

The following is the third in a series of articles meant to assist us in prayerful contemplation as we drew closer Consecration Sunday in late April. Due to Covid-19 Consecration Sunday postponed and a new date has not yet been set.

The Lord went in front of them in a pillar of cloud by day, to lead them along the way, and by a pillar of fire by night to give them light, so that they may travel by day and by night. Neither the pillar of clouds by day nor the pillar of fire by night left its place in front of the people. Exodus, 13:17-22

As we approach a time when we consider how we will return some of our gifts back to God, we are focusing our minds on the gifts of God for the People of God.

God gives the gift of the Holy Spirit who travels with us. When, by the light of the Risen Christ, and in silent communion with God, we begin to open ourselves to more and more of God's gifts, we see a way—a way to follow, a way to live, a way to give. As the way becomes clearer, we are offered the gift of the Holy Spirit as our companion, guide, and strength.

In the excerpt from Exodus, above, the Children of Israel were guided through the wilderness, even when they believed they were lost and forgotten by God. We may never experience a cloud or a pillar of fire, but we may have known those frequent, sometimes irritating, nudges that are God's way of asking us to pay attention.

Stewardship is about paying attention to God's nudges. God helps us to respond with a generosity that surprises and delights us with its simplicity and joy.

We cannot do everything. God's reign is not only beyond our efforts, it is beyond our seeing and knowing.

But we can take the first steps of generosity, knowing that we may never meet the recipients of our giving.

What decision have you made to pass on the gifts that God has given you?

Lord, just as you led the Children of Israel through the wilderness, open us a path for me to follow. Holy Spirit, travel with me along that path. God, help me to feel your nudges and respond in generosity for the good of your church and the needs of the people of your world. Amen

Quilt Group News


Community Reformed's Quilt Group, despite not meeting since mid-February, finished the season by making an amazing 75 baby quilts for the Children's Hospital at Albany Med.

The group completed 53 small quilts for the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, and 22 larger ones for the Pediatric Unit.

All materials for the quilts were donated by group members. Ideas, patterns, and encouragement were freely shared too.

The group normally meets twice a month from September through May, but this year's pandemic and the necessary New York PAUSE made it impossible to gather. Nevertheless, the 15 regular members did not give up. Working on their own from home they completed the quilts and then went on to make even more.

Thank you to all the group members for generously and tirelessly working to create the "comforters" that will truly bring comfort to sick babies and their families.

Prayer of Lament in Divided Times

God of All Time,

Your scriptures tell me that weeping may tarry for the night, but joy comes in the morning. Yet how long is this night, O Lord? How long must people live in deep racial separation, how long must violence pervade our lives, how long must we fear each other? How long, O Lord!

I lift my eyes to the hills which is where my help comes from. Lord, when the names of people who have been choked, shot and assaulted are too many to count, I know that not one soul has been forgotten by mothers and fathers, sisters and brothers, cousins and friends.

They remember...

...laughs and smiles, ...dreams and struggles, ...talents and personalities.

How long must we listen to the cries and screams as blood stains the sidewalk? How many videos must we watch before we begin to see a change?

The church seems to have no real explanations for what brings us to this place today. It is with real sorrow in our hearts that we need to ask you to teach us again your ways of love and justice.

Help our nation. Help us examine ourselves. Help those of us who are sad and angry to not let these deaths be in vain. We do not pray for vengeance, but we do thirst for justice. We hope for healing between neighbors and officers called to protect and serve. We long for the day when young people will live long enough to be old and parents will not have to say 'good-bye' too soon. Push us to speak up and to step out of our comfort zones. Change our hearts that we might deeply long for justice to roll down, that we might invest our lives in changing this devastating, hate-filled story, because every time a person encounters violence it is a violation of our faith.

Deliver us, O God.

Deliver us from our fear, come quickly to help us, come quickly to save us. Open our mouths to speak out against prejudice and injustice. Grant, O God, that your holy and life-giving Spirit may so move every human heart that barriers which divide us may crumble, suspicions disappear, and hatreds cease; that our divisions being healed, we may live in justice and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the one who came that we all might have life and have life more abundantly.
