Elise is the 5-year old daughter of a dear friend. She's one of those children who is always **happy**. Every time I meet her, she's smiling, and when I see her smile I can't help but smile myself. Her **pleasant** demeanor is **delightfully** contagious, and I always **look forward** to being around her.

One of Elise's signature sayings is, "This is the best ever!"

If you go out for ice cream with her, you can count on her to declare, "This is the best ice cream EVER!" If you read a book with her, she'll surely proclaim, "This is the best book EVER!" If you're at the park with her, she'll undoubtedly experience a moment of sheer jubilation and announce, *"This is the best day EVER!"*

Her pronouncements are at the perfect moment,

catching everyone off guard and provoking endearing responses.

Zachariah and I will often quote Elise, as we find ourselves in the midst of a **child-like joy** about something simple, echoing her anticipated moment of **glee**: "This is the best (whatever thing we're **enjoying** at that moment) EVER!"

Late last March, a few weeks into the mandated stay-at-home order, my friend texted an **adorable** report on how Elise was doing. <u>Here is the text:</u>

> "Yesterday I picked up some extra groceries and a couple of special **treats**. Elise's response: *Best Coronavirus Ever!*"

I doubled over with **laughter**, my **heart** overflowing with simple **pleasure**. In my mind's **eye**, I could **see** her **gleaming**, fresh-faced countenance. In my head, my **ears** could **hear** her **sweet**, **engaging** voice. *Only Elise*.

Or, is it really *only* Elise? Is it possible for us to learn a lesson from this **innocent**, **carefree** child?

Now let me interject with the obvious: a worldwide virus is always **bad.** In a literal sense, no pandemic can be "the best ever." Please let it be clear that I **grieve** with all who have been **gravely touched** by this virus. The **damage** from Covid-19 has been vast and **horrible**, affecting everyone, whether physically, financially, mentally, or emotionally, to name only a few. Many of us have known someone who either had Covid-19 and recovered, had to be **guarantined** or **hospitalized**, or even **passed away** due to the illness.

My heart has **ached** for all people **harmed**, and the Lord **mourns** alongside us as well.

The reality is that Coronavirus has caused worldwide **death** and **sorrow**, and it's not over yet. But in the middle of this **dark** season, Elise's **lighthearted** statement was like a glimmer of **hope** for me. It was a marvelous prompting to consider **looking** at this tragedy through the **eyes** of a child. In so doing, it helped me **perceive** another angle of God's eternal perspective, as well.

Consider the words of Joseph in Genesis 50:20.

After decades of misery including abandonment, injustice, false accusation, undeserved imprisonment, isolation and separation from loved ones, mistreatment, loss, a smeared reputation, loneliness, a hopeless-looking future, being lied about, misunderstood, and forgotten, he finally saw the grander purpose in his suffering and heartache, remarking,

> "But as for you, you meant evil against me; but God meant it for **good**, in order to bring it about as it is this day, **to save many people alive**." Genesis 50:20

There is always a **greater** cause at hand. God **loves** us, and He is all about **salvation**! Is it possible that, in the middle of a **deadly** pandemic, as He faithfully does in all **bad** situations, God is working all this together for our **good** in some way?

Yes. Not only is it possible, but it is *guaranteed.* God has given His Word on it.

"And we know that all things work together for **good** to **those who love God**, to those **who are the called** according to His purpose." Romans 8:28

When I consider Romans 8:28 in light of Elise's response to the **yummy treats** her mom brought home that day, I can't help but think about...

baking a cake.

Each ingredient in a cake does not necessarily taste **pleasant** by itself. In fact, several are **terrible** to the tongue. Have you eaten a spoonful of salt by itself? Flour on its own is **bland** and **chalky**. How about raw egg? Baking powder? Worse yet, baking soda? **Yuck**. A cake made without key ingredients though, especially those that taste **gross** on their own, is a total flop. These ingredients mixed together with the **sweetness** of honey, sugar, molasses or your favorite **sugary** substitute can create your *best dessert ever*.

CHALLENGE

It seems we **cannot escape** the massive doses of baking soda nowadays, doesn't it?

Let's **determine** to **look** for the **flavorful blessings** in the middle of the cake. **Seek** to **discover** the whip cream, chocolate chips, caramel drizzle, fudge swirl, fruit filling, or layers of icing hidden somewhere in the mix. *And then give thanks to God. He is always giving good gifts.*

Finally, I'd be remiss to ignore a vital component of God's promise to bring **good** from **evil**. Do you notice in both 2 Corinthians 2:9 (at the top) and Romans 8:28 (above), that His covenant is for **those who love Him**? It's a blessing that is reserved only for **those who are committed and surrendered to Jesus.**

As I prayed about what to write this month, after getting permission from my friend to share this story, I found myself curious about the meaning of Elise's name. So, I looked it up.

Elise is a shortened version of the name Elisabeth, which means: God is my Oath Pledged to God God is Satisfaction

If we make God our oath, If we pledge ourselves to God and seek Him for our satisfaction, He will indeed work all this mess together for our good and His glory.

In so doing, He truly can make this the best Coronavirus ever.

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
