

EDITOR'S CORNER

What is ABATE? On the cover of this newsletter is what the acronym stands for:

A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments

So what does that mean? **A Brotherhood** is a group of people who gather together

to accomplish goals that they believe in.

Against means opposed to. That leaves Totalitarian Enactments. According to the dictionary, this is the definition of **totalitarian**: to•tal•i•tar•i•an, adjective: 1. of or relating to a system of government that is centralized and dictatorial and requires complete subservience to the state.

The term **enactment** has this meaning in the Oxford English Dictionary: en•act•ment noun \-'nak(t)-mənt\ Definition of ENACTMENT, 1: the act of enacting : the state of being enacted 2: something (as a law) that has been enacted. To paraphrase, a totalitarian enactment is a law that has been passed by a dictatorial government.

So as ABATE members we have gathered together to oppose laws that are passed by a dictatorial government. I believe in this wholeheartedly, as I believe that the majority of ABATE members do as well.

The way the ABATE organization is set up is that the leadership is governed by the members. Each member has a vote and can exercise that vote on various issues that determine the policies and bylaws of ABATE. These



votes are collected at Chapter meetings and the consensus is then brought to the BOD meeting by the Chapter Coordinator who then casts the Chapter vote on behalf of the chapter members.

There are others appointed to specific committees and duties, like Newsletter Editor or Products Committee Chair. Each of the committees is responsible to perform certain tasks for ABATE and answers to the Deputy Coordinator that oversees that committee. Typically there is a budget requested for each committee that you as a member will get to vote on in your chapter meeting once a year.



I will make sure that your individual vote on ABATE issues is not ignored and that your chapter vote is heard at the BOD meetings. Your vote is important to me.


I am a good listener and welcome ideas that will help ABATE grow and improve.

Olympia WA - Washington joined other States around the nation On March 31st as Governor Jay Inslee signed a Proclamation that makes the month of "May 2014 Motorcycle Awareness Month".

The proclamation fortifies a resolution that unanimously passed the State Senate in January of this year. The resolution, SR8671, was prime sponsored and presented to the voting body by State Senator Sharon Brown (8th LD), and was co-sponsored by Senators Jan Angel (26th LD), Mike Padden (4th LD), John Braun (20th LD), Michael Baumgartner (6th LD), Pam Roach (31st LD), and Bruce Dammeier (25th LD).

ABATE of Washington is very proud to have worked with our elected officials to commemorate the entire month of MAY 2014 as a time to ask that drivers remember that as Spring turns to Summer, the number of motorcycles on Washington roadways will increase, drivers need to be mindful that motorcycles are often difficult to see. By not driving distracted, drivers can focus on the road and be more aware of motorcycles and other traffic situations. Also, it is important to remember that motorcycles are legal vehicles, and have the same rights and responsibilities as other types of motor vehicles. By allowing motorcycles a full lane length, and by remembering to signal when changi lanes or making turns, drivers can help to keep these riders safe.

The proclamation encourages all related state departments to utilize technologies to promote caution and observe these smaller vehicles throughout the year in Washingte ABATE is working with WSDOT to get the message out on highway reader boards a Public Service Announcements.

As stated in the Governors proclamation, "I urge all people in our state to join me i special observation".

CYCLE TECH

Ethanol and Your Bike By 8 Ball Brian

E thanol in fuel like E-10 or E-15 can cause a great number of problems for your motorcycle. Beyond just running poorly, using ethanol fuels can actually shorten the life expectancy of rubber seals and fuel lines, and seriously damage your engine. Fuel economy will also suffer; by as much as 12% for carbureted bikes and up to about 4% for fuel injected bikes. The following is just a short overview of some of the problems that ethanol fuels can cause you and your motorcycle.

Carburetion Issues

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Ethanol can cause carburetor jets to become clogged. Also, the floats can soften, which means they don't function properly. Leaving the bike difficult to idle, and running rough.

Fuel Tanks

The alcohol in ethanol attracts water like crazy. This can lead to rust forming in your fuel tanks. Even to the point of causing leaks within a relatively short period of time. Since most fuel treatments to remove water from fuel contain alcohol as well, adding them does little to help the problem, and can exacerbate it. When the ethanol separates into gas and alcohol in your fuel tank, it can really speed up the rust process. As well as causing other issues with performance.

Fuel Economy

With carbureted motorcycles, fuel economy can be reduced by as much as 12%. Fuel injection has a somewhat lower loss rate, but it is still in the 3-4% range. This is in part due to the fuel injection system being able to adjust to the lower BTU of the ethanol fuel.

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Horse Power

Ethanol reduces horsepower, partly due to its lower BTU level. Partly due to the fact that to average the final octane rating, a much lower octane level gasoline is mixed with the much higher octane ethanol. When the two separate in your fuel tank, you first burn through the lower octane gasoline. This can lead to pinging, and even detonation in your motor. Then, when the gasoline is used up, the now nearly pure alcohol is fed into your motor. This sudden change can cause damage and performance issues.

Fuel Lines

You should make sure that the fuel lines you are using will not deteriorate when using ethanol fuel. Some rubber fuel lines can become brittle and crack. They can also begin to decompose and bits break off from the inside and flow with the fuel. This can cause clogs in your fuel injection or carburetor jets. Either way, whether your fuel line becomes brittle and cracks (leaking fuel over your hot motor or you as you ride), or breaks down and clogs your fuel system it can lead to costly repairs in the shop later. So be sure your fuel lines are approved for use with ethanol.

Here is an experiment you can do for yourself that will show you just how quickly ethanol fuel will breakdown

Take a pair of pint Mason jars and fill them about three quarters of the way with ethanol. Drop a small, but clean new nut and bolt into each jar. Then, to one jar add a little bit of fuel preservative (Sta-bil, or an equivalent). Mark both jars with a sharpie to show the fuel level. Seal both jars and put them in a covered area and forget about them for a few weeks or a month.

After the month has passed, take a look, and you should see that quite a bit of the fuel has evaporated (in your fuel tank this evaporation will help promote rust). Also, check out and compare the two jars of fuel to each other. Do they look the same? And how does the bolt look inside of each one? Now put them back on the shelf for another couple of months. Imagine these jars as your fuel tanks sitting over winter when you don't get to ride as much.

When you check back on the jars after two or three months, I have a feeling you will be amazed at how downright nasty the fuel looks. Especially the untreated jar of fuel. Can you imagine how that would burn in your engine? And how does that nice shiny new nut and bolt look? That is how the metal parts of your fuel tank, and fuel system will begin to look. If you are like many riders and take your bike to the shop for repairs, how much does a carburetor rebuild, or an injector replacement cost? Or even worse, if it should clog or even close off a carburetor jet, leaning out your fuel way too much. That can cause some serious (and costly) damage to your motor.

If at all possible, I would advise using non-ethanol gasoline. Yes, I know it can be difficult to find. Personally, I know of only one gas station here in east Lewis County that has it, but luckily it is close to where I work, so I use it as often as I can. If you can't find non-ethanol fuel, then I would suggest a treatment that stabilizes ethanol. Some of the better ones that I (or friends of mine) have had good experience with are Lucas and Spectro brands.

As long as the government is so intent on forcing us to use ethanol fuels, we need to be smart about it and protect our motors and fuel systems. One of the things ABATE members can do is to contact your Congressman and Senator in Washington, DC and ask them to support our efforts to force the EPA to remove the requirement for ethanol fuels. It isn't really a 'Green' solution since it lowers fuel mileage, which then means we are using more of it. But then, it is really all about control, and not really about the environment. Catch you on the road sometime. \Diamond

CDC Task Force Pushes Universal Mandatory Helmet Law The Motorcycle Riders Foundation (MRF) reports that a task force that is funded by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) has issued its findings statement for motorcycle safety, with the singular solution being universal mandatory helmet laws.

The CDC asserts that fatalities have nearly doubled since 2000 while failing to take into account the increase in registered motorcycles. In fact, in 2000 there were 2,862 fatal crashes for 4.9

million registered motorcycles. That means in 2000 .058% of all registered motorcycles were involved in a fatal crash. In 2010 there were 4,502 fatalities for 8.4 million registered motorcycles, which puts just .053% of registered motorcycles, a slight decrease in the ratio of registered motorcycles to fatalities

with 3.5 million more motorcycles on the road. These are just some of the facts about the CDC research that have been presented in all four MRF conferences going back to fall of 2012. "It is deeply troubling that some of our brightest researchers refuse to acknowledge rider education and awareness campaigns as effective means to saving lives," said Jeff Hennie, Vice President of Government Relation and Public Affairs for the MRF. The MRF worked with the House of Representatives to send a letter to the CDC asking them to not focus on motorcycle safety, but rather leave that to the relevant transportation agencies. The CDC's response was that they needed to be involved in all preventable injuries, because they have the newest research available.

Community Preventative Services Task Force Recommends Universal Helmet Laws Nationwide

Before we get to the subject matter at hand, let me address two important preliminary matters. The first is explaining what the Community **Preventative Services Task Force** (CPSTF) is. The second is to explain the purpose of this article. The CPSTF is a task force whose members are appointed by the Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for the purpose of providing studies which recommend programs and policies to improve health. Their latest report focuses on motorcycle fatalities and injuries. The study recommends universal motorcycle helmet laws as the sole method to reduce fatalities and injuries. The report fails to address ways to prevent or reduce motorcycle crashes. There is no mention of motorcycle training and education. The recommendation instead focuses on surviving the inevitable crash.

Now for the purpose of this article. First and foremost let me explain what the purpose is not. I am neither attacking nor defending universal motorcycle helmet laws. As of this writing, 19 states have made the decision to keep them in place while 31 states have elected to allow motorcycle riders to make their own decision about wearing helmets. It is a topic which sparks much debate and disagreement within the riding community as a whole. The purpose of this article is to suggest that we motorcyclists should not simply accept what we are told by official sounding entities. Before we accept restrictions being placed upon us, perhaps we should ask some hard questions rather than accept the opinions of those who want to convince us that motorcycling is inherently dangerous, and that we are all destined for a terrible

crash. Trust me; it is not just governmental entities that want to convince us of this. Each one of us have been at a social gathering where someone, upon finding out that we ride a motorcycle, has felt the need to tell us about their family member or friend who died in a horrific motorcycle accident. I have never had that happen when someone found out that I purchased a car. I guess people don't die in car crashes. But I digress. Let's get back to the CPSTF.

The CPSTF's latest recommendation comes on the heels of the CDC study that came to the same conclusion, which is that all states should have universal motorcycle helmet laws. The CPSTF points to several factors in making its recommendation. They point to increased motorcycle fatalities. They claim that states with universal motorcycle helmet laws experience less motorcycle related fatalities while states that allow adults to choose whether or not to wear a helmet experience more motorcycle related fatalities. The CPSTF claims that wearing a motorcycle helmet reduces the risk of a fatal injury by 42%. Finally the CPSTF claims that states which implement universal motorcycle helmet laws experience an economic benefit, while states that repeal universal helmet laws experience increased costs. Let's take each of these assertions and ask some questions based upon data provided by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), and the Federal Highway Administration (FDHA). Both websites are below should you wish to look this up for yourself.

First let's look at rising motorcycle fatalities. One thing that NHTSA looks at with overall motor vehicle fatalities is motor vehicles fatalities per 100,000 registered motor vehicles. That gives the raw number some context. What happens when we do the same with motorcycle related fatalities? The most recent numbers provided by the federal government give us motorcycle related fatalities and motorcycle registrations for the years 2008 to 2011. In 2008 there were 5,312 motorcycle related fatalities nationwide. In 2011 there were 4,612. In 2008, the number of motorcycle related fatalities per 100,000 registered motorcycles was 68.93. By 2011 that number had steadily declined to 56.44. It would appear that motorcyclists are moving the numbers in the right direction. Being that there was no change in the number of states that had universal motorcycle helmet laws during that time period, it is hard to conclude that universal helmet laws are responsible for the decrease in motorcycle related fatalities. Could it be that increased focus on training and education is having a positive effect? It is impossible to tell with any certainty. However, learning how to avoid a crash is a more appealing strategy in my book that merely trying to survive one.

Next let's look at the claim that that states with universal motorcycle helmet laws experience less motorcycle related

fatalities than states which allow adults to choose whether or not to wear a helmet. If we were to look at motorcycle related fatalities in all of the states which have universal helmet laws and compare them to motorcycle related fatalities in states which allow choice, shouldn't we see a disparity between the two groups of states? If wearing a motorcycle helmet reduces the risk of a fatal injury by 42%, shouldn't we see a rather large disparity between the two groups of states? Interestingly, that is not the case. Between 2008 and 2011, jurisdictions with mandatory motorcycle helmet laws averaged 60.26 motorcycle related fatalities per 100,000 registered motorcycles. States with laws allowing adults to choose whether or not to wear a helmet averaged 57.90 motorcycle related fatalities per 100,000 registered motorcycles during that same period. Given those numbers, I am left with no choice but to seriously question the claims made by the CPSTF.

Finally let's look at the CPSTF's conclusion with regard to the economic impact of universal helmet laws. The CPSTF claims that 12 studies looked at the economic benefit after implementation of universal helmet laws, and that four directly comparable studies reported benefits ranging from \$29.3

million dollars to \$96.1 million dollars per 100,000 registered motorcycles per year. They further assert that five studies looked at the economic impact of repealing universal helmet laws and that three directly comparable studies reported increased costs ranging from \$1.8 million dollars to \$27.2 million dollars per 100,000 registered motorcycles per year. At face value, that would cause one to conclude that universal helmet laws save money, while laws allowing choice cost money. However, let's ask a few important questions. First, how did these studies come to these conclusions? The first claim is that the implementation of universal helmet laws resulted in benefits ranging from 29.3 million dollars to 96.1 million dollars per 100,000 registered motorcycles. Why is there a gap of 67 million dollars between these estimates? That seems rather large. How were these estimates calculated? How old are these studies? Other than Louisiana, no state has implemented a universal helmet law in over twenty years. Additionally, why is it that the costs suffered from repealing a universal helmet law is anywhere between 1.8 million dollars and 27.2 million dollars, but the benefit of implementing one is anywhere between 29.3 million dollars to 96.1 million dollars?

Shouldn't the numbers be the same? Shouldn't the cost of repealing a universal helmet law be comparable to the benefit of implementing one? Finally, if the CPSTF's claims are true, why don't we see higher health and motor vehicle insurance premiums in states which allow choice while seeing lower premiums in states with universal helmet laws? I highly doubt that the insurance industry would simply absorb such costs without passing them on to the consumer. Yet there is no evidence that states which allow adults to choose whether or not to wear a motorcycle helmet experience higher premiums than states which have universal helmet laws.

In the end, every rider must decide for themselves whether they believe that universal motorcycle helmet laws are a reasonable restriction on riders, or an unwarranted intrusion upon personal choice. I would merely suggest that in making that decision we not simply accept as true recommendations and conclusions merely because they come from official sounding entities. Groups can have agendas, and a study can be a tool for advocacy rather than an objective analysis of accurate data. Speaking for myself, I find the latest recommendation of the CPSTF to be the former and not the latter. ◊



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
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

Policies for the ABATE Newsletter

The deadline for submissions to the ABATE Newsletter is the 15th of the month prior to publication.

Chapter reports must be submitted by the Chapter Coordinator, Deputy Coordinator or a person authorized by the Chapter Coordinator in writing.

Chapter announcements and flyers are free with the following restrictions:

- Chapters are limited to one full page ad per month
- If the event is during the first week of the month, then a full page ad is allowed in the previous month's issue.
- If the event is not in the first week of the month, the full page ad is limited to the issue published in the month of the event.
- Chapters may place ¹/₄ page ads for up to two months prior to the event except for the issue that the full page ad is inserted. Chapters may not have a ¹/₄ page ad and a full page ad for the same event in the same issue. Full page ads may be allowed if there is space available in months prior to the month of the event at the sole discretion of the Newsletter Team.
- All flyers submitted for publication for Chapter events must have "ABATE of Washington" and the Chapter name at the top of the flyer. Use of the ABATE logo is optional. Any flyers submitted without this information will not be considered Chapter events and will be subject to policies contained in these rules. This may require payment before the flyer can be published.

Charities with 501 (c) (3) status must submit a copy of their IRS status letter to the Newsletter Team before their ad can be published. All events must be motorcycle related. There is no charge for charities to place ads under these conditions on a space available basis. If there is no space available, the charity has the option to pay for the ad at current published rates.

No other discounts or free ads will be allowed.
