RISSE (<u>www.risse-albany.org</u>)



We started with a great group of people who enjoy reading and opening their homes to host the group. Others have come and gone over the years for one reason or another, but we still have a good core group that keeps us going strong. We share wonderful friendships, great discussions and lots of laughs. Also, thanks to Ana Crosbourne, we are able to zoom the meetings for those who can't make it out or if weather or a pandemic prevents us from meeting in person.

# **STREET SOLDIERS**

CRCC has chosen Street Soldiers to be one of the beneficiaries of the church's Angel Tree for the past few years. Nancy Bacon began volunteering with Street Soldiers five years ago, helping provide food and necessities at their Friday Night dinners in a park in Albany. I asked her why she was drawn to this organization, "I like that Street Soldiers is a grassroots organization. This means volunteers give from their heart, no receipts for taxes given as we are not a 501c3. No red tape, no sign ups. Friends in need do not have to give their names. It comes together organically. And there is always enough." Just recently, she began volunteering in their outreach van. I asked her to share her experiences.

My first night on the Outreach van was Friday December 23 - a rain and icy night. It was just me and one employee that drove the van. Calls were coming in from unhoused people that were unable to get into code blue shelters. The van starts at the Albany Public Library first. People from HATAS (Homeless and Travelers Aid Society) are usually there to help get people shelter as well as assist with social services paperwork to secure assistance. The library had closed at 6:00 and HATAS had left early. Remaining at the library, were basically unhoused individuals who had waited too long to get assistance. The driver took a name and info and called the HATAS hotline for someone. He had been kicked out of all local shelters. The person from HATAS was able to secure a spot in Safehaven, even though he had been kicked out, but he refused.

People seemed to just appear at the van. They lined up for hot meals, cocoa and sandwiches, and snacks. All asked for gloves, hats, blankets or sleeping bags. I handed out those items that I received from church. There were not enough gloves, so we gave extra socks.

We then went down by the river to see a woman that I know through Street Soldiers that lives in her car. She wouldn't take hot food because she had gotten sick from a dinner once before. But she did take yogurts and soft snacks due to her dental issues. I gave her a new hoodie and a yoga mat from our angel tree. She is still so grateful for both.

We met up with a woman who has a safe and warm place that she stays. I'd met her through Street Soldiers. She's vegan, and I was able to give her salads and fresh fruit that was donated from the airport.

We checked on a person that is staying in an apartment with a friend (for now). She has serious medical issues; the van checks on her daily and brings her food.

Back to the library we went (a few people called after we had left the first time). We gave them the last of the blankets, hats and hot meals. When we pulled up, the police were there. I saw a young man in the bus shelter. He was standing, but folded in half (it's called a fentanyl hang). We stayed long enough to see an ambulance come and take him.

One last ride through Albany. We checked in the concourse for anyone in need, then drove back to Menands. I saw many Street Soldiers friends and met new ones. The driver knew most.

I learned how much the outreach really does. They have contacts for emergency shelter. There is intake including names and supplies given. They offer harm reduction bags (needles and items for safe, clean IV drug users), as well as Narcan.

At the end of the shift, the driver enters all information into a data base, including info on SafePoint harm reduction bags.

Everyone that came to the window for assistance readily gave their names. There is a very comforting trust between people in need and outreach workers.

I returned to the van on Christmas Eve. Renee (Street Soldiers founder) and I went out for 4 hours. We handed out the yoga mats, sleeping bags, sweats, and a bag of hats and scarves. We brought one homeless friend to the Skinny Pancake for whatever she wanted. The owner came over and talked with us. They know our friend well, and offer \$4 bottomless coffee. We also bought her a \$50 gift card so she could go in for food and coffee whenever she wants. There is a husband, wife and adult son that hold signs that we gave gifts and tarps to – the wife cried so much.

We visited a woman that sleeps in a doorway. We gave her a tarp and a gift bag of healthy snacks.

I have continued to volunteer in the Outreach Van. They have a huge need for gently used winter coats and gloves. This is something I can see myself being a routine volunteer for. The staff is wonderful! It is a great, but emotional experience.

#### **Colonie Community Day Care News**

Things may finally be settling down for awhile at the Day Care. It's been a whirlwind of events since Thanksgiving. Our Christmas show was a huge success! We allowed the children's families to all attend for the first time in two years. It was standing room only for sure.

The kids were wonderful - they sang so loud, and, of course, were adorable! We had Santa back this year to give the children gifts and provide picture opportunities. It felt like old times.

We celebrated our classroom Christmas parties with a pajama day and a surprise visit from the Grinch. It was hysterical! A couple of the children were not very thrilled, but the rest chased him when he was "stealing" our toys. It was fun for all.

Our wreath fundraiser was a wonderful success. Thank you to all who participated. We purchased some new toys for the classrooms with the fundraising money - the Grinch tried to take them!

We are starting our Krause's candy fundraiser soon. Watch for the flyers!




# **Building and Grounds Update**

This month, we should be done with the plans for the kitchen and bathrooms renovations and will have received price quotes for the entire project. The daycare has given us their needs and wishes which will facilitate the daycare lunch program in a more sustainable fashion. We are well on our way towards making our bathrooms ADA compliant with upgraded fixtures, such as new partitions, ventilation fans, and wider doors. We will be changing the heating and cooling in the kitchen and narthex, so as to make the room between the bathrooms, where the heat source is currently located, into a utility room with a slop sink, washer, dryer, and janitor closet. We will soon be developing a timeline for start and expected completion.

Routine maintenance is on-going throughout our campus. I recently leveled some of the concrete sidewalk pieces in an effort to alleviate the trip hazards around the sanctuary entrance. I continually clear brush and clean the day light drains into the ditch along Watervliet-Shaker Road, so as to prevent future water and sump-pump drainage problems. Replacement of the steel fire doors in the sanctuary and other places is still an open project, and may well get bundled into the kitchen and bathroom project.
