Over the past 2 years, there have been doors closed to us that may never open again. Our world has changed. But with joy and renewed energies we have found new doors and they have been opened.

As you already know, our order of worship has changed. After much discussion and research by the Worship team, adjustments have been made. Approximately half of our Sunday attendance is participating via Zoom. Others view the services on Facebook or on YouTube later in the week. Attending church is no longer just a Sunday morning, ten to eleven experience at 701 Sand Creek Road. This shift was anticipated. Adaptations needed to be made.

Some of the changes to our worship service were made because of copyright requirements. Because the service is posted on the internet, material and music copyrights must be secured. You may have noted the list of credits in your bulletin.

The placement of announcements has been moved to the end of the service where they can be removed before the video is posted online. Printed announcements will appear in the bulletin following the printed order of worship. Worship will begin promptly at 10 so all are encouraged to arrive at church or login prior to that time. Those days of moseying into church during the announcements have passed.

After further review, it was realized almost all members are now using PayPal, direct payment, or mailed check for their offering. Since so few bring their offering to church on a Sunday morning, it seemed service adjustments were needed. An offering box now is located near the sanctuary door for those who bring their offering to church. The dedication of our time, talents, and treasure has been added to the communion service.

Maintaining privacy is a major concern. The elder's prayer which may include specific names and concerns of our church family on Sunday morning will be edited before social media postings. We will no longer include personal telephone numbers in the bulletin announcements, only email addresses or the option to contact the church office. Parents have been asked to sign release forms regarding photographing their children. Times have certainly changed.

Change is difficult for us all, but it is said change is the only constant in our world. With God's grace and guidance, we have opened a new door and stepped onto a new path. We have made these worship changes, but we know further adjustments lie ahead. Our ability to adapt and revise is the true strength of our congregation. We are richly blessed. Thanks be to God.

"Thank you," to all the willing volunteers that were at church the morning of Sept 11. We were able to accomplish so much because so many showed up. Without volunteers, the church would have to pay for many services, and some may, in fact, never get done. We have a beautiful sanctuary and grounds, which take many hours of dedicated volunteers. My mother, who turned 93 this summer, grew up on a ranch 30 miles outside of Walla Walla, Washington. She told the story of being the only one of her siblings born at home because she came during the wheat harvest of 1928. She was also a child during the Depression years. When I was in grade school and learned about recycling, I remember my mother telling me "Of course that's what you do."

I learned from her that a bath only needed to be six inches deep and "showers are better" to use less water because Mom's family only had a cistern on the ranch. Things were reused until they could be used no longer. She taught her children early that stewardship meant to take care of the things God has blessed us with and leave things better than you found them—that was Mom's motto.

As the Stewardship committee expands to become Creation Care and Stewardship, the change seems a logical progression. 
**\$25 - One Bag of Love** - bag of staple groceries, produce, and toiletries for 1 week for a family of five

This fall, Lisa McGee, Vicki Lane, and Tina Bottini enrolled in Old Testament History and Introduction offered by the Albany Synod School of Ministry.
