What's Next?

About a month ago, the leadership of the congregation (the consistory and staff members) went away for a time of retreat together. We shared worship together. We spent some time reflecting on the near past experiences we've had. We talked about the challenges and encounters we've faced and where we discovered God showing up. We are just beginning to wonder about what happens now...about what is next for us all who are part of CRCC.

We discovered that this is very new territory for us all. Not many of the current consistory or staff (and probably not many from the congregation) have gone through a time of pastoral transition, so we want to be deliberate in our next steps. We also want to be transparent, so we will continue to communicate with each of you what is currently happening and what is being planned.

At the November consistory meeting, we agreed to petition the Albany Classis to extend our contract with Pastor Hoffman for 2024. Pastor Hoffman will walk with us through this time of pastoral transition which may even extend beyond 2024. That's the first part of what is happening. Another part of what is happening is that our ministries will continue in the way they have been developing and unfolding over the years.

Part of what is being planned will include congregational conversations where we will identify our values, resources, needs, and goals. The consistory will need to appoint a team of individuals to process all the information gleaned from the congregational conversations into a "Church Profile" which will be shared far and wide. And then we appoint a Pastoral Search Committee who will begin to receive candidates for interview and eventually recommendation to the consistory and congregation.

As noted in the bulletin insert a few weeks ago, this is not a quick process. It takes time and effort and a lot of energy by all. It requires patience and perseverance along with support and understanding. So, what can we be doing while we wait to get started? Rev. Cornwell left us with the Jeremiah 29:7-14 passage as the answer. First: PRAY....Pray for

Another way of giving IRA distributions

For the last several years, I have chosen a different way to give funds to Community Reformed. It's called an IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution.

At my age, I am required to take an annual minimum distribution from my IRA account. Failing to do so would result in a large penalty. But instead of receiving the money, paying taxes on it, and then donating it to the church, I have designated that a portion of that payment is to go directly to CRCC. Since it doesn't pass through my hands, that portion is free from income tax.

Donating to church in this way means more than avoiding some income tax. It automatically ensures that my pledge is fulfilled even if we are traveling or otherwise unable to get to church. Furthermore, the payment reoccurs every year automatically. Once I set it up, the only time I need to intervene is if I wish to change the amount of my contribution or the time of year it occurs.

According to an article in US News (Emily Brandon, December 20, 2022)

A qualified charitable distribution is an IRA withdrawal that is paid directly from your IRA to a qualifying charity. While income tax is normally due on each traditional IRA distribution, the account owner does not need to pay taxes on the amount transferred to charity.

You don't have to designate your entire distribution as a charitable donation. In my case, a portion of my distribution goes to church, and the rest is sent to me. On the other hand, some people designate several charitable organizations. It still counts as your minimum distribution, so you don't face the 50% penalty.

There is a cap on the amount you can give to any one charitable organization, but it's very high. The person or entity that is managing your IRA has all the information.

If you decide to use this way to fulfill your offering, or even a portion of it, it's important to notify the church office. The check that your IRA sends to church may not identify you by name as the source.

I set up my IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution through my IRA manager. It entailed a bit of paperwork but was surprisingly very quick and easy. Designating an IRA distribution is a win-win for me and for the church I love so much.

Epiphany Worship

January 6, is Epiphany. Epiphany is a Greek word which means "to make known" or "to reveal." It is that AHA moment of discovery. - like the Magi had when they came to where Jesus was and bowed down in worship of him.

To God our Lord and Savior, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and forever. Amen.


Shirley's Shawls




