A Double Delight: Michael Ben and Illene Komisarow Maurer *Young* Musicians Contest and Side-by-Side Concert

Our 2022-23 Maurer Young Musicians Contest celebrated with an ISO Lunchtime Concert on Wednesday, July 12, 2023. Lily Sullivan, the winner, entertained approximately 225 enthusiastic audience members with a brilliant performance of Sergei Prokofiev's Violin Concerto No. 2, First Movement, to enthusiastic

applause in admiration of her talent. Lily, age 16, is a merit scholarship Fellow at the Music Institute of Chicago's Academy. She lives in Bloomington, IN, and studies privately with IU Professor of Music, Grigory Kalinovsky, All three Maurer Competition prize donors or their representatives were able to enjoy hearing Lily and the ISO "Make beautiful music together."

Plans are underway for the 2023-24 season of the Maurer Competition and the long-awaited return of the Side-by-Side Concert. Save the date (Tuesday, March 19, 2024, at 6:30 p.m. at the Hilbert Circle Theater) for this celebration of talented young musicians playing with the ISO in this exciting concert. Being able to play on stage with Symphony members in the HCT has inspired many Indiana music students to pursue careers as musicians.

This year's Maurer competition will have two divisions: one for high school (whose winner will solo at the March concert) and a junior high division of competition (whose winner will receive a prize but will not solo with the ISO). Students who place at the junior high level are eligible to compete again in the high school division the following year. The first round of the Maurer Competition will be virtual, but the final round will take place in person in the HCT Wood Room in February.

Auditions are open state-wide for students to be selected for the Side-by-Side program. The schedule for the program will be compressed into a three-week period before the concert in March. MYO Update

The Metropolitan Youth Orchestra kicked off their 2023-2024 season on September 5. We are so glad to be back in the swing of things. We have six alumni on staff this year as well as five ISO current or retired players. Our chamber orchestra got right to work and had their first gig playing the National Anthem for the Indiana Fever game. Other performances included Broadway United Methodist Church's 150th anniversary celebration and the ISO opening night gala cocktail reception. Our high school students will have their first Financial Literacy session in October courtesy of Bank of America.

The program culminates in a juried exhibition in the Hilbert Circle Theatre, home of the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra and the Indiana State Museum.

Symphony In Color brings children, music, and visual art together. Under the direction of a teaching professional, children interpret recorded selections of symphonic music through their artistic creations. The musical selections for the contest have been chosen from the repertoire of the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra's current season.







An Awarding Experience! - A judging process involving professionals from education, art, and music results in 100 finalists. Thirty-six Gold Ribbon winners and a Pacini award winner are chosen from the finalists and exhibited at the Hilbert Circle Theatre. A People's Choice Luncheon is held for ISO musicians and staff where they choose a People's Choice award winner. All 100 finalists are exhibited at the Indiana State Museum. Gold Ribbon winners are honored at an Awards Tea at the Hilbert Circle Theatre.







All Indiana schools, public, private, parochial, and home schools, are invited to participate. Students in grades 1 through 6 as well as students with special educational needs are eligible.

Chef Denis showed off his culinary skills with a delectable menu. Several attendees commented on the quality of the food and the servers' efficiency.



to pieces by Dmitri Shostakovich (whose work was denounced in 1948, but the censure was rescinded in 1956).

The concert was a lesson for us all on the power of music in our world.

Remember the Paramount organ concert



Our "Remember the Paramount" theatre organ concert on October 1 drew a multi-generational music loving crowd to the Hilbert Circle Theatre to hear four of the original artists who played at the Paramount Music Palace. The "rock-stars" were Ken Double, Donna Parker, Dwight Thomas, and Bill

Vlasak. Their skills were on full display along with their personalities. The program included some of the Paramount



standard pieces referred to as the "Dirty 30"—the tunes the organists were asked to play every night.

"Remember the Paramount" paid tribute to the Paramount Music Palace located at East Washington Street near I-465 and operated from 1979 - 1995. The showpiece there was the Paramount Publix I (opus 2164), better known as the Mighty Wurlitzer. That instrument was one of the largest

theatre organs in the nation, and the 500-seat restaurant had to be built around it. The Paramount was the place for holiday, office, and birthday parties. Honoring the birthday tradition, Sunday's concert guests with birthdays or anniversaries over the weekend were recognized with the audience singing Happy Birthday.



The Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra Association (ISOA) and the Central Indiana Chapter of the American Theatre Organ Society (CICATOS) were excited to join together for this organ concert fundraiser. Proceeds from the event (with 975 tickets sold) will support ISOA's Symphony in Color educational program and help fund maintenance and upkeep of the ISO's Wurlitzer Theatre Organ. One of the main goals for these last two organ concerts is to bring focus to this terrific instrument, and we hope there will be more similar concerts to come. For you organ
