Summer is quickly approaching. As many of us look forward to vacations and a slower pace of life during these months, your All Saints Finance Advisory Committee and Congregational Council have been carefully monitoring our giving during the first few months of the year. It is not unusual for giving to drop off during summer months; however, we are entering Summer 2022 further behind than we would like.

On the other hand, coming out of the two-year pandemic has made it more challenging for us to be able to compare giving this year to that of pandemic years, when we went for months without inperson worship and giving was lower for several reasons, including the economic challenges faced by some in our congregation. The pandemic also hastened changes in how people worshipped, even pushing All Saints more quickly into the new frontier of providing online services, a goal of the Council at least a year prior to the pandemic.

While some members still prefer to worship online, it has been gratifying to All Saints elected leaders to see more members attending worship in person, and we were extremely blessed to have strong attendance for Easter 2022! Remember Easter 2021: socially distanced outdoor worship with attendance limits?? We were also pleased to welcome a number of new members who joined as we were coming out of the pandemic!

So, as we enter summer, we ask that you to remember your church while you are away. We urge you to start giving online as many are now doing. You will find simple online giving signup instructions on our website (<u>www.allsaintsphoenix.org</u>) and our terrific Parish Administrator Shari Clark is always willing to help members get started. If you are behind on your pledge, please try to catch it up before you take off for cooler climates. Lastly, keep All Saints in your prayers until we are all together again.

Living the Lectionary

If you grew up in a mainline Christian church, you probably are very familiar with that idea that there is a list of readings for each Sunday and each Holy Day of the year. What you may not realize is that this is a very ancient part of our worship life. The Talmud claims that the practice of reading appointed Scriptures on given days dates back to the time of Moses. The early Christian church developed lists that typically include an Old Testament lesson, a Psalm, an Epistle Lesson and a Gospel Lesson. Most mainline Christian churches today use what is known as the "Revised Common Lectionary." In its current form, the Revised Common Lectionary was compiled in 1992 by:

- The Anglican Church of Canada
- Christian Reformed Church in North America
- Evangelical Lutheran Church in America
- Free Methodist Church in Canada
- The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod
- The Presbyterian Church in Canada
- Roman Catholic Church in the United States
- Unitarian Universalist Christian Fellowship
- United Church of Christ

- Christian Church (Disciples of Christ)
- The Episcopal Church
- Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada
- Polish National Catholic Church
- Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)
- Reformed Church in America
- Roman Catholic Church in Canada
- The United Church of Canada
- The United Methodist Church

- International Commission on English in the Liturgy (an Agency of 26 Roman Catholic National or International Conferences of Bishops)

The lectionary is a three-year cycle of readings. The gospel readings for each year come from one of the three synoptic gospels: Year A – Matthew; Year B – Mark, Year C – Luke. (We are currently in Year C.) The most frequently read gospel is John, which is scattered over all three years.

Many people prepare for the coming Sundays worship by reading the lectionary lessons during the week before. I look up the readings at: <u>lectionary.library.vanderbilt.edu</u>. In fact, the big blue book in our pulpit is not a complete Bible. It is a hard copy of the lectionary, that helps the readers see the lessons gathered in a couple of pages. You should go and take a peek at it before or after worship.

The lectionary also helps our church musicians to prepare music that speaks to the Scripture of that Sunday. If I get stuck on what I should preach, I can often find inspiration by looking at the hymns that Jerry Gunderson has picked for that Sunday. Many ancient and contemporary hymns were based on a particular reading from the lectionary. They dive deep into the Scripture with the heart of a poet.

Even with three years of Sunday readings, individuals are invited to read the Bible daily on their own. In fact, while the lectionary includes nearly all the four Gospels, it does not include about 80% of the Bible overall. To expand your Bible reading, you can look to page 1121 in the back of the Evangelical Lutheran Worship Hymnal. There you will find a daily lectionary that can expand the breadth of your understanding of the Word of God.

As a pastor, sometimes I stray away from the lectionary, to preach on a theme that needs to be addressed. But overall, I find the lectionary forces me to start with the Bible first and not with my own thoughts about the world or the church. What is surprising to me is how often, reading the lectionary, gives me new insight into today's headlines and personal concerns of the people I meet. That a list of assigned readings can do that, speaks mostly to the power of the Word of God rather than to the lectionary itself.

To be honest when I started as a pastor, I sometimes thought that the lectionary was too limiting. Now after preaching from it for 33 years, I realize that I have only begun to scratch its surface.

Living Lutheran Staff Highlight: "A Prayer for Guidance" by Nancy L. Winder This month's selection by Shari Clark.

For 60 years the <u>Holden Village retreat center</u> in the Cascade Mountains of Washington state has welcomed people into the wilderness to form and renew their relationships with God, the earth and each other. Guests and staff in this remote, beautiful setting enjoy nature, community life, music, art and worship while engaging in conversations about life, faith and the world.

When people return from Holden to their homes, schools, and faith communities, they take their new discoveries with them. One treasure that guests have taken with them for all of Holden's history is a prayer:

O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord.



Written by Eric Milner-White, dean of the chapel at King's College, Cambridge (and designer of its famous Christmas Eve service, "<u>A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols</u>"), the prayer, titled "The Call of Abraham," was first published in 1941 in a little book titled Daily Prayer, compiled by Milner-White and G.W. Briggs.

Certainly the people of England, gathered in their churches and worried in their homes during World War II, could identify with "The Call of Abraham" and its sense of an uncertain future held in God's guidance. The prayer offered hope for the future in a hopeless time.

"The Call of Abraham" first found a Lutheran readership in the 1958 Service Book and Hymnal (SBH). Luther Reed, chair of the joint commission for that hymnal and president of Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia, owned two prayer volumes by Milner-White, including Daily Prayer, and copied out petitions from those books for the "Collects and Prayers" section of the SBH. "The Call of Abraham" became No. 96, "For Guidance." The SBH was the worship book at Holden Village, and Carroll Hinderlie, named its first director in 1963, used "For Guidance" right away. Perhaps Hinderlie and his wife, Mary, first learned of the prayer from the Anglican missionaries with whom they were imprisoned by the Japanese in the Philippines during World War II. Or maybe they heard it when they studied in Norway in the 1950s.

Villagers at Holden in its first years might remember the invitation to turn to "prayer 96 on page 231." As the prayer made its way from the village to countless other contexts, it became known as "The Holden Prayer." In 1987 the prayer was published in the Lutheran Book of Worship under "Morning and Evening Prayer," and in 2006 the prayer was included in Evangelical Lutheran Worship.

This prayer resonated in the hearts and minds of people of all faiths and vocations, who recite it at worship, weddings, ordinations and even funerals. <u>Valparaiso (Ind.)</u> <u>University</u> uses it at graduation every year. Lutheran congregations also use it as a template for their ministry, including <u>Westwood</u> in St. Louis Park, Minn., and <u>St. Mark</u> in Spokane, Wash. Many congregations, including Immanuel Lutheran in Pepin, Wis., recite it as their prayer of sending in every service.



It's also been set to music, and visual artists have rendered it in many mediums.

At Holden, the prayer is most often used as staff leave the village. Its strong sense of a foundation for life's journey, for God's calling to service and vocation, and its vision of new paths and even perils blesses each person for whatever might come next.

The phrase in this prayer that most seems to capture people's imagination and spirit is "good courage." What strength and direction these words give, especially when sustained by God's guiding hand and supporting love! These are words for every season, every person, every community. Thanks is given for Milner-White and this treasure, which has gone out everywhere with "good courage."
