A Beautiful Day in Ramsey

It was a beautiful autumn day for the GSD Fall Meet. There were two enjoyable clinics given in the morning followed by layout tours of seven layouts and a museum.

Bryan Bussey of Eastern Seaboard Models (www.esmc.com), gave a clinic on Rapid Prototyping. Most of those in attendance were amazed at the level of detail that Bryan was able to accomplish in N scale. There were many requests by members for Bryan to consider producing his N scale products in other scales. Bryan covered the design process, materials, and manufacturing of his models.

Fred Dellaiacono gave an informative and entertaining presentation on his under table roundhouse. When Fred was faced with having many locomotives and no space on the layout for a turntable and roundhouse, he developed a "cartridge" system of bringing his locomotives onto the layout and storing the cartridges underneath the layout. This eliminated the handling of delicate steam locomotives.

The layout tours were also enjoyed by the membership. O scale, HO scale, N scale, narrow gauge, and standard gauge were all represented in the layout tours.

Two home layouts were open in the afternoon. Fred Delliacono and Ted Brandon opened their homes for everyone to see their HO and On30 empires. Several clubs also had their doors open. The NYSME club had both layouts, HO and O, up and running for the GSD. The Ramapo Valley had their HO scale layout running and there was also an N-Trak club that had some of their modules set up in the home of one of their club members.

Maps to see prototype sites during the layout tours was also provided. And, as a bonus, those in attendance were able to tour the Old Mahwah Station and an Erie caboose as part of the Mahwah Museum. The Museum even had an HO layout to see.

So, another successful meet came to a close. And, now we look forward to the next meet in Scotch Plains in February. Keep an eye on our website!

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COVING THE CORNERS ON THE OLD MAIN LINE!

Although several prolific modelers have downplayed the worthiness of coving so I fiddled with the idea of somehow keeping the staples. corners, my perfectly sheet-rocked corners still bugged me as I reached the point of "now or never." So I decided to find a way to use an available 4 x 8 ft. The photos show my solution using 2 in. vertical strips of .040 styrene glued to against, thereby holding it in place. I was not willing to take such a leap of faith, mented with j-moulding on a 1x2 frame for support.

sheet of .040 styrene that would be strong, but not so much as to cause signified each of my 16 x 24 in. corner pieces and exposing a ½ in. tab for stapling on cant damage to the sheetrock when the eventual day comes to move. For both each side. Then successive coats of mud using 3 in., 4 in. and 6 in. trowels of those reasons I determined that any type of adhesive was out. I was intrigued ramp up easily against the styrene edge covering the staples. Sanding, priming however, by a recent on-line article that used temporary stapling while a ramp and painting finished off the task easily.
