Missing the Desert for the Details

You've likely heard the saying, "I can't see the forest for the trees." Well, last week, I couldn't "see the **desert** for the **details**."

During our teaching segment in history, my son Zachariah asked where the Sahara desert was. I directed him to the globe, giving him a hint of its general location.

He looked and looked but couldn't find it.

Since it's so huge, it should be obvious. I encouraged him to look more closely in northern Africa. He still didn't see it, so I joined him in the search. To my dismay, I couldn't find it either. I grabbed my phone and pulled up the internet. As I was about to resort to Google, my son exclaimed,

"I found it, Mom! It's so big, we couldn't see it!"

Sure enough, the words 'S A H A R A D E S E R T' were larger than life, written across the Vast expanse of northern Africa. We'd missed the ginormous letters because we'd been so focused on the tiny, detailed words written across the globe.

I have to be honest-- I love **details**. I *delight* in **details**. God Himself enjoys **detail**. Look at how specific He is in His instruction for building the ark (Genesis 6) and the temple (Exodus 32). Observe creation, and be amazed by how **detailed** He is in His creative design, utilizing a myriad of **colors**, **shapes**, and **sizes**. Not one human being's strand of DNA is identical to another. In all creation. *Ever*.

Indeed, God's **details** bless us in countless ways, as do detail-oriented people. And so do big-picture people, of course. In fact, **God is as 'big-picture' as He is detailed.** Not only does He know the end from the beginning, but He Himself *IS* the beginning and the end. (Isaiah 46:10, Revelation 22:13)

So, if God is equally **detailed** as He is **'big picture'**, it seems wise to conclude that it's important for us to keep a healthy balance between the two perspectives as well, right?

CHALLENGE

As we tread through the 'deserts of life,' it can be tempting to create mountainous dunes from a tiny grain of sand. We can be tricked into running toward a mirage, believing something is there that is not.

Are your **dust storms** so harsh that you can't see the big picture? God has lessons for us in the desert.

Whenever my son gets **overly concerned** about the **details** of life, I like to walk him **up the stairs** to get 'God's perspective.' From the loft, we'll **look down** into the living room, remembering,

"In God's hands are the deep places of the earth" (Psalm 95:4), and "He works all things together for the good of us who love Him, who are the called, according to His purpose." (Romans 8:28).

Today, I believe the Lord would say,

Take a breath, get a drink of water, and sit down to rest.

Then 'go upstairs' with Jesus, and look down at your 'living room.'

Ask Him to show you the bigger picture-- His perspective.

There's a greater purpose going on above all those details!

One of the meanings for the word Sahara is *Dawn*.

I pray even now, however huge your desert is, that God would bring forth the brightness of the dawn of His light to the same degree of the darkness of your desert.
