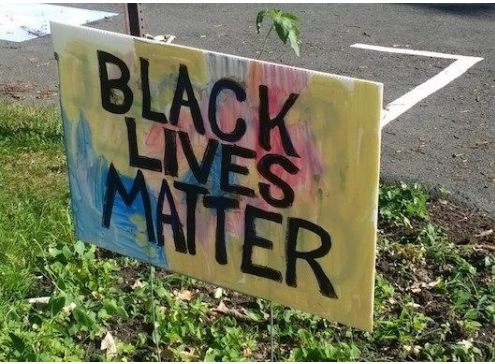

It staggers to realize that the church was in all of it. When we speak of things happening now, some would have us be silent because (1) that's not our jobs (We are to spread the Gospel), not raise concerns of things that are not directly related to that role; (2) those who do represent churches and support what is happening are deemed inappropriately engaged,

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Pastor's Message – What Can We Say? What Can We Do?

Let's see, we are living through a pandemic that since its inception has gotten far worse. While we may take some degree of thankfulness with being in the Northeast, the devastation is country wide, the death toll climbing and we have now set the record of over 4,000,000 of our fellow citizens having tested positively for the virus. Newer projections of in excess of 200,000 deaths in this country are staggering. It's getting worse with our incompetent federal response to this public health threat. Florida is now the epicenter of COVID-19 worldwide.

We have paramilitary units dispatched to cities with democratic mayors to protect buildings and not worry about lives. Protestors have been faced with tear gas, rubber bullets and military paraphernalia as they sought to peacefully influence their cities response to the challenge of Black Lives Matter. These units are assembled, unmarked, show up without request or notice and immediately engage actively to break up protests. This is a democracy, isn't it? Only one death so far, but many injured. But it is a new day in America when someone in the latest camouflage, with shiny new weapons, helmets and goggles jump out of rental cars and pick people at random from the streets to be arrested.

While the President plays golf, he is also decimating our public parks by opening them to development, selling our arctic shores for drilling to the highest bidders, working hard at voter suppression, and now offering the newest of the pandemic updates without the need of any medical science whatsoever, but a softened tone so that he can use this free television time to run for another term.

He has also been busy commuting sentences of those accused of major crimes and rolling back every single climate initiative that has been put in place in recent years. When he is done there will be nothing left of our climate science responses and a country reduced to responding to his whims and financial needs.



Our only choice is to vote. Vote in our towns and cities, in our States and for federal candidates. We must recognize that each of these steps are essential to have what we want to happen. I say that because I am not telling you or asking you to vote for anyone. That is your decision. But not to vote, is to vote. So, should you miss voting this time, the consequences will go to you and all

of us. We must vote. It is the way that we can say we are comfortable with what is happening or we need change.

This issue does have an urgent set of messages and I apologize to adding to your burden as the burdens keep piling up. You will see other articles here that raise questions about other things being neglected and needing our attention. These, too, are helping us sort out what we can say and do. Please give them your thoughtful consideration.

In the meantime, we will continue to Zoom our Sunday services through August if not longer, by taking a very, cautious posture relative to the pandemic.

yet still talk in support of what is happening, fund it, and participate in it as a means to make it seem OK and normal; and (3) since church is not a place for things political or things secular, we have no voice in these things. The problem with that is, in the words of Timothy Snyder, a Yale historian, “history does not repeat, it does instruct.”

Mr. Snyder is a prolific writer, but his book On Tyranny is a must read for all people living in this country now, whether religious or not. It simply teaches us twenty lessons from the twentieth century. While the issues and thoughts presented are not new to us, they are presented in a simple and powerful way. They say so much that has been stirring in my heart. By the way, it was also the subject matter of much of what disturbed Dietrich Bonhoeffer as he watched the evolution of similar things taking place, and realized just how dangerous these things would be to all people, and were.

From the back cover of Snyder’s book, “The Founding Fathers tried to protect us from the threat they knew, the tyranny that overcame ancient democracy. Today our political order faces new threats, not unlike the totalitarianism of the twentieth century. We are no wiser than the Europeans who saw democracy yield to fascism, Nazism, or communism. Our one advantage is that we might learn from their experience.” I remind you our imperfect Luther did say, “You are not only responsible for what you say, but also what you do not say.” In our vernacular today, “Silence leads to violence.” Or as Albert Schweitzer said, “Not to act is to act.”

Drawing from Mr. Snyder and other observations, here are the broad issues:

1. Wealth disparity is growing exponentially – inequality brings instability
2. Demagogues exploit free speech to install themselves to power – think Twitter
3. Tyranny is the usurpation of power by a single individual or group
4. The circumvention of law by rulers for their own benefit
5. People in the know keep quiet out of fear of consequences
6. Institutions are neutered or destroyed
7. Truth ceases to exist, and science is ignored or downplayed
8. Lies are told repeatedly, capture media, and worldwide attention
9. Cronies take on roles while competent and experienced people disappear
10. White supremacy and Nazism are given credibility and encouraged
11. Coarse discourse is the only discourse; immorality replaces morality
12. Follow the money stupid – but it remains hidden and inaccessible
13. Intentional replacement of judges a strategic and silent practice
14. Displacement of bastions of justice – hiring of AG for the president
15. Relationships built with enemies – destruction of those with friends
16. Secrecy is the means of action – constant lies cover the secrets
17. Displays of power and photo-ops replace negotiations and decency
18. Use of lawless paramilitary accountable to president as means to suppress protest
19. Distraction is a method of denial and deceit
20. Incompetence is blamed on those who have competence; finger pointing is strategic

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

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21. Those with wealth secretly fund with Citizen's United in place
22. Corporate lobbyists replace those competent and neutral – they are the swamp
23. Separation of groups is essential; Blacks, Latin, Muslims and Jews are out

25. Laws and rules serve their objectives of conquest and destruction
26. Huge increase in military spending and arming of police with military equipment
27. Incompetent public health driven by destruction of institutions
28. The symbols of today enable the reality of tomorrow – swastikas and other signs of hate
29. Institutions help preserve decency. They fall if not defended from the beginning.
30. The takeover of the Voice of America provides the infrastructure for propaganda
31. The takeover of the post office enables control of elections
32. Gerrymandering and voter suppression are tools of control
33. Russian and other interventions in our elections remove our right to choose
34. Putin wants to dismember democracy. He's doing it!

8. Stand out.
9. Be kind to our language.
10. Believe in truth.
11. Investigate.
12. Make eye contact and small talk.
13. Practice corporeal politics.
14. Establish a private life.
15. Contribute to good causes.
16. Learn from peers in other countries.
17. Listen for dangerous words.
18. Be calm when the unthinkable arrives.
19. Be a patriot.
20. Be as courageous as you can.

Fresh Start Pallet Products Teams Up with Parkville Market

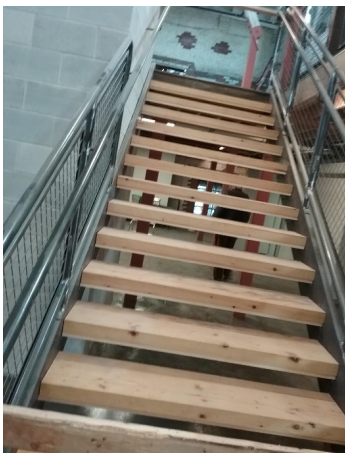
To Re-energize the City of Hartford

The 20,000 square foot food court at Parkville Market recently opened in Hartford's Parkville section. The food court is the first of its kind in Connecticut and is the vision of seasoned developer Carlos Mouta and his daughter Chelsea. Mouta's goal is to help transform the area in Parkville into a vibrant, walkable community that has significant retail, residential and entertainment offerings to make Parkville Market a destination to help draw people into the city – think Faneuil Hall in Boston.

As part of the preparation for the construction, the building was gutted and a number of old beams and lumber were saved for future use. Many of the beams were 20 feet long or longer and up to 6 inches square. Anne O'Brien, one of the designers for Parkville, teamed up with Fresh Start Pallet Products to salvage the old beams and convert them into a number of items and surfaces in the facility.

Fresh Start Pallet Products hires people who are working to reclaim their lives, after battling addiction, homelessness, alcoholism and refugee challenges, and teaches them expert carpentry skills. They build furniture, custom-built items and major renovation projects, mostly from reclaimed lumber. Fresh Start's shop includes commercial grade equipment and the staff has developed a high level of product design and fabrication capabilities.

Items produced for Parkville included 30 tables, 65 benches, 18 kiosk flip tops, 8 barrel hoop chandeliers and a number of butcher block counter tops, steps and bar surfaces. These items were custom built for Parkville under the direction of Anne O'Brien.

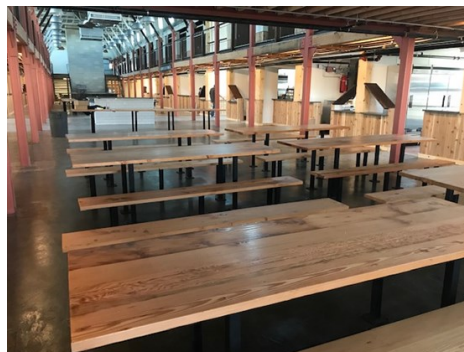
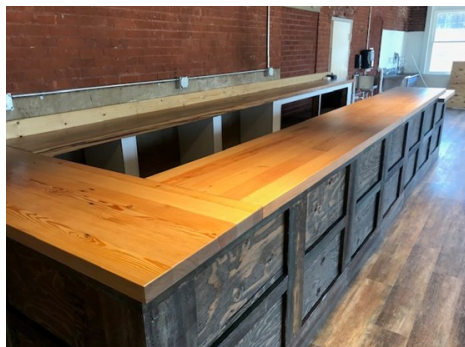


Reclaimed lumber and beams from the building 1 construction along with Stair Treads leading to the second-floor retail section constructed from reclaimed lumber.

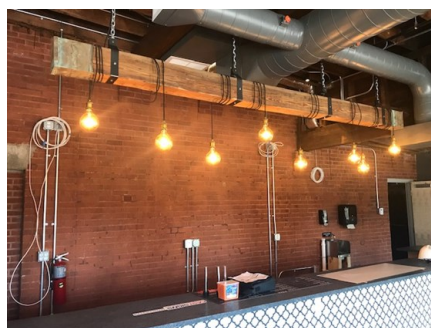
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Fresh Start Pallet Products Teams Up with Parkville Market

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Tables, Benches and Counter Tops produced by Fresh Start Pallet Products from reclaimed lumber and beams from the Parkville Market building.



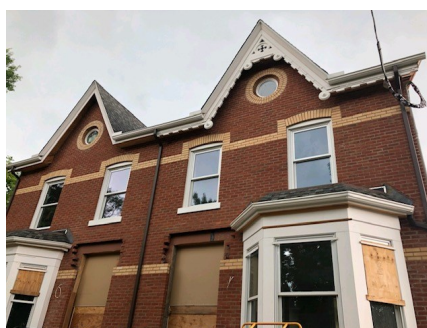
Custom Light Fixture over the kitchen produced from one of the reclaimed beams.

The work from Parkville Market helped Fresh Start to survive the Covid-19 crisis and solidified an ongoing relationship between these two Hartford organizations. Now that Phase I for Parkville Market is up and running, Mouta is turning his sights on Phase II and III to develop additional Parkville Market buildings. After that, development of the area will continue with the addition of apartments, along with additional retail, parking and entertainment space in the Park Road/Bartholomew area.

Disabled Jamaican woman cooks, washes, and writes using feet

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51-year-old Daphne Williams who was born with a partial right hand and a single finger. She is a picture of resilience as, throughout her life, she has learned to use that solitary finger to undertake every imaginable task on her own.

With the aid of her right foot, Williams cooks, cleans, washes clothes, sews, and writes her own letters. She also lights her coal stove, cuts patterns to sew, and peels food to cook.

A former vendor, the Smithville, Clarendon resident does not allow her disability to stand in the way.

A staunch Christian and believer in God, Williams firmly believes that she was placed on earth for a “special purpose”.



“This is how I was born and I accept it. God knows best, but Jamaica is too blessed for persons with disabilities to live permanently in hardships for the rest of their lives,” said Williams.

The fifth of six children and the only one disabled, she explained her late mother cited domestic woes and emotional distress as the cause of her disability. She has had no formal diagnosis for her condition.

She further revealed that her parents were reluctant to register her in the formal education system, out of fear of her being scorned or ridiculed. As a result, she started primary school at age 10 and graduated shortly before her 17th birthday – when she should have been leaving high school.

“God granted me wisdom, knowledge and understanding, and I see it as a process for me to learn.”

A Sunday-school teacher at the Smithville Baptist Church, she professed her love for children and said the congregation, of which she has been a member since 1994, was very supportive.

She believes that not enough is being done to cater to disabled persons, especially in rural areas.

“I am disabled, but I am able. I do everything for myself, but if I want a bag juice, somebody has to give it to me, so I want some financial independence so that I can stop being a burden to my sister. I need some help,” she pleaded.

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Williams' greatest challenge is not physical. She is saddled by financial woes and a lack of resources and pointed to an incomplete house on which construction was halted in 2008 as funds dried up.

"There are times you need help and you don't really see anybody. I would love some help to fix up my house and a little bathroom."

She added that she would love to be able to own a sewing machine, as she aims to profit from her sewing skills.

Her niece and a church member both vouched for her saying she is a 'walking miracle who does everything a person with two hands and two feet can do'.

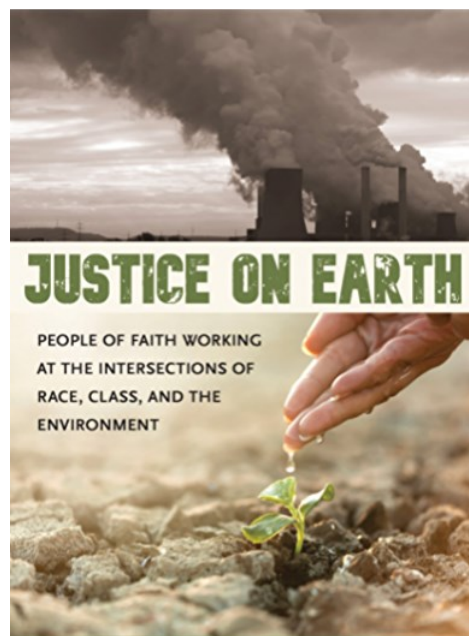
What Did You Do While the Planet Was Plundered: Excerpt of a poem by Drew Delliger

Celebration of "Love Your Block"

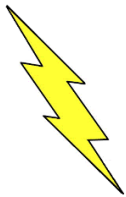
Saturday August 29, (or Sunday if it rains on Saturday)
