- ➤ Signed into law November 15, 2021
- >To address Infrastructure priorities, which include water
- >SRF Supplemental Funds
- >5-year period (funds) allocated yearly)



Infrastructur hvestment and Jobs Act) Categories

The IJA is a 5-year supplement to the State Revolving Fund. This 5-year period is from Federal FY 2022 through 2026 (State FY 2023-2027)

Over five years, the state expects to receive approximately \$2.5 billion through the IIJA to improve water and wastewater infrastructure.



Drinking Warr State Revolving Fund Lead Service ne Replacement Program

- Projects must be a lead service line replacement project or associated activity directly related to the identification (including service line inventories), planning, design, and replacement of lead service lines.
- The system must be DWSRF program eligible.



Drinking Warr State Revolving Fund Lead Service ne Replacement Program

- The entity may have lead service lines within the distribution system; and
- 51 percent or more of the proposed project beneficiary area, based on household connections, must have an Annual Median Household Income (AMHI) level that does not exceed 150 percent of the state's AMHI level.

The state AMHI from the U.S. Census 2017-2021 American Community Survey (ACS) 5-year estimate is \$67,321; therefore, the AMHI of the proposed project beneficiary area must not exceed \$100,982



Drinking War & State Revolving Fund Lead Service ne Replacement Program

- SFY 2023 Funding Project Information Forms were due May 23, 2023
- > \$213,455,000 Total Available for SFY 2023
- > 51% principal forgiveness / 49% financing
- > For inventories, 0% interest financing, 15-yr term
- For planning through construction costs, regular DWSRF subsidized interest rate financing applies

To reduce exposure to perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) and other emerging contaminants through drinking water and to help address discharges through wastewater and, potentially, nonpoint sources Projects that address any contaminant listed on any of EPA's Contaminant Candidate Lists (CCL) are eligible. 



Economically stressed Areas Program (EDAP)

- EDAP was created in 1989 Provides financial assistance through grants and loans for water and wastewater projects in economically distressed areas where service is unavailable or inadequate to meet state standards
- > Financing interest rates based on TWDB's cost of funds
- Grants up to 70% of eligible costs (nuisance determination) requirements)



Economically


- SFY 2022 IUP closed
- Program funding is based on remaining constitutional capacity and legislative authorization for debt service
- > 88th (R) Legislature authorized up to \$100 million for SFY 2024-2025 biennium
- > Requirements
 - ✓ Model Subdivision Rules by county and applicable city
 - ✓ Established residence prior to June 1, 2005
 - ✓ For residential purposes only
 - ✓ No transfer of funds from utility
 - ✓ Applicant must become OSSF Authorized Agent
 - ✓ Mandatory connections for wastewater projects,


