Besides the many clinics he has presented we should all remember a former GSD President and AP Chair, Bruce DeYoung. One of the positive results of the pandemic is the virtual meet that allows us to have clinics presented from anywhere. In this case, Bruce will be presenting from his current home in Michigan. His clinic will be on Interior Decorations and will look at some "Why's" & "How's" of adding interiors to our models. From simple details in windows or open doors to full building interiors, Bruce will address how to avoid that vacant building appearance of many models.


Craig Bisgeier has presented several clinics at regional and division events. This time, Craig will describe a solution for the problem "When No One Makes the Models You Need". His technique is making a fleet of models you can't get any other way through molding and casting. Craig discusses how to prepare models for molding and casting, from preparing masters to creating molds and pulling castings.

In addition to the clinics, Neal Multz will guide us through a virtual tour of his Atlantic Pacific Railroad. The freelanced 20' by 20' two level HO layout features a helix, a main yard, staging yards, several industries and was built for operation.

In my previous column I wrote a little bit about what I've been doing. I'd like to continue with that theme for this issue, but first, I want to thank those who contributed to the feature that starts on Page 9. Hopefully, we'll have additional material from members for the next issue as well. Maybe you even have a project that can become an article.

I would think there are few of us that have less time available these days. However, the old problem of getting motivated to tackle a project is probably still there. I've completed work on the critical items needed on my expanded layout, but there were several that dragged on for too long. The inability since March to be able to host an operating session only helped to justify my procrastination.

The biggest problem turned out to be in my head. I wanted to develop a dispatcher's train sheet following real examples I have from the Central of New Jersey. I had already developed the timetable and a train graph for the schedule, both complex projects, and they were a relief to get done. I'm probably average in skills working with Excel, but am self taught, so the challenge was that I needed to put together something more complex than I've ever done before.

As with so many projects, the hardest part was getting started. I figured out the process for laying out slanted border lines, for example, in less time than I spent worrying about it. Below is the top half of the finished sheet. The text is very small here, as it is designed to be printed at 11" x 17". If you're reading this on your computer, just zoom in a bit.

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I'm sure you've read suggestions on how to get more done and be more productive. It's true that once you sit yourself down and get a project started, everything tends to start flowing. Spend a little time every day if you can, and before you know it that project you've been fretting over will be complete. WP

# The First NJD/GSD Joint Virtual Event a Success By Chuck Diljak

Model railroaders that attended the joint GSD/NJD meet on May 16 know the real reason for the toilet paper shortage: GSD member Fred Dellaiacono built a water scene for his layout using toilet paper. The final results were so good, Fred presented a clinic for the virtual meet on how he built it.

Seventy-five people attended the virtual meet to see Fred's clinic and a second clinic by NJD member John Gallagher. John's clinic was very unusual. Rather than presenting prototype history or a modeling technique, his clinic, called "Something Creative", challenged attendees to think. John asked attendees to sketch ideas for different scenes in a short period of time. With the time constraint, it demonstrated how you become more creative in your designs. In between the two clinics, a slide show on models built by GSD members was shown. Because of social distancing and the requirements to stay isolated, many model railroaders have been busy at their workbenches, flattening the COVID-19 curve.

# AP Corner By Chuck Diljak

Steve Ascolese would normally be writing this column, as the Garden State Division's (GSD) Achievement Program Chairman. Steve is recovering from health issues and I will be trying to fill his shoes in his absence. I do ask that everyone keep Steve in their thoughts and wish him a speedy recovery.

Recently, Steve had the opportunity to present Tom Wortmann with his seventh Achievement Program certificate, Association Official. A couple years ago, NMRA National updated the requirements for this certificate. The update made is for Division Superintendents/Presidents to qualify for the certificate after serving three years in that position. Tom served the GSD in this role for six straight years from 2005 to 2011. By earning this certificate, Tom now has seven Achievement Program certificates in his collection.

Seven? Doesn't that make you an MMR? Close, but not quite. The eleven AP certificates are organized into four major categories and you need to be awarded at least one certificate in each major category. Tom has certificates in three of the four major categories. The one that he is missing is Model Railroad Equipment, which has two options: Motive Power or Cars. Tom is working on Cars for the last certificate he needs for Master Model Railroader.

Because of the times, Steve was unable to present the certificate to Tom at an in-person GSD event. As you read this, please give Tom a round of applause for achieving this certificate and for his service to the division!

And, speaking of the times, I am hoping everyone is taking advantage of the time at home to work on projects for their layouts and the Achievement Program.

Some AP certificates are nothing more than paperwork to submit and these are: Chief Dispatcher, Association Official, Association Volunteer, and Model Railroad Author. You can email your paperwork to me at my email address listed in this newsletter. Or, if you prefer snail mail, still contact me by email and I will provide you with my mailing address.

Other AP categories can be a combination of paperwork and a virtual demonstration of the work performed. These categories are Scenery, Civil, Prototype Models and Electrical. Like the other categories, contact me at my email address listed in this newsletter. I will coordinate with you and at least one other evaluator to set up a demonstration, virtually.

The remaining categories require up close evaluations, such as Motive Power, Cars, and Structures. For these, you will need to hold on to your paperwork and models until the next GSD in-person meet. When we do have an in-person event, let me know if you will be there with your models and paperwork. I will make sure we have evaluators at the event.

Yes, there is a pandemic going on. But, I am having a lot of fun working on the Cars certificate. That is a surprising thing for me to say, because I did not look forward to working on cars. But, here I am with two models ready for evaluation and another two planned. I have learned a lot about cars, myself, and having fun in the process. And, isn't that what the Achievement Program is all about?


## TOOLS AND TIPS: BUT WAIT, THERE'S MORE

This time I want to introduce a tool and offer a tip. Recently, I have been browsing through the member pages of the NMRA web site, nmra.org and I realized that it is a great tool. OK, so it's more a resource than a piece of hardware but it certainly can help you with model railroading. Sure there are all the public access pages that provide a wealth of model railroad information but wait... there's more - for NMRA members. With your account, you can access all the member sections including the pages for the partnership program that help you save on your hobby purchases.

After you login, you get to the member home page. From here you can access some great content available to NMRA members. From the Benefits drop down menu you can visit the NMRA Partnership Program and read the

details for getting discounts from many of the hobby's best vendors. There are two sections providing information in videos. One is the box labeled "Watch clinic videos" and that will bring you to some pages to access video presentations of clinics from past National conventions on a wide variety of clinic topics. Currently there are 147 videos listed on 10 pages and offering content useful for any model railroader. Another box labeled "Video Library" on the member home page transports you to a section with videos from premium subscription services such as Model Railroader Video Plus, Trainmaster's TV and Model Railroad Academy. Currently you can select from 6 pages of these videos. Also, don't overlook the NMRA Forums also accessed from the member home page.


The following pages show samples of the model railroading activities members are doing on their own. I am sure that many other members of the Garden State Division have some great stories. What is yours? WP




Left: Kai Ebinger has taken a break from building his city to work on other projects including assembling a rail truck and building some turnouts.
