lives and/or
 future directions? How have cultural connections to the environment changed over time?
- Present-Day Plotlines: Explores our present-day environmental heritage by featuring research efforts that highlight current geosciences research, science education research, evaluation and assessment efforts, and social science research. Proposals submitted for this strand should consider one or more of the following guiding questions: Are you researching exploring a new environmental educational program or project? Are you involved with environmental education research that is investigating current trends? Are you involved in assessment or evaluation efforts?
- Foreshadowing the Future: Captures chapters of our environmental legacy yet to be written and encourages proposal submissions from all applicable fields. Proposals submitted for this strand are encouraged to consider research that aligns with one or more of the following guiding questions: What does environmental education look like in the future? What are some sustainable, innovative, and forward-thinking projects, ideas, and strategies that are on the horizon and how might these impact society? What does our environment look like in the future?

The SEEA Research Symposium provides a regional platform from which to share your research through a poster, oral presentation, or café format to those who work within the fields of environmental sciences and education. 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
News from the SEEA States

March 2020 Updates from the Affiliate Network Steering Committee

Last week the Steering Committee held our monthly call and I just wanted to share a quick look at what the Steering Committee decided:

- -Our Governance Committee proposed a "near consensus" decision-making process via straw polling, which was fully adopted.
 - -Our Practices and Culture Committee presented 2020 Rules of Engagement which have been adopted with a few minor updates.
- -The ANSC has empowered a small group (Eileen Everett, Katie Navin, Sarah Bodor, and Bruce Young) to start a process for determining what's needed from the 2020 Affiliate Workshop to support deliverables promised under current grants to the ANSC and informed by new 2020 work plans. In addition to the work plans, feedback gathered from past workshop evaluations will also be reviewed. This group will make recommendations for workshop content and structure to the ANSC Professional Development Committee and the ANSC as a whole.

Update on SEEA Landscape Analysis and State Coordinator Details from SEEA Executive Director Ashley Hoffman

Hi Folks,

As promised, here is a little more information on the state coordinator role for the NFWF proposal:

SEEA will be conducting a landscape analysis of environmental education efforts in the southeast. This analysis will take a comprehensive look at what environmental education is already happening on the ground. It will identify gaps and barriers to access that prevent successful implementation in some areas, and provide recommendations and next steps for increasing environmental literacy efforts in the southeast based on an inventory of model programs and initiatives happening nationwide.

This analysis and the tailored state recommendations provided will equip the organizations conducting environmental and conservation-related work in the southeast with the materials they need to address gaps, allocate resources more effectively, and ultimately meet the goal of increasing environmental literacy levels and stewardship behaviors. This analysis will help to guide future strategic planning efforts in individual states as well as the regional SEEA collaborative going forward. It will be a tool we can use to ensure we are focusing our limited time and resources in areas where we will have the biggest impact. Data collection and analysis will be led by the Project Analyst, but it will be directed and advised by a leadership team comprised of one State Coordinator from each partner state and a few other key leaders.

Upon receipt of funding, a subgrant of \$7500 will be provided for each state environmental education association who serve as partners on this project to designate a State Coordinator from May 2020 to June 2021. It is expected that your organization might keep 10-15% of these funds and use the remainder to cover staff time or hire a contractor to serve as the State Coordinator. The State Coordinator's roles will be to serve as SEEA's liaison with state-level partners and to ensure that the data collected and recommendations provided will meet their state-level needs. The State Coordinator will assist the Project Analyst in determining what baseline data already exists in some form in that state, compiling the existing data, and identifying what additional data will need to be collected. They will also assist the state in sharing the results of this study and guiding the implementation of recommendations. We have a long history of working together as a region and these State Coordinators, with their direct experience and knowledge in that state, will be critical to ensuring their state's unique assets and needs are properly articulated and addressed throughout this process.

The State Coordinator will be asked to participate in monthly check-in calls and will also receive travel funds to attend the following meetings:

- May-June 2020 Initial Planning Meeting: An initial project design meeting will be held in Lexington, KY. This meeting will be an essential first step for the Project Leadership Team to come to an agreement on the project design, timeline, data specs, and individual deliverables. Exact Date TBD as soon as funding is confirmed.
- September 23-24th Interim Project Check-in Meeting: The Project Leadership Team will take advantage of being together again at the SEEA Conference in Columbia, SC, to discuss the project design format that has resulted from the initial meeting and make plans for implementing the data collection period.
- Around March, 2021 Final Project Leadership Team Meeting: A final meeting will be held in Asheville, NC to review the findings and develop an action plan for next steps toward implementing the recommendations in the final report. Exact Date TBD as soon as funding is confirmed.

The ideal candidate will have connections to partners and stakeholders throughout the state, understand the EE provider landscape and political landscape of your state, and be equipped to work directly with your organization throughout this process. The ideal candidate will understand your affiliate's programs and operations, and will be committed to supporting state-level work after the initial analysis. Staff or committed board members are both good options; however, affiliates may choose to hire an external contractor if needed.

I will be in touch with more details once we receive notice of funding.

SEEA at a Glance: Questions and Answers

1. What is SEEA?

The Southeastern Environmental Education Alliance (SEEA) is a network of state affiliates of the North American Association for Environmental Education (NAAEE) located in the southeast region of the U.S. - EPA Region 4. The region is composed of the eight states below.

NAAEE Affiliate Organizations

- AL Environmental Education Association of Alabama
- **FL** League of Environmental Educators in Florida
- GA Environmental Education Alliance of Georgia
- **KY** Kentucky Association for Environmental Education
- MS Mississippi Environmental Education Association
- NC Environmental Educators of North Carolina
- SC Environmental Education Association of South Carolina
- TN Tennessee Environmental Education Association

2. What is SEEA's Mission?

The mission of the Southeast Environmental Education Alliance (SEEA) is to provide southeastern state environmental education associations and their members with valuable networking and communication opportunities that lead to greater success for all.

3. How is SEEA structured?

The SEEA Leadership Team includes two representatives from each state, including a Chair-elect, Chair, and Past Chair which are elected from the 16 representatives. SEEA has a part-time Executive Director and part-time Education Director. Funding for these positions comes, in part from contributions from member states. The return on investment for the money paid by each state to support a SEEA Executive Director has been 2-4 times the contribution.

4. How does SEEA help the individual states?

SEEA helps the state NAAEE Affiliates in a variety of ways. SEEA seeks to procure funding through grants and other means to help the state affiliates. SEEA also compiles and provides shared resources so individual states don't have to invent everything from scratch. These resources include:

- o Strategic Plans
- o Policy Manuals
- o Job Descriptions and Personnel Policies
- o Forms
- o Marketing plans
- o Fundraising or Outreach Videos
- o Other documents

States can choose to participate in various opportunities such as grants but they are not obligated to do so. Participation on each initiative is voted on by the state affiliate board/council.

5. Does SEEA hold a conference or regular meetings?

The SEEA Leadership Team holds monthly conference calls and participates in a yearly leadership retreat. SEEA partners with one of the eight SE states each year to co-sponsor a conference, which doubles as the conference for both the state affiliate and SEEA.

6. What is SEEA working on currently?

Current SEEA Projects include:

- Creating and implementing a new SEEA work plan for the next few years.
- Planning a SEEA regional ee360 retreat that will bring teams of up to five from each state affiliate.

- Determining organizational structure and investigating the possibility of becoming a regional affiliate of NAAEE.
- Providing networking opportunities such as a SEEA meeting at the NAAEE Annual Conference.
- Facilitating communication among affiliate groups through various means, including monthly conference calls, periodic email updates, and postings on the SEEA website around various topics of mutual interest.
- Sharing resources such as newsletters, conference attendance opportunities, and general organizational information.
