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Christ the King Sunday, the last Sunday before Advent, we listened in on the words of Luke as Jesus was crucified. Not what one would

particularly expect on the Sunday before we begin to reflect on Jesus' coming. In many ways, our lives of late as a congregation, as people of God, and as Americans have grown increasingly challenging and more difficult. Our country has grown increasingly split, our church has been shrinking, and our finances have continued to stress our Council and cause consternation about our abilities to continue to minister to our communities and address the needs of the homeless, jobless, hungry, suffering and vulnerable people.

All of that is the tough stuff. All of that is what we see every day, and what we want and need to address, yet it seems ever more challenging as more people come for food, for clothing, for jobs, and for our help in countless other ways.

Yet, what we can depend on, is who is in control. It isn't us. It isn't the forces of evil that seem to be in control of housing, incarceration, the treatment of immigrants, and health care for all of our people. It isn't whatever forces are seemingly in charge of our environment, causing fires, hurricanes, and so many other natural disasters. It isn't either in the control of our congress, our senators and house members, and it certainly is not in the control of a president that offers leadership that is coarse, self-focused, dishonest, and fear building and mongering.

Yet on Sunday we heard the crowds wanting to crucify him, the soldiers taunting him, and even one crucified with him telling him to save himself and those with him if he indeed was the Messiah.

Who really is in control? The answer comes in a remarkable dialogue with the other criminal being crucified, who simply says that Jesus is innocent, and then asks Jesus to remember him, when he goes to his kingdom. Jesus promises him that "today you will be with Me in Paradise." Later Jesus says, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do."

In the midst of pain, and suffering, knowing full well what was to happen, Jesus asks for mercy for his torturers and invites a criminal to join with him.

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Pastor's Message – Control, Power & Wealth

The Impeachment Process is holding sway and Pastors are not to opine on such things. Frankly for three years now. I have found myself inundated if not overwhelmed by constant reporting usually beginning with something "tweeted" by the president, and then studied, analyzed and criticized by our "free" press. On any particular day, one risks being submerged with the tweeting and reporting. What can be assured is that our democracy is not working as it once did, and our founding fathers and mothers would be aghast by what has happened to us and is happening to us virtually every minute of every day.

I'm not a politician, nor am I a Democrat or a Republican. I'm independent and always have been. If "Make America Great Again" means turn people against each other, debilitate the government, overturn all that the prior president did (good or bad) and blame everything on the prior president with a zeal that feels more racist than political, then what is going on in our country is just what the doctor ordered. Separation of the races, dehumanizing people of color, calling people who don't agree with us by horrid names, disavowing hundreds of professionals and their work, the promulgation of lies and made up theories of the ilk that the prior president was not born in the United States and therefor had no right to be elected.

But what is happening is not the doing of one man, it couldn't be. So, what is truly happening? What are we as Christians called to do about it? Money, wealth and power feel to me to be at the root of what is happening. While wealth disparity has been a part of our country's landscape for generations, it seems to have reached a new and frightening level. The Supreme Court's decision on "Citizen's United" has managed to more fully bury what is

happening politically and what it is doing to our institutions and our people, particularly those who have been caught between the elements of progress (automation, Al, etc.), and the ever more wealthy 1% of those in our country and countries throughout the world.

Historians have spoken of concepts like "The Power Elite" based on a perceptive sociologist's book of the same name that offered arguments that the United States was ruled by an "elite", proving their existence by a quantitative study of those in power. Importantly, those with this enormous and growing power, did not view themselves as "elite" even as the author identified the job titles of those so characterized.

More recent studies have suggested the existence of a kind of

American "oligarchy" that has taken over our politics. We have three billionaires running for president in 2020. More recently some have acknowledged the existence of people with extraordinary power in government, business, the professions and the military. What people have not seen is the possibility that these powerful groups of individuals may work together to strip people of civil liberties, and employ gerrymandering, and other means to impact elections. Many of those people intentionally have used their wealth and power to control regulations, create dangerous circumstances environmentally, and dangerous circumstances for the lower and middle classes when dealing with clean water, healthcare services and costs, among so many other threats and realties.

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
SAVE THESE DATES!

When you remember me, it means that you have carried something of who I am with you, that I have left some mark of who I am on who you are. It means that you can summon me back to your mind even though countless years and miles may stand between us. It means that if we meet again, you will know me. It means that even after I die, you can still see my face and hear my voice and speak to me in your heart.

For as long as you remember me, I am never entirely lost. When I'm feeling most ghost like, it is your remembering me that helps remind me that I actually exist. When I'm feeling sad, it's my consolation. When I'm feeling happy, it's part of why I feel that way. If you forget me, one of the ways I remember who I am will be gone. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is very disturbed by the November 18 announcement by Secretary of State Michael R. Pompeo that the Administration unwisely is changing current U.S. policy by stating that the "establishment of Israeli civilian settlements in the West Bank is not per se inconsistent with international law."

Our church has consistently called for an end to the Israeli occupation of the Palestinian territory, the cessation of all settlement activities and withdrawal from settlements on Palestinian territory to the 1967 boundaries, a negotiated, final status agreement between Israel and the Palestinians and the establishment of and international support for a viable, contiguous Palestinian state. We will continue to work with ecumenical and inter-religious partners who share these commitments. In the long term, we wish to see Israelis and Palestinians co-existing in justice and peace, as citizens of viable and secure Israeli and Palestinian states.

The Administration's announcement makes the realization of these outcomes to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict more difficult and distant, rather than advancing the cause of peace. The announcement, like earlier ones on the conflict, gives no evidence of having been developed in consultation with those who will be most adversely affected by this policy, namely the Palestinians in the occupied territory. Instead, it will give a "green light" to further settlement activity and a worsening of the conditions of occupation, including intensified military and police measures and the further diversion of natural and other resources that benefit only settlers.

By reverting to the policy of the Reagan Administration, the new policy ignores facts that have been created on the ground since 1989 (from a settler population then of close to 200,000 to an estimated more than 700,000 at present in the West Bank and East Jerusalem). It also discredits international law such as various provisions of the Fourth Geneva Convention -- to which Israel is a party -- about the obligations of an occupying power as well as the prevailing international consensus about settlements, most recently articulated in Security Council resolution 2334 of 2016 (to which all UN member states are bound according to the UN Charter).

Our distress with this announcement is primarily its impact on the daily life of Palestinians, especially our sisters and brothers in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land, but also their Christian and Muslim neighbors. We are also concerned with policy changes that further distance the United States from the prevailing international consensus on the path toward a negotiated solution to the Israeli-

Palestinian conflict, including respecting human rights standards and international law.
