HAVE SAW — WILL MODIFY

I have always been attracted to coal drags and associated mining operations. My previous layouts incorporated at least one coal mine and lots and lots of hopper cars. Moving to my present home in 2004, my layout now being 60% smaller than my old one, I still had to have a mine with coal drags, so I built one with 2 loading tracks each about 2 feet long.


After 12 years, I realized that the mine did not fit in with the surrounding scene. It dominated the mountain. Furthermore, I was not running long coal drags on this smaller layout. Something had to be done.

Bruce De Young and Chuck Diljak visited one afternoon to help in resolving the corner I boxed myself into. They suggested that perhaps a simple truck dump site would work. At last, a new direction. From the web, I was able to find many photos of such sites that would fit in.


Never one to hesitate to rip something out and rebuild, I manned the cutting tools and before I knew it, the mine and its tracks were removed and the area cleaned up. I was left with a depression in the mountain where the mine shaft was, so instead of filling it in, I found and old metal shed in the scrap box and made a small abandoned mine.


Right: A small shed representing an abandoned mine was found to replace the large mine complex.

A new road, made from a few laminated sections of 1 inch rigid foam, was built to fit 2.5 inches above a single spur track (for hopper loading).

At the end of the new road, from scrap dimensional lumber, I built a short trestle to support the dump trucks. The road guard rail was made from bamboo barbeque skewers and the simulated wire from .015 inch diameter solder. A little paint, ground cover, trees and shrubs completed the scene.

I am pleased with the results. It made the mountain appear larger gave the scene a more restful look in keeping with my laid back operations of short trains headed by light steam. By the way, I can still spot one or two hoppers. As a side note, this entire mountain is made from rigid foam and is removable to access the mainline run through it.

Moral: If it does not look or feel right, don't be afraid to rip it out and make it right. WP




NER 2017 CONVENTION REGISTRATION OPEN: RAILS TO THE GILDED AGE


