For just about ten months we have been hoping that our country's leadership would respond to the January 6th insurrection. It had felt to be a turning point. A challenge to our way of life. A thumb in the eye of our Republic. A daring, frightening and violent attempt to destroy our democracy. It was unquestionably led by the past president and

members of his own party who feared they might never be elected again. What has become known as the "Big Lie" has now proven to be so, in countless recounts by those who understand voting and those who do not. Even those who spoke out the day or

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days after this horrific demonstration of insurrection demanding an investigation have now been guzzling the kool aid of disaffection, greed, power-mongering and the veneration of a narcissist. What is happening to the United States of America, what is happening to our two-party system, what is happening to our Courts, what is happening to the melting pot (or stew), why are we coming apart at the seams and why is our current administration, having the power of the Presidency, the House and the Senate, seemingly disempowered?

The Supreme Court, a bastion of our democracy allowed dark money to consume our elections, corporate lobbyists to take over the running of our government, and anti-union practices to promote the power of the wealthy, the gradual wearing away of the middle class and the creation of a wholly new phenomena, the filthy rich.

As believers in Capitalism, we do not take these words lightly. But many of us come from a time, which I was very critical of back then, when corporate leaders would care about the amount of money the CEO made as a percentage of that of the lowest paid worker in the company. That kind of a measure today has little meaning. CEO's and billionaires have been golloping up the wealth of this country, and the world, at a rate that has shifted the power away from a wonderful concept of a democracy where all had influence on what we were and wanted to become.


Where is that today? The Republican party has wasted away into a ball of authoritarianism. The head of the minority in the Senate sees his role as to force the "ruling party" to fail. In fact, his most recent game has been to cause the country to fail by blocking the raising of the debt limit to buy time to keep the other party from achieving any of its objectives having won the presidency with more votes than any president in history.



OK. We all know that we are living in chaos. There is no need to argue this further, so what can we do? How can it happen that we have ourselves in the clutches of such a calamity?

There are some glimpses of hope, and we pray they will make a difference. My dear brother led me to the American Academy of Arts & Sciences and its Commission on the Practice of Democratic Citizenship. The latter's final report **OUR COMMON PURPOSE** – REINVENTING AMERICAN DEMOCRACY FOR THE 21ST CENTURY is available providing non-partisan recommendations on the practice of democratic citizenship. This scholarly and practical report offers a base from which we might explore ways to fix the mess that we are in. Google the organization and its document to look at what their thinking is all about.

About the same time as I received this from Bob, I received a fascinating OpEd piece from Barbara, a dear friend of my brother and his wife, a deeply engaged person of faith, who worshiped with us a few weeks ago. The OpEd piece from the New York Times was called, "We Should All Be a Little More Like Dorothy Day".



Dorothy, devoted to the Roman Catholic Church, was castigated by many for her views which offered concrete ideas about addressing the discord related to the poor and vulnerable. She was "deeply skeptical of bureaucracy and increasing dependence on the state, which she sardonically referred to as "the Holy Mother State." Picking and choosing from the NY Times piece, "Day would reject acquisitive populist capitalism as immoral."

With views like these, one could only imagine how those on the right and the left might react to her views. During her lifetime she was referred to as a Communist, she was characterized as naïve, and, yet "was a Christian who took the teachings of Jesus very seriously..."

She saw the abuse of workers, particularly laborers, and opposed militarization and war in her 1963 book, *Loaves and Fishes*, she envisioned the ideal family as always capable of caring for one more. "If every family that professed to follow Scriptural teaching, whether Jew, Protestant, or Catholic, were to do this, there would be no need for huge institutions, houses of dead storage where human beings waste away in loneliness and despair."

"She ultimately saw dehumanization in any form as the enemy, which led her to notice deep connections between stances that are sometimes set at odds."

"Day did not offer a comprehensive social program to solve all of society's ills. Instead, she had a vision of self-sacrificial faithfulness, loving our neighbor, and trusting the mystery of God with the results." Wow! (That's mine.)

I've already wondered about my admiration of women religious, particularly those whose lives are devoted to just this kind of thinking. May we open our eyes just a bit wider, cause our ears to become much more sensitive to the howls of vulnerability and the horrors of oppression and indifference.

Good people are called to these pursuits, today. Not for personal benefit, but for purposes that soar above the selfish and the hoarding of goodness for just a few, select beneficiaries. Let's think deeply about these things... to do nothing like this is to prolong our collective suffering, the further exploration of the very depths of Hades with its ultimate prolongation of the current, deathly chaos. We can't let that happen...

For months now our world has been shrouded in suffering and death, not limited to the pandemic for sure, yet in our country alone as we approach 700,000 deaths, or more than 233 9/11's, we are slowly but surely seeing the emergence of hope once again. And our faith communities are beginning to show the courage to tell that news to the rest of the world.

Bishop Eaton Joins Other Church Leaders at White House Meeting on Pending Economic Legislation

WASHINGTON, D.C. (Sept. 22, 2021) – Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton and other members of the Circle of Protection coalition will meet today with senior officials at the White House. Eaton and other heads of Christian denominations and organizations are working together to urge passage of the economic bills the U.S. Congress is considering now, along with voting rights legislation this fall. Today's meeting will focus on the family support bill currently being debated in Congress.

In a letter the Circle of Protection is presenting to President Joe Biden and Congress today, the coalition affirms that these pending bills "would strengthen the physical and social infrastructure of our society, cut family and child poverty more than any time in our lives, and ensure the precious right to vote for all people made in God's image."

As the final version of the family support budget bill is being negotiated, Circle of Protection members are urging Congress to retain the bill's anti-poverty provisions and to tax corporations and high-income people to pay for them. "The Bible is clear in its opposition to the concentration of wealth amid neglected human need," they noted.

"At this moment of historic decision, we are urging the people in our churches and organizations to pay attention to what the President and Congress are doing and be active in advocacy that reflects biblical priorities," the letter states. Churches and organizations in the Circle of Protection are communicating with grassroots members and sending out action alerts about poverty-focused programs such as the child tax credit. Circle members in West Virginia met with Sen. Joe Manchin last week about extending the child tax credit changes.

According to economic studies, congressional changes to the child tax credit and earned income tax credit last spring played a significant role in reducing the percentage of Americans in poverty this summer to below pre-pandemic levels. Notably, these credits were extended to low-income families and individuals. But this year's reduction of poverty will be short-lived unless the tax-credit changes are extended in the family support budget bill. The Circle of Protection letter specifically urges that the provisions benefiting low-income Americans be made permanent and fully refundable.

Circle of Protection members have worked together over the last decade to resist repeated government shutdowns and massive political pressure to cut safety-net programs. The coalition has opposed balancing the federal budget on the backs of people in poverty and strongly believes that budgets are moral documents. They have now come together in support of an unprecedented national effort to finally reduce poverty and make it possible for struggling families to get ahead.

The organizations in the Circle of Protection represent all the main branches of Christianity. They include the ELCA, Catholic Charities USA, the National Association of Evangelicals, the National Council of Churches, the National African American Clergy Network, the National Latino Evangelical Coalition, the African Methodist Episcopal Church, the Episcopal Church, Friends Committee on National Legislation, Bread for the World, Sojourners, and the Georgetown University Center on Faith and Justice.

The solar industry is changing rapidly as it experiences unprecedented growth. Here are 6 facts that may surprise you about this increasingly popular source of power.

- 6. Solar energy is the most abundant energy resource on earth -- <u>173,000 terawatts of solar energy</u> strikes the Earth continuously. That's more than 10,000 times the world's total energy use.
- 5. The first silicon solar cell, the precursor of all solar-powered devices, was built by Bell Laboratories in 1954. On the first page of its <u>April 26, 1954 issue</u>, *The New York Times* proclaimed the milestone.
- "the beginning of a new era, leading eventually to the realization of one of mankind's most cherished dreams -- the harnessing of the almost limitless energy of the sun for the uses of civilization."
- 4. The space industry was an early adopter of solar technology. In the 1950s, the space industry began to use solar technology to provide power aboard spacecraft. The <u>Vanguard 1</u> -- the first artificial earth satellite powered by solar cells -- remains the oldest manmade satellite in orbit -- logging more than 6 billion miles.
- 3. Today, demand for solar in the United States is at an all-time high. The amount of solar power installed in the U.S. has increased more than 23 times over the past eight years -- from 1.2 gigawatts (GW) in 2008 to an <u>estimated 27.4 GW at the end of 2015</u>. That's enough energy to power the equivalent of 5.4 million average American homes, according to the Solar Energy Industries Association. The U.S. is currently the third-largest solar market in the world and is positioned to become the second.
- 2. As prices continue to fall, solar energy is increasingly becoming an economical energy choice for American homeowners and businesses. Still, the biggest hurdle to affordable solar energy remains the soft costs -- like permitting, zoning and hooking a solar system up to the power gird. On average, local permitting and inspection processes add more than \$2,500 to the total cost of a solar energy system and can take up to six months to complete. The <u>SunShot Initiative</u>'s <u>soft costs program</u> works to make it faster and cheaper for families and businesses to go solar.
- 1. California's Mojave Desert is home to Ivanpah Solar Power Facility, the world's largest operating solar thermal energy plant. It uses concentrating solar power (CSP) technology to focus 173,500 heliostats, each containing two mirrors, onto boilers located in three power towers. The plant, which came online in 2014, has a gross capacity of 392 megawatts (MW). CSP technology is unique in that it allows for solar energy to be stored for use after the sun sets -- a key focus for our recent research and development efforts -- which addresses some of the concerns over delivering solar power when and where it is needed most.



Telling and Teaching the Truth: The Church's Obligation to Education about the Ongoing Legacy of the Doctrine of Discovery

From Churches Beyond Borders: Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, Anglican Church of Canada, The Episcopal Church, and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America

As another school year commences, we are reminded that the educational systems we have handed down to our children often teach national narratives that perpetuate white supremacy by deleting and ignoring the histories and contributions of Indigenous People and other marginalized communities and peoples in both Canada and the United States. The ongoing legacy of the Doctrine of Discovery and the sinful acts of racism in North America are rarely if ever taught in our school systems or churches with the fullness and import that is necessary and just.

When Christians engage history with honesty, humility and a spirit of confession, it is clear that the church was and is complicit:

- In the hunting and killing of Indigenous Peoples,
- In the dishonorable breaking of thousands of treaties that federal governments made with First Nations and Native nations,
- In the forced removal of Indigenous Peoples from their original homelands,
- In the relocation of Indigenous Peoples into reserves and reservations where poverty, starvation, desperation, missionization, addiction, and suicide were allowed to become the rule for generations of Indigenous people.
- In the making of long-term federal policies that enforced family separation,
- In the stealing of Indigenous children away to brutal assimilation camps known as Indian boarding schools in the US and residential schools in Canada,
- In the ongoing plight of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls,
- In the coverup of all of these evils, including through systemic efforts to erase Indigenous Peoples from our collective memory.

Scripture reminds us that the truth is costly. In Proverbs 23:23 we read, "Buy truth, and do not sell it; buy wisdom, instruction, and understanding" (NRSV). Our churches' work to repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery begins with the costly work of telling the truth.

Only then will we be able to start making good on our promises as churches and, together across borders, to seek truth and healing for Indigenous and non-Indigenous Peoples by:

- Providing educational opportunities for all of our churches' people,
- Leading advocacy efforts for legally mandated inclusion of accurate and truthful history and narratives of Indigenous people in our educational systems at all learning levels,
- Standing in solidarity with residential and boarding school survivors and their descendants,
- Doing the necessary research to reveal as much truth about this shameful part of our churches' histories.

If you want a clear lesson in partisan gerrymandering, what's happening in Ohio's redistricting process is it. The ACLU is already taking legal action.



Yesterday, we – along with our Ohio affiliate and Covington & Burling LLP – filed a lawsuit challenging Ohio's newly drawn maps for state House and Senate districts that give an extreme and unfair advantage to the Republican Party.

This is our first legal challenge of the nation's current redistricting cycle, but – as states continue determining new district maps in this once-in-a-decade process – it will likely not be our last.

Let me break down exactly what's happening:

- In 2015, an over 70% majority of Ohioans approved a constitutional reform specifically to stop endemic partisan gerrymandering in the state's General Assembly.
- Last week, the Ohio Redistricting Commission dominated 5 to 2 by Republicans approved new maps that lock in a Republican veto-proof supermajority in both chambers of the General Assembly. This is in blatant defiance of the 2015 reform.
- Over the past decade, Republicans have received between 46.2% and 59.7% of the statewide vote. But these newly enacted maps draw an overwhelming 67% of the House districts and 69% of the Senate districts to favor Republicans.

Not only is this a brazen abuse of power, but it's a clear violation of the Ohio Constitution. That's why we're going to court.


Gerrymandering like Ohio's is a dangerous political practice that harms communities across the country – particularly communities of color – diminishing people's representation and voting power for the next 10 years.

Too many lawmakers in the past have used redistricting in this way to manipulate electoral boundaries and influence future elections. This isn't how democracy works – and we can't allow it to happen once again. We must defend fair representation for all of us.

The redistricting process takes place over a narrow window of time, which gives us only months to push back. So please stay alert in this urgent fight ahead and thank you for sticking with us.

Attend the October 24th assembly and you will be inspired by what you see and hear.




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Guilty!!
