Annual GSD/NJD Joint Event to be held in Hillsborough on May 4


The GSD is hosting this years' annual joint event with the New Jersey Division on May 4th. It will be held in the multi purpose room at the Hillsborough Township Municipal Building. This will be the third time the GSD will meet at this venue, which provides plenty of meeting space and parking. The doors open at 8:30 with activities running from 9:00 to 12:00 Noon. Two clinics with three home layouts in the afternoon are featured.

Richard Newmiller, MMR, will present a clinic on building his Diamond Glass Factory structure. This model took the highest score at the 2018 NER Convention. Rich will explain the techniques he used to create this contest winning model.

The second clinic is contributed by the NJ Division. Kenneth Stockton will present a clinic on the Raritan River Rail Road [RRRR]. Ken, in addition to being a model railroader, was the last engineer to operate a train on the RRRR. His family goes back four generations working for the railroad so he will tell stories about the railroad as well as its history.

In addition to the usual refreshments, display tables, Bring and Brag segment, and sales tables, the GSD will conduct the annual business meeting and elections. The slate of candidates can be found on Page 3.

The home layouts of Bill Chapin, Andy Rubbo, and Jim Homoki will be open in the afternoon. This is the first time Bill will be open. He has started construction of a 1952 era New Haven layout on three levels. He does not yet have

GSD to Tour the High Line and Cruise on the John J. Harvey, June 1

The Garden State Division (GSD) hosted an unusual event, in 2018, with a meet beginning at a microbrewery in the morning followed by a ride on the Black River and Western Railway in the afternoon. This year, we are offering another unusual event: a walking tour of the High Line on the lower west side of Manhattan in the morning and a ride on the John J. Harvey fireboat in the afternoon.

The day will begin at 9:30 AM by meeting at the 23rd Street entrance to the High Line at street level. Then, we will start the two hour walk on the old High Line, built by the New York Central Railroad and New York City in the 1930s to replace the street running rail lines. Today, it is a city park and we will walk the section from W. 23rd St. to 30th St., guided by GSD member Mason Logie, a licensed New York

City tour guide. The park has plenty of benches along the route to rest and elevators located where the tour will begin and end. To learn more about the High Line park,

In addition to seeing the High Line in the morning, we will also see some of the structures built by the railroads that are still in existence, today. Since these structures have been repurposed and are active commercial properties, we will not be able to access the interiors, however. We will see:

 the site of the old Erie Lackawanna railyard that was used until 1972.

- the Terminal Stores Warehouse building built in 1891, which was at one time serviced by three railroads. It still has a doorway for double track railroad lines going through the building.
- the Starrett-Lehigh building built by the Lehigh Valley Railroad in 1930 over it's existing railyard. It had elevators that could lift 40' foot boxcars from one floor to another.
- the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad warehouse that was built in 1914. It was still in use as late as 1973.
- the B&O float bridge that is still in existence today.

Lunch will be on Pier 66, between W. 26th and W. 27th streets. This is also where the John J. Harvey is docked. Lunch will be at the participant's expense at a restaurant on the pier that is on an old New Haven Railroad car float barge.

At 1:30 PM we will board the John J. Harvey museum boat for a cruise. When the boat was built in 1931, it was the largest and most powerful fireboat in the world. The boat was retired in 1995 and rescued in 1999, when it was restored. The boat was called back to active duty on September 11, 2001 to fight the fires at the World Trade Center Site. To get to the High Line, where the tour will begin, take the PATH train or the C/E Subway line to W 23rd Street. There are also parking garages available at this location.

LAYOUTS FOR THE MAY EVENT

The home layouts of Bill Chapin, Andy Rubbo, and Jim Homoki will be open the afternoon of May 4 from 1:00-4:00. Maps and addresses will be provided at the event. This page features a few photos of Bill's layout, which is in the early stages of construction. It will be the first time it is open for a Division event.

Bill's layout, the New Haven RR Western Division (right and below) is set in the early fall of 1952. He was able to obtain a lot of New Haven RR information for this time period: locomotive assignments, including those in extra service and inspection, caboose assignments, company service car assignments, passenger train schedules and train make up by day of the week including pick ups and drop offs, LCL operations,



valuation maps, Sanborn maps, etc. This helped in deciding extents of the layout based on an understanding the operations and the fixed plant. Three distinct sections of the NH are being modeled on three decks, eventually to be connected with a helix. Finishing of the basement is underway and should be completed by May.

Andy Rubbo's PRR layout (upper right) is well known to many in our area. He models the electrified main line of the PRR through Northern NJ. The catenary is museum quality and the primary feature, but just as much attention is paid to the track and structures along the right-of-way. Most structures are scratchbuilt to match specific prototypes. The completed section runs from Elizabeth where the PRR passes over the CNJ, west to Rahway. Accurate and era

appropriate equipment can be found running under the wires.

Several catenary construction articles written by Andy can be found in the PRRT&HS *Keystone Modeler*, and the layout was featured in the 2013 issue of *Great Model Railroads*.



Jim Homoki has a proto-freelanced layout (lower right) that features highly accurate equipment for the early 1970s era. Penn Central and CNJ are modeled on a fictitious route across New Jersey, with the Newark Terminal being a jointly owned company that provides terminal services in the Elizabeth-Newark area. The track plan is set up as two railroads with connections, the PC having a two-track main, and the CNJ single track. Jim has been open for GSD events several times in the past.

The PC locomotives include old units, new units, and patchouts of PRR, NYC, and NH heritage. The CNJ hosts pool trains of the era that ran with B&O, RDG, and EL power. Most units are sound equipped.

An expansion has recently started, which will occupy much of his time for the next several months.WP

TOOLS AND TIPS: GOOD FOR A SLICE, A CUT, OR STRIPS

I never used a rotary cutter before I discovered one on the rack of leather craft supplies in a local craft store. It looked interesting and I thought it could be useful to cut certain types of material. Since then I found that besides the leather hobby, quilters use these cutters for their materials. The action of using a rolling blade for cutting is well known for slicing pizza but I never saw it used outside the kitchen. Unlike a pizza cutter, a rotary cutter's blade is replaceable. My Fall 2018 "Tools and Tips" column explains how to model corrugated metal roofing from aluminum foil. To make a roof using that technique, I cut many pieces of foil but the foil rips in my sliding paper cutter or sometimes even with a hobby knife. Then I remembered the rotary cutter and I discovered that this is a great tool for cutting aluminum foil.

One day while browsing through Harbor Freight, I saw a package of rotary cutter blades sized to fit my cutter. I bought the package of two blades and took them home to see how they worked with my tool. As I handled the blades, I had an idea that if I could roll them together in parallel, I would make two cuts at once and make strips as easily as a making a single cut. That was my challenge as I searched through my garage looking for parts that could be assembled into a rotary strip cutter. The parts that I selected were:

- A broken sliding patio door flanged wheel with a ball bearing
- A machine bolt that fit through the hole in the ball bearing and rotary blades
- A U-bolt that could curve around the wheel and fit between the wheel flanges
- Some nuts that fit the U-bolt and the machine bolt

To assemble the strip cutter, I positioned the U-bolt around the wheel and pressed the free ends in a vice to squeeze them until they almost touched. When pressing the U-bolt in the vice, be sure to have nuts on free ends to protect the threads from being damaged. I used epoxy to bond the U-bolt to the wheel centered between the flanges. After the epoxy cured I tried to test the basic assembly and I discovered that I needed a handle and a blade quard. I learned the hard way how well the blades cut when they are turning. The handle was made with a coupling nut and a 4 inch carriage bolt. The blade guard was made from some clear plastic packaging with a slot that would pass part of the U-bolt ends. To attach the blade guard, place a hex nut on one of the U-bolt ends and then place the blade guard onto the ends. The coupling nut secures the blade guard against the hex nut. Finally, the carriage bolt is threaded into the coupling nut. Check the accompanying photo showing the finished tool in operation and how it looks after assembly. My tool cuts strips that are the 3 scale feet needed for the width of my corrugated roofing panels. The tool cuts the strips and I use the single blade rotary cutter to trim them to length for each roof panel. WP




where his name was engraved and added to the list of previous recipients. For more details about the award click here http://www.nergsd.com/docs/ Paul Mallery.pdf.


